Austin, Texas, January 26 and 27, 1951 Neeting No. 511

The Board of Regents of The University of Texas met in regular session in the Regents' Room (Academic Room) of The University of Texas at 4:20 p.m., Friday, January 26, 1951, with the following present: Regents Woodward (Chairman), Warren (Vice-Chairman), Darden, Rockwell, Swenson, Terrell, and Tobin; Chancellor Hart, Vice-Chancellor Simmons, Assistant to the Chancellor Granberry; President Painter, Vice-President Dolley; Dr. Ewelt; Land Attorney Gaines; University Consulting Architect Lemmon; Director of News and Information Service Keys; and Secretary Stewart. Mr. Kirkpatrick and Mr. Tucker were absent.

TEXAS STATE UNIVERSITY FOR NEGROES. -- Chancellor Hart reported to the Board that he had received a letter from Mr. M. B. Etheredge, Chairman of the Committee on Education in the House of Representatives, stating that Representative Murphy of Houston had introduced a bill to change the name of the Texas State University for Negroes to Texas State University. The consensus of the Board and Chancellor Hart was that the change in the name would lead to much confusion and would not be an accurate description of the institution. He requested authority to represent The University of Texas at the hearing of the Committee and express an opinion on this matter. Upon motion by Dr. Terrell, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board unanimously approved the request of Chancellor Hart.

Chancellor Hart presented with his recommendations and approval the Administrative Actions and Dockets of each of the units of The University of Texas, as follows:

OFFICE OF THE CHANCELLOR. -- The Board, upon motion by Mrs. Tobin, seconded by Mr. Swenson, approved the actions taken by Chancellor Hart. (A copy of this list is attached hereto and made a part of these Minutes. Pages 290.)

MAIN UNIVERSITY AND EXTRAMURAL DIVISIONS. -- The Board, upon motion by Mrs. Tobin, seconded by Mr. Swenson, approved the actions taken by President Painter and also the recommended actions (Docket).

In connection with consideration of the Docket, attention was called to the fact that the recommended change in the Nepotism Rules of the Board of Regents was required under the Board's own rules to lie over for thirty days before action is taken thereon. This item will accordingly be pending business at the next meeting.

TEXAS WESTERN COLLEGE. -- The Board, upon motion by Mrs. Tobin, seconded by Mr. Swenson, approved the actions taken by President Elkins and also the recommended actions (Docket), with the following amendment: Page 2, under "Investment of Restricted Funds," the last four items listed should be deleted, therefore, changing the total amount of funds to be transferred from \$5,950.36 to \$5,200.

A Supplemental Docket was also presented by Chancellor Hart and the following items were recommended for approval.

MINING LEASE TO PURPLE SAGE MINING COMPANY.--President Elkins requested authority to approve the lease of all of Section 39 in Block 3, - G. C. & S. F. Railway Survey, Abstract No. 1014,

in Hudspeth County, Temas, to the Purple Sage Mining Company for a term of five years beginning March 1, 1951, for the purposes of searching for minerals and conducting mining and quarry operations. The royalty to be paid to the lessor, Texas Western College of The University of Texas, ranges from % ores, net smelter return, to 15% ores, net smelter return, depending on value of the ores. This contract to be signed by the Chairman of the Board of Regents after it has been approved as to form by Land Attorney Gaines.

CONTRACT WITH WESTERN COMMISSARY COMPANY FOR OPERATION OF DINING HALL.--President Elkins requested that approval be given to a plan whereby the College would enter into a contract with Western Commissary Company of El Paso, Texas, to take over the complete operation of the Dining Hall on the basis of actual cost plus a fixed ree for meals served. This recommendation was made as a result of a combination of factors, including: rising food costs, labor difficulties, and general unstable conditions. Upon motion by Mrs. Tobin, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the contract and authorized the Business Manager of Texas Western College to execute the contract.

The recommended Supplemental Docket, as presented by Chancellor Hart, was approved upon motion by Mr. Swenson, seconded by Mrs. Tobin.

MEDICAL BRANCH. -- Upon motion by Mr. Swenson, seconded by Mr. Rockwell, the Board approved the actions taken by Vice-President Leake and also the recommended actions (Docket). (A copy of these lists is attached hereto and made a part of these Minutes. Pages 375, 375)

DENTAL FRANCE. -- Upon motion by Mrs. Tobin, seconded by Mrs. Swenson, the Board approved the actions taken by Vice-President Elliott and also the recommended actions (Docket). (A copy of these lists is attached hereto and made a part of these Minutes. Pages 381, 381,)

M. D. ANDERSON HOSPITAL FOR CANCER RESEARCH.--The Board, upon motion by Dr. Terrell, seconded by Mr. Rockwell, approved the actions taken by Dr. Clark and also the recommended actions (Docket), with the following amendment: Page 3, the amount of the grant from the American Cancer Society should be changed to \$33,061.52. (A copy of these lists is attached hereto and made a part of these Minutes. Pages 383,385.)

SOUTHWESTERN MEDICAL SCHOOL. -- The Board, upon motion by Dr. Terrell, seconded by Mr. Swenson, approved the actions taken by Dr. Moyer and also the recommended actions (Docket). (A copy of these lists is attached hereto and made a part of these Minutes. Pages 389,39D.)

POSTGRADUATE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE. -- The Board, upon motion by Mr. Swenson, seconded by Dr. Terrell, approved the list of actions taken by Dr. Ewalt and also the recommended actions (Docket). (A copy of these lists is attached hereto and made a part of these Minutes. Pages 392, 395)

POSTGRADUATE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE

ADMISSION TO THE POSTGRADUATE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE.--Chancollor Hart recommended that the Dean of the Postgraduate School of Medicine of The University of Texas be authorized to promulgate and enforce a rule regarding admission to study in the Postgraduate School of Medicine. This rule is to the effect that any applicant to be admitted to the Postgra wate School of Medicine must have attended and graduated from a medical school and must have completed an internship in a hospital both of which (i.e., the medical school and the hospital) have been approved by the Council on Medical Education and Hospitals of the American Medical Association. Upon motion by Mrs. Tobin, seconded by Mr. Rockwell, the Board approved this recommendation.

PROGRAM FOR POSTGRADUATE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE. -- Chancellor Hart recommended that the Dean of the Postgraduate School of Medicine be authorized to register students, and to set up and collect fees for courses, and then submit a Budget to the Chancellor with the understanding that the course of study was to be paid for by the fees of the students.

Chancellor Hart also recommended that the degrees of Master of Medical Science (M.M.S.) and Doctor of Medical Science (M.S.D.) be granted upon completion of satisfactory work under the following listed Details I and II.

Details - I. "Master of Medical Science" degree to be awarded by The University of Texas Postgraduate School of Medicine to candidates who have completed the following requirements:

- 1. Requirements for Registration.
 - a. Graduation from a four-year medical school rated as Class A by the Association of American Medical Colleges and the American Medical Association Council on Medical Education and Hospitals.
 - b. Satisfactory completion of a 12-months' internship in a hospital approved for internship by the Council on Medical Education and Hospitals of the American Medical Association.
- 2. Course of Study leading to M.M.S. Degree.
 - a. Completion of 160 hours of seminars and classroom work, conducted by members of the Postgraduate Faculty in some of the Medical Divisions of The University of Texas, or by attendence at similar courses approved as acceptable to the Dean's Committee of the Postgraduate School of Medicine.
 - b. Six hundred hours of laboratory work in the basic medical sciences. This work is to be primarily as an advanced student, but credit may be given for investigative work in the basic medical sciences or by serving as an assistant instructor in the basic sciences in one of the medical schools of the University. (The above hours refer to clock hours.)
 - c. Three years full-time clinical work, not more than six months of which is to be accredited to item "b". This clinical work is to be of an apprentice nature, in one of the residency programs of The University of Texas Postgraduate School of Medicine in one of its affiliated hospitals. Persons who claim six months' basic science activity toward their three-year requirement for clinical work must have spent the six months in the basic science laboratories on a full-time basis, and it must be in a laboratory of the University system or one approved by the Postgraduate School of Medicine and its Dean's Committee.
 - d. The candidate must complete a creditable piece

See: Minutes of March 16, 17,1951, Page 399, for Correction of research resulting in a paper acceptable for publication in a medical or scientific journal of national circulation. The acceptability of this work is to be judged by the examining committee of the Postgraduate School of Medicine.

e. The candidate must complete and satisfactorily pass an oral examination by a panel to be appointed by the Dean of the Postgraduate School of Medicine. This panel will consist of a representative from one of the basic medical sciences, a representative from the full-time Faculty of the Postgraduate School of Medicine, and two representatives of the Clinical Faculty of the Postgraduate School of Medicine. These Clinical Faculty representatives shall be from the specialty in which the candidate is seeking a degree.

Details - I (cont.). "Doctor of Medical Science."

- 1. The prerequisites for admission will be the same as for the M.M.S. degree, with the addition that the candidate must have a reading knowledge of German, French, or Spanish. This reading knowledge requirement may be satisfied by presenting evidence of satisfactory completion of courses of advanced type in these languages in The University of Texas or some other University acceptable to The University of Texas. An alternate way of satisfying this requirement would be a practical demonstration of the ability to translate scientific articles in one of these three languages by sight reading. This requirement must satisfy a committee of not less than two nor more than three, to be appointed by the Dean of the Postgraduate School of Medicine to examine the candidate in this particular subject.
- 2. To qualify for the M.S.D. degree the student must satisfy the following requirements:
 - a. Three hundred hours of accredited seminar or classroom work in one of the Medical Divisions of The University of Texas System, acceptable to the Postgraduate School of Medicine.
 - b. One year full-time work in one of the basic science laboratories of the University System acceptable to the Postgraduate School of Medicine. This full-time work in the basic sciences may be as a research assistant, as a student or as an instructor engaged in part-time research activity. Credit for six months of this work in other institutions acceptable to the Postgraduate School of Medicine may be requested by the candidate and may be granted on approval of the Dean of the Postgraduate School after appropriate investigation.
 - c. Three years full-time clinical work of the apprentice type in one of the approved residency programs of the University System. None of this period is to be accredited for the basic science year mentioned above.
 - d. An original piece of research work in one of the basic medical sciences or the application of basic science principles to one of the clinical fields.
 - e. An oral examination by a Committee to be made up of two people in the basic medical sciences, one

person on the full-time Faculty of the Postgraduate School of Medicine and two persons selected from the Clinical Faculty of the Postgraduate School of Medicine. These latter two persons are to be specialists in the field in which the degree is sought. The Committee will be appointed by the Dean of the Postgraduate School of Medicine.

All students applying for advanced degrees shall register with the Postgraduate School of Medicine as degree candidates and shall pay a tuition fee of \$25.00 per semester, the semesters to be three per year. The fees paid shall include a suitable diploma at the conclusion of the training period. The candidate is expected to defray the expenses of the publication of his work and to defray the expense of purchasing reprints, at least two copies of which are to be supplied to the Postgraduate School of Medicine upon publication. The degree shall be conferred at the commencement exercises of one of the two medical divisions of The University of Texas or the Dental Branch, depending on the most convenient time and location insofar as the candidate is concerned.

Details - II.

Provision Concerning Issuance of Certificates

The Postgraduate School of Medicine shall issue certificates in the following categories:

- 1. Certificates which may be issued conjointly with the affiliating hospitals to residents who have satisfactorily completed a portion or all of their postgraduate training program directed toward one of the specialties. Certificates may be issued for one, two, three, or four years, depending on the time spent in the particular hospital.
- 2. Certificates to physicians who satisfactorily complete the refresher courses offered under the auspices of the Postgraduate School of Medicine. These certificates shall be in the form of a small diploma which will set forth the number of credit hours that the person has satisfactorily completed, and setting forth the name of the specialty. The certificates will all be signed by the Dean of the Postgraduate School of Medicine and by the Faculty Member offering the course.

Upon motion by Dr. Terrell, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendation.

CONTRACTS WITH SOUTHERN PACIFIC HOSPITAL AND ST. JOSEPH'S INFIRMARY OF HOUSTON, AND SHANNON WEST TEXAS MEMORIAL HOSPITAL OF SAN ANGELO.--Chancellor Hart recommended that Dean Jack R. Evalt be authorized, on behalf of the Postgraduate School of Medicine of The University of Texas, to enter into contracts with Southern Pacific Hospital and St. Joseph's Infirmary, both of Houston, and Shannon West Texas Memorial Hospital of San Angelo, providing for the establishment of Divisions of the Postgraduate School of Medicine at these hospitals. The expenses of these Divisions are to be borne by the hospitals until the Legislature provides funds from which expenses may be paid by The University of Texas. The contract with these hospitals provide that the hospital will be approved as an institution under the auspices of the Postgraduate School of Medicine and that the members of the staff are to become members of the

faculty of the Postgraduate School of Medicine - that members of the Educational Committee will be submitted to Dean Ewalt. The Postgraduate School of Medicine agrees to supervise the courses given and also the educational program. Appointments of the faculty members are subject to the approval of the Board of Regents. Under the terms of the contract with these hospitals, either party may terminate their contract with thirty days' notice. The contract documents have been approved as to content by Vice-Chancellor Simmons. Upon motion by Dr. Terrell, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendation of Chancellor Hart.

MEDICAL MRANCH

FURNITURE AND EQUIPMENT FOR JOHN SEALY MOSPITAL. -- Chancellor Hart reported that plans and specifications for the furniture and equipment for the new John Sealy Hospital as prepared by C. H. Page and Son, Architects, including all four classifications, were completed, and he recommended that the plans and specifications be approved. Upon motion by Mr. Swenson, seconded by Mr. Rockwell, the Board approved the recommended plans and specifications.

APPROPRIATION OF ONE MILLION DOLLARS FROM THE UNAPPROPRIATED BALANCE IN AVAILABLE UNIVERSIST FUND .-- Chancellor Hart recommended that approval be given by the Board to appropriate the sum of \$500,000 out of the Unappropriated Balance in the Available University Fund to pay for the furniture and equipment for the new John Sealy Hospital. He also recommended that approval be given to transfer and appropriate for this purpose an additional sum of \$500,000 out of the sum heretofore appropriated by the Board of Regents out of the Available University Fund for the construction of an Administration Building on the Campus of the Main University, making a total appropriation of \$1,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary to pay for the furniture and equipment for the new John Sealy Hospital. Upon motion by Mr. Warren, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendations. It is understood that this transfer from the appropriation for the Administration Building project is not to be construed in any sense as an abandonment of that project, but that the sum transferred will be restored out of 1951-52 Available Fund Income as soon as such action may legally be taken by the Board of Regents. It is further understood that the Chancellor is to investigate the question of whether the furniture and equipment specified for the John Sealy Hospital contains any items which are not legally eligible for payment out of University funds. If there are such items in the list, the Chancellor is to confer with the Directors of the Sealy and Smith Foundation to see whether the Foundation might agree to the payment for such items out of the income from the Special Fund under the Joint Control of the Regents and the Foundation.

CALL FOR BIDS FOR THE FURNITURE AND EQUIPMENT FOR THE NEW JOHN SEALY HOSPITAL. -- Chancellor Hart recommended that Vice-Chancellor Simmons for Business and Finance be authorized and directed to call for bids for the furniture and equipment for the new John Sealy Hospital as set out in the plans and specifications, and to open and tabulate the bids and present them for consideration by the Board of Regents at its next meeting on March 16 and 17, 1951. Upon motion by Dr. Terrell, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendation.

The Board recessed at 5:10 p.m. until 9:00 a.m. Saturday morning, January 27, 1951.

The Board of Regents reconvened at 9:30 a.m., January 27, 1951, in the Regents' Room of The University of Texas, with the following present: Regents Woodward (Chairman), Warren (Vice-Chairman), Darden, Rockwell, Terrell, Swenson, and Mrs. Tobin; Chancellor Hart, Vice-Chancellor Simmons, Assistant to the Chancellor Granberry; President Painter, Vice-President Dolley, University Consulting Architect

Lemmon, Director of News and Information Service Keys; and Secretary Stewart. Mr. Kirkpatrick and Mr. Tucker were absent.

PH.D. PROGRAM IN MEDICAL SCIENCES.--Chancellor Hart presented the following recommendations concerning the Ph.D. program in Medical Sciences.

- 1. That the giving of work leading to the Ph.D. degree shall be regarded as the function of The University of Texas as a whole, and not exclusively of any single unit of the University.
- 2. That members of the teaching staffs of all units of the University who are properly qualified shall be eligible for membership in the Graduate Faculty with equal rights including right to become members of the Graduate Council.
- 3. That the general supervision and administration of work leading to the Ph.D. degree shall be under the Dean of the Graduate School of the Main University, subject to the approval of the President of the Main University, and the Chancellor.
- 4. That a coordinating committee on graduate work in the Medical Sciences shall be created to consist of the President of the Main University, (Chairman), the Dean of the Graduate School of the Main University, the Vice-President of the Medical Branch, the Director of the M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research, and the Deans of the Dental School, the Postgraduate School of Medicine, and the Southwestern Medical School, which committee, in consultation with the Graduate Council and any other persons it wishes to consult, shall have as its duties to make recommendations to the Chancellor regarding:
 - a. Rules for the selection of the teaching staffs of the various units of the University as members of the Graduate Faculty, and for the selection and possible enlargement of the Graduate Council and its duties and functions.
 - b. Rules for the approval of programs of work leading to the Ph.D. and other graduate degrees in the Medical Sciences at the various units of the University with the general objective of securing broad fundamental scientific training for each student and the fullest possible use of the resources of all units of the University, so as to avoid duplication.
 - c. Means for coordinating research projects at all of the units of the University in sciences relating to medicine.
- 5. That the recommendations of this committee shall be submitted to the Board of Regents by the Chancellor with his recommendations as to their approval or modification.

This recommendation was submitted to the Advisory Council and it had the unanimous approval of the members. Chancellor Hart explained that he thought that this was a program that the University had needed for many years and that it had great possibilities. He also explained that Vice-President Leake had spent a great deal of study and time

coordinating this program.

Upon motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Rockwell, the Board approved the recommendations.

WAIVERS OF MEPOTISM RULE. -- Chancellor Hart recommended that the Nepotism Rule of the Board of Regents be temporarily waived, for the present fiscal year only, so as to authorize and ratify the employment by the Vice-President of the Medical Branch of the following persons as research assistants to be paid out of the grants as indicated:

- 1. Mrs. Belle Ruskin, wife of Dr. Arthur Ruskin, Associate Professor of Internal Medicine, who is working in the Tissue Culture Laboratory on a grant from the U.S. Public Health Service.
- Mrs. Octavia Hall, wife of Dr. C. E. Hall, Associate Professor of Physiology, who is working on a grant from the American Heart Association in the department of Physiology.
- 3. Mrs. Rose Schneider, wife of Dr. Martin Schneider, Professor of Radiology, who is working in the Tissue Culture Laboratory, on a grant from the American Cancer Society.
- 4. Mrs. Mildred Finerty, wife of Dr. John C. Finerty, Associate Professor of Anatomy, who is working in the Tissue Culture Laboratory on a grant from the American Cancer Society.
- 5. Mrs. Beatrice W. D. Engley, wife of Dr. Frank B. Engley, Associate Professor of Bacteriology, who is employed in the Special Surgical Unit on a grant from the U. S. Army.
- 6. Mrs. Elizabeth Varner, wife of Dr. John D. Varner, Instructor in Anatomy, who is working in the Physiology Laboratory on a grant from the U.S. Air Force.

Upon motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the waiving of the Nepotism Rule and also ratified Dr. Leake's action in employing these research assistants.

SCHOOL OF DENTISTRY

POSTGRADUATE SCHOOL OF DENTISTRY.--Chancellor Hart made the following recommendations concerning the "Postgraduate and Graduate School of Dentistry and Stomatology":

- 1. That the name of the "Postgraduate and Graduate School of Dentistry and Stomatology" as adopted at a meeting of the Board of Regents held on March 23, 1945, be changed so that it shall hereafter be "The Postgraduate School of Dentistry" with the understanding that it shall, as heretofore, be a part of the School of Dentistry of The University of Texas.
- 2. That the Dean of the School of Dentistry of The University of Texas be authorized to activate a program of teaching at the Postgraduate School of Dentistry with the understanding that the courses given by this School will be short courses; that any new appointments to the staff of the School of Dentistry to teach in the Postgraduate Schools shall be without tenure; that all the

costs of these courses will be paid out of the fees collected from the students; and that in the case of each course the amount of the fees to be charged and the budget for the course will be submitted for approval by the Chancellor and the Board of Regents.

3. That the Board of Regents approve the giving by the Postgraduate School of Dentistry of a course in Restorative Dentistry Air Brasive Technic, that a tuition fee of approximately \$150.00 for a five-day course of instruction be authorized, and that the budget recommended by the Dean of the School of Dentistry be approved as follows: estimated income from tuition, \$1,500.00; estimated expenditures, salaries for special clinations, \$750.00.

The Board, upon motion by Mr. Rockwell, seconded by Dr. Terrell, approved the recommendations.

M. D. ANDERSON HOSPITAL

SOLICITATIONS OF PRIVATE DONATIONS FOR M. D. ANDERSON HOSPITAL.--Chancellor Hart presented a recommendation that Dr. R. Lee Clark, Jr., be authorized to take steps to raise \$2,000,000 by private philanthropic and popular subscription to completely finish and equip the M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research. It was also recommended that an appropriate foundation be organized with the approval of the Development Board, Anderson Foundation, and Advisory Group in Houston. Upon motion by Mrs. Tobin, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendations made by Chancellor Hart.

HOUSING AMBULATORY NEGRO PATIENTS.--Chancellor Hart recommended that the Board of Regents accept a donation of \$7,000 from "The Service Committee for Negro Patients in the M. D. Anderson Hospital," to be used for the housing of ambulatory negro patients. He also recommended that Dr. R. Lee Clark, Jr., be authorized to proceed with the implementation of a program for housing such patients by renovating, equipping, and operating the building now known as the Nurses' Annex of the Houston Negro Hospital (the use of which is being given to the M. D. Anderson Hospital free of charge). The cost of such a project to be paid wholly out of sums received from private donations. Upon motion by Mrs. Tobin, seconded by Dr. Terrell, the Board approved the recommendations and instructed the Secretary of the Board to write a letter expressing the Board's appreciation for the donation.

SOUTHWESTERN MEDICAL SCHOOL

SITE FOR SOUTHWESTERN MEDICAL SCHOOL.--Chancellor Hart recommended the adoption of the following resolution concerning the title to the land in the City of Dallas conveyed to The University of Texas by the Southwestern Medical Foundation.

In connection with consideration of title to the land in the City of Dallas conveyed to The State of Texas by Southwestern Medical Foundation as a site for Southwestern Medical School, under deed dated August 17, 1949, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas has considered the matter of restrictions as to the use of the property and the existence of various pipe line and other right-of-way easements across the land, and a surface lease expiring January 1, 1953, on 12 to 15 acres in favor of Tom Rogers, all as set out in the Attorney General's Title Opinion No. 49-3450-239, dated September 6, 1949. The Board is satisfied that these easements, lease, and restrictions will not interfere unduly with the use of the tract as a site for the Southwestern Medical School.

The Board has also considered the question of unpaid taxes assessed against the land, concerning which the Southwestern Medical Foundation has tendered an indemnity bond to the State and the Board of Regents. The Board hereby approves said bond and expresses its willingness to accept title to the land under the arrangement proposed by Southwestern Medical Foundation regarding said taxes.

Upon motion by Mr. Swenson, seconded by Mr. Darden, the Board approved the recommendation.

AMENDMENT TO BOARD OF REGENTS' AGREEMENT FOR OFFICE FACIL-ITIES AND SECRETARIAL SERVICES FOR CHAIRMAN WOODWARD.--Chancellor Hart recommended that the Board ratify and confirm an amendment to the rental contract for office facilities and secretarial services of Chairman Woodward in the Kirby Building, Dallas, Texas, providing for payment at the rate of \$175.00 per month, effective January 1, 1951. Upon motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Warren, the Board approved the recommendation.

MAIN UNIVERSITY

ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION FOR EX-STUDENTS'ASSOCIATION. -Upon approval by the Regents' Finance Committee and President Painter,
Chancellor Hart recommended that an additional compensation of
\$2,500 be paid to the Ex-Students' Association. This sum is to be
appropriated from the Unappropriated Balance and is to become effective January 1, and extend through the fiscal year ending August 31,
1951. This additional sum is needed to compensate for the services
which are to be rendered in preparing and maintaining records and
files regarding the Ex-Students of The University of Texas. Upon
motion by Mr. Rockwell, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved
the additional appropriation.

AIR-CONDITIONING OF OFFICES OF REGENTS AND CHANCELLOR. -Chancellor Hart recommended that the firm of Zumwalt and Vinther,
Mechanical Engineers, Dallas, Texas, be employed for the purpose of
making a survey of the possibility of air-conditioning Rooms 203
through 212, inclusive, in the Main Building of the Main University.
He also recommended that the Vice-Chancellor for Business and Finance
be authorized to proceed to purchase, with the approval of the
Chancellor, such of the equipment necessary for this project which
is considered likely to become scarce or critical in view of the
national emergency. Upon motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr.
Swenson, the Board approved the recommendation.

APPOINTMENT OF FOOTBALL COACHES. -- Upon the recommendation of Head Football Coach Edwin V. Price, which has been approved by the Athletic Council, President Painter, and the Regents' Athletic Committee, Chancellor Hart recommended to the Board that the following coaching staff members be reappointed at the salaries listed for the calendar year, 1951.

Mr. H. C. Gilstrap, Co-ordinator of Public Relations and Assistant Football Coach, at \$8,200 per year.

Mr. Eck Curtis, Backfield Coach, at \$7,200 per year.

Mr. J. T. King, Line Coach, at \$7,200 per year.

See Minutes of March 16 and 17, 1951, page 399, for Correction

Mr. Harold N. Jungmichel, "B" Team Coach, at \$5,500 per year.

Chancellor Hart also recommended that the following new appointments be made to the coaching staff, at the salaries listed, for the calendar year, 1951.

Mr. William T. DuBose, End Coach, at \$7,000 per year.

Mr. G. C. Emerson, Freshman Coach, at \$2,750 for the six months, January 1 - June 30, 1951, and \$2,500 for the six months from July 1 - December 31, 1951. After June, 1951, Mr. Emerson and his family will make their residence in and manage Hill Hall Annex (the freshman athletic dormitory) and will take their meals at Hill Hall.

Chancellor Hart further recommended that the salaries of the persons listed above be paid from the funds of the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics. Upon motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Dr. Terrell, the Board approved the recommendations.

OFFICE AND CLASSROOM FURNITURE FOR THREE CLASSROOM BUILD-INGS, PHARMACY BUILDING, JOURNALISM BUILDING, AND SERVICE BUILDING. --Upon approval by President Painter and Vice-Chancellor for Business and Finance, Chancellor Hart recommended that authorization be given to approve plans and specifications for the office and classroom furniture and equipment for the three Classroom Buildings, the Pharmacy Building, the Journalism Building, and the Service Building at the Main University. He also recommended that after such plans and specifications are approved, that the Vice-Chancellor for Business and Finance be authorized to call for bids on such of the furniture and equipment as may be provided for in the approved plans and specifications; such bids to be opened and tabulated in time for the consideration of the Board at the meeting scheduled for March 16 and 17, 1951. The allotment for funds for this equipment is included in the original building contract. Upon motion by Mr. Warren, seconded by Dr. Terrell, the Board approved the recommendations.

PETROLEUM RESEARCH PROGRAM IN COOPERATION WITH TEXAS A. AND M. COLLEGE. -- Chancellor Hart recommended that the Board of Regents appropriate out of the Available Fund for the period February 1, 1951, to August 31, 1951, inclusive, the sum of \$17,500 for the support of the Petroleum Research Program, involving the secondary recovery of oil, in which The University of Texas is engaged in cooperation with Texas A. and M. College. Chancellor Hart explained that should the Legislature appropriate funds for the support of this work from other funds, contributions from the University Available Fund shall cease when such other appropriations become effective. Upon motion by Dr. Terrell, seconded by Mr. Rockwell, the Board approved the recommendation.

REPORT OF FACULTY COUNCIL ENDORSEMENT OF RECOMMENDATIONS BY MAIN UNIVERSITY CHAPTER OF A. A. U. P. FOR SALARY INCREASES, ETC.--Chancellor Hart called the Board's attention that he had submitted to the Regents copies of President Painter's Memorandum of January 15, 1951, transmitting with his comments thereon a Resolution of the Faculty Council of the Main University endorsing a Resolution by The University of Texas Chapter of the American Association of University Professors passed by that body on October 30, 1950. (The Memorandum is on file in the Secretary's Office.) The Resolution requested salary increases, an extension of health service facilities to staff members, increased retirement benefits, the establishment of an oncampus faculty center, supplementation of present group life insurance benefits, and grants to faculty members seeking doctors' degrees at other institutions.

The proposals were discussed in some detail, especially the need for increased faculty salaries. Chairman Woodward stated that it was the earnest hope of the Board, as well as of the Administrative Officers of the University, that the Legislature would grant appropriations in sufficient amounts to enable the University to make salary increases. It was agreed that all of the recommendations were worthy of the most careful study and consideration.

With reference to increased retirement benefits, attention was called to the fact that a constitutional amendment would be required and that such an amendment could only be submitted at a regular session of the Legislature. Such an amendment would necessarily affect all teachers in the public schools of Texas, both higher and lower. Chancellor Hart recommended that the Board of Regents endorse the proposal to increase retirement benefits and authorize cooperation with the State Teachers Association and other groups concerned looking to the submission of an appropriate amendment.

As to the other items contained in the Resolution, the Board, upon motion by Mrs. Tobin, seconded by Mr. Darden, authorized Chairman Woodward to appoint a special committee of five members from the Board or from the teaching staff to give further study to the proposals.

RESIGNATION OF DEAN H. T. PARLIN. -- Chancellor Hart recommended that the Board of Regents accept the resignation of Dean H. T. Parlin, effective as of December 31, 1950, and that in doing so the Board of Regents express the regret which is felt by all of the Administration, Staff and students of The University of Texas that Dr. Parlin's health has made his resignation necessary. Chancellor Hart recommended that the Board of Regents also express on behalf of the entire University appreciation of the distinguished service which Dr. Parlin has rendered to the University for many years and the high regard and sincere affection for him which is felt by all who have known him during his services for the University. Upon motion by Mr. Rockwell, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board adopted the following resolution:

Dr. H. T. Parlin, born in 1879 and a native of Colorado, took his undergraduate and M. A. degrees at the University of Colorado. He received his Ph.D. in the field of English from the University of Pennsylvania in the spring of 1908. Dr. Parlin came to The University of Texas in the fall of 1908 as Instructor of English. In 1913 he was promoted to the rank of Adjunct Professor of English and made Assistant Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. In 1919 he was made an Associate Professor of English but continued to assist Dean H. Y. Benedict in administering the affairs of the College of Arts and Sciences. In 1923 he was given the rank of Professor of English and the title of Junior Dean. In 1928 he became Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences and held this position for twenty-one years after which he was made Consulting Dean (1949-50) and Dean Emeritus (1950-51) when he entered on Modified Service.

During his thirty-six years of service in the Office of the Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, Dr. Parlin was intimately concerned with most of the activities on the Main Campus, and he constantly sought to maintain high scholastic standards and to improve the College of which he was directing head for so long. Perhaps his most notable academic achievement was planning and fostering the Plan II for the B.A. degree. But to the many thousands of students and parents, he is thought of as a kindly, considerate and understanding man who gently, but firmly, guided young people through their undergraduate training. Few men at the University have been more widely known and as greatly beloved by ex-students and alumni as Dr. Parlin. They will all regret, as do the members of our Faculty, that after so many years of faithful and helpful service, he feels compelled to sever his connections with an institution he has served so well.

RESIGNATION OF PROFESSOR FREDERIC DUNCALF. -- Chancellor Hart recommended that the Board accept with regret the resignation of Professor Frederic Duncalf as Professor of Medieval History at the Main University; that in accepting his resignation that the Board of Regents express its appreciation of the faithful and distinguished service of Professor Duncalf in the Faculty of the University and that, in recognition of his long and faithful service to the University, he be given the title of Emeritus Professor of Medieval History. Upon motion by Mrs. Tobin, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the resignation of Dr. Duncalf as of January 31, 1951.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE, DR. STUART A. MACCORKLE.--Chancellor Hart recommended that Dr. Stuart A. MacCorkle, Professor of Government and Director, Institute of Public Affairs, be granted a leave of absence without pay from The University of Texas, beginning February 1, 1951, and extending through August 31, 1951. Dr. MacCorkle is accepting the position as Executive Director of the Texas Economy Commission. Upon motion by Dr. Terrell, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the requested leave of absence.

GIFT TO CREATE A TEXAS JOURNALISM PRIZE FUND. -- Chancellor Hart recommended that the University accept a gift aggregating \$2,100 from an anonymous donor to be used as follows: \$1,000 as an endowment to create a Texas Journalism Prize Fund for girls; \$1,000 to create a Texas Journalism Prize Fund for boys; \$50.00 to be used as a prize for a girl student in Journalism for the year, 1951-52; and \$50.00 to be used as a prize for a boy student in Journalism for the year, 1951-52. Upon motion by Dr. Terrell, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board accepted this gift.

GIFT FOR TEXAS JOURNALISM SCHOLARSHIP. -- Chancellor Hart recommended that the Regents accept a gift from an anonymous donor in the total sum of \$450.00 to be placed in the current cash fund for the Texas Journalism Scholarship Endowment. \$50.00 of this donation is to be used to increase the size of the scholarship to \$200 for the year 1951-52; \$200 is to be used for a scholarship to be awarded for the year 1952-53; and \$200 is to be used for awarding a scholarship for the year 1953-54. Upon motion by Mr. Rockwell, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board accepted this gift.

MEDICAL BRANCH

CONSTRUCTION OF STORAGE BUILDING, MEDICAL BRANCH.--Chancellor Hart, upon approval by Vice-President Leake, recommended that authorization be given to call for bids for the construction of a tilt-slab storage building at the Medical Branch in accordance with the plans and specifications prepared by Mr. Norman Marble, Director of the Physical Plant at the Medical Branch. These plans and specifications have been approved by Mr. Mark Lemmon, Consulting Architect for the University, and Vice-Chancellor Simmons. With the approval of the Sealy and Smith Foundation, it is recommended that the funds necessary for this project, estimated to cost \$28,000, be appropriated from the income from the Special Fund under the Joint Control of the Board of Regents and the Sealy and Smith Foundation. Upon motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendations.

M. D. ANDERSON HOSPITAL

CLERK-OF-THE-WORKS FOR M. D. ANDERSON HOSPITAL. -- Chancellor Hart recommended the employment of Mr. H. B. Freeman of Houston as Clerk-of-the-Works to assist the architects in supervising construction of the M. D. Anderson Hospital project at a salary of \$125 per week, the employment to be on a month-to-month basis. A further recommendation by Chancellor Hart, in which Vice-Chancellor Simmons concurred, is that MacKie and Kamrath be requested to pay the salary of the Clerk-of-the-Works including any social security taxes thereon,

with reimbursement monthly by the University. Upon motion by Dr. Terrell, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendations.

ELECTRIC CONDUIT TO SERVE NEW M. D. ANDERSON HOSPITAL. -Chancellor Hart reported that Houston Lighting and Power Company had
made application for an easement for a right-of-way for an electrical
conduit to serve the new M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research
now under construction in the Texas Medical Center. Chancellor Hart
recommended, and Vice-Chancellor Simmons concurred in the recommendation, that the Board grant the easement and authorize the Chairman
to sign the instrument. Upon motion by Mr. Swenson, seconded by Mrs.
Tobin, the Board approved the granting of the easement.

TEXAS MEDICAL CENTER

DEED TO UNIVERSITY SITE IN TEXAS MEDICAL CENTER .-- Chancellor Hart reported to the Board that the Texas Medical Center Board had now delivered a revised deed conveying to the Board of Regents of The University of Texas title to 21.536 acres of land in the Texas Medical Center. The deed appears to be in satisfactory form. Under the provisions of Chapter 300, Acts, Regular Session, 50th Legislature, the Board was authorized to accept title to land in the Texas Medical Center to be used as sites for the location, operation, and maintenance thereon of the M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research, the Dental College of The University of Texas, a School of Public Health, and a Precipitorial Training Center. Such acceptance, however, as required by the Act is to be predicated upon the written approval of this title by the Attorney General. Chancellor Hart recommended, and Vice-Chancellor Simmons concurred in the recommendation, that receipt of the deed be acknowledged, and referred to the Attorney General. Upon motion by Dr. Terrell, seconded by Mr. Rockwell, the Board approved the recommendation.

MEDICAL BRANCH

KENNETH FRANZHEIM AS ASSOCIATE ARCHITECT FOR ARCADE. -Chancellor Hart recommended for the Medical Committee, that Kenneth
Franzheim be appointed as Associate Architect for the Arcade to connect the Out-Patient Building and the William Keiller Building at
the Medical Branch. This appointment was concurred in by the University Consulting Architect, Vice-Chancellor Simmons and Vice-President
Leake. Upon motion by Dr. Terrell, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the
Board approved the recommendation.

MAIN UNIVERSITY

REPORT ON INVESTIGATION FOR POSSIBILITIES OF PROVIDING ADDITIONAL LADIES REST ROOM FACILITIES AT MEMORIAL STADIUM.--Vice-Chancellor Simmons made a report of his investigation of the possibilities of providing additional Ladies Rest Room facilities at the Memorial Stadium made pursuant to the Board's instructions at the previous meeting. The report included a tabulation of existing facilities and preliminary plans for additional facilities estimated to cost \$37,000.00. The plans, prepared in the Office of the Supervising Architect, provided for two additional large rest rooms for womer and one small room for men. Mr. Simmons explained that these plans were prepared after a conference with Mr. D. X. Bible, Director of Intercollegiate Athletics, and Mr. Ed. Olle, Business Manager, but that they had not been considered by the Athletic Council. Upon motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Warren, the Board voted to submit these plans to the Faculty Building Committee for consideration and in turn to the Regents' Building Committee for recommendations to be brought before the Board at the March meeting.

ISSUANCE OF CHANGE ORDERS, THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS LABORA-TORY UNIT, CASIS SCHOOL.--Chancellor Hart recommended that ViceChancellor Simmons be given authority to issue Change Orders up to \$500 for all contracts combined for the Casis School and The University of Texas Laboratory Unit in connection therewith. The net additional amount to be charged against the Building Project Allotment Account. Upon motion by Mr. Rockwell, seconded by Dr. Terrell, the Board approved the recommendation.

DEDICATION OF THE CASIS ELEMENTARY SCHOOL. -- Chancellor Hart reported that the dedication of the Casis Elementary School would be in March at the time of the meeting of the Board of Regents, and that the Board of Trustees of the Austin Public Schools would like very much to make the dedication of this school a joint dedicatory service. Chairman Woodward requested Chancellor Hart to make the necessary arrangements for the Board to take part in the dedication of this school.

FINAL PAYMENT TO PAGE, SOUTHERLAND, AND PAGE, ARCHITECTS FOR THE CASIS SCHOOL.--Chancellor Hart recommended that Vice-Chancellor Simmons be given authority to make final payment to the various contractors and to Page, Southerland, and Page, architects, for the Casis School and The University of Texas Laboratory Unit in connection therewith, as soon as the architects certify completion of the building in accordance with the plans and specifications. Upon motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendation.

LOW-COST STUDENT HOUSING. -- Chancellor Hart reported that plans and specifications for the low-cost student housing units for women students had been prepared by University Consulting Architect Lemmon and approved by the Faculty Building Committee. It was estimated that each double unit with capacity of thirty-two girls would cost \$108,000. After a general discussion by the Board as to the site proposed for this project and the source of funds, Chairman Woodward recommended that this subject be referred to a special committee. Upon motion by Mr. Warren, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the appointment of the following to the special committee: Mrs. Tobin and two other members of the Board (to be selected by Chairman Woodward) Mr. Rockwell, and Mr. Darden. This committee will report to the Board at the March meeting.

SOUTHWESTERN MEDICAL SCHOOL

GRANT FROM THE WILLIAM BUCHANAN FOUNDATION.--Chairman Woodward reported a grant from The William Buchanan Foundation, to the Southwestern Medical School, in the amount of \$68,768.00 to be used for the purpose of promoting treatment of tuberculosis and related diseases in children at the Ivor O'Connor Morgan Memorial Hospital, Dallas, Texas. Chairman Woodward requested authority to execute the contract on behalf of the Board of Regents, after it has been approved as to content by Vice-Chancellor Simmons, and as to form by Land Attorney Gaines. Upon motion by Dr. Terrell, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board voted to accept the grant and authorized the Chairman to sign the instrument.

LAND COMMITTEE MATTERS .--

LEASE NO. 669, JAY KERR AND SONS.--Vice-Chancellor Simmons presented the following report of the Land Committee:

The Land Committee has given consideration to an application from Jay Kerr and Sons for renewal of Grazing Lease No. 530, covering 103,572 acres of University Land in Hudspeth County, Texas, at an annual rental rate of \$0.10 an acre for a ten-year period beginning July 1, 1951. The old lease, which expires by its terms June 30, 1951, and has been paid in full to that date, is at an annual rental rate of \$0.065 per acre.

The Committee recommends that this lease be granted in accordance with the terms stated and that the Chairman of the Board be authorized to sign the agreement, which is on the University's standard form and has been approved as to form by the University Land Attorney.

Upon motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board adopted the report.

CANCELLATION OF LEASE NO. 545, GRANTING OF LEASE NO. 670, J. E. BAYLOR.--Vice-Chancellor Simmons presented the following report of the Land Committee, which was adopted upon motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Swenson.

The Land Committee has given consideration to an application from J. E. Baylor, holder of Grazing Lease No. 545 covering 165,070.6 acres of land in Hudspeth County, Texas, for the cancellation of the lease effective June 30, 1951, and for the issuance of a new lease covering the same area for a ten-year period beginning July 1, 1951. The present lease expires December 31, 1952, and provides for an annual rental of \$0.075 an acre. The new lease provides for an annual rental at the rate of \$0.10 per acre.

The Committee recommends that the Board of Regents approve the request for cancellation of Lease No. 545 and grant the new lease as described above, with the Chairman of the Board authorized to sign the new agreement and the release as to the lease being cancelled, both of which agreements have been approved as to form by the University Land Attorney.

EASEMENT NO. 467, HUMBLE PIPE LINE COMPANY. -- Vice-Chancellor Simmons presented the following report of the Land Committee:

The Land Committee has had under consideration a proposed Tank Farm Easement to Humble Pipe Line Company covering 9.3 acres of land, more or less, in Section 14, Block 11, University Lands in Reagan County, Texas, for a period of ten years, beginning January 24, 1951, at a rental of \$10.00 an acre a year, payable annually in advance. Consideration for the first year's payment in the amount of \$93.00 has been tendered by the Company.

The Committee recommends that the Board grant this easement and authorize the Chairman of the Board to sign the agreement which has been approved as to form by the University Land Attorney.

Upon motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board adopted the report.

EASEMENT NO. 468, SERVICE PIPE LINE COMPANY. -- Vice-Chancellor Simmons presented the following report of the Land Committee which was adopted upon motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Swenson.

The Land Committee has had under consideration an application from Service Pipe Line Company for renewal of Pipe Line Easement No. 147, covering 2,233-1/3 rods of two-inch pipe line across University lands in Pecos County, Texas, which expires January 31, 1951. The new easement is for a ten-year period beginning February 1, 1951. The rental is at the regular University rate of \$0.25 per rod, payable in full at the beginning of the ten-year period,

and a check for \$558.33, the total cost, has been tendered with the application.

The Committee recommends that the Board grant the easement and authorize the Chairman of the Board to sign the agreement which has been approved as to form by the University Land Attorney.

CANCELLATION OF EASEMENT NO. 258, THE CONTINENTAL SUPPLY COMPANY.--Vice-Chancellor Simmons presented the following report of the Land Committee:

The Land Committee has considered an application from The Continental Supply Company for cancellation of Business Site Easement No. 258, effective February 1, 1951. Rental has been paid through December of 1951, and no refund of rental is to be made.

The Committee recommends that the Board approve the application and authorize the Chairman of the Board to sign the release agreement.

Upon motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board adopted the report.

WATER LEASE CONTRACT NO. 46, AMERADA PETROLEUM CORPORATION. -Vice-Chancellor Simmons reported for the information of the Board and
for official entry in the Minutes, that in accordance with authorization given by the Board of Regents, he had signed and delivered Water
Lease No. 46, to Amerada Petroleum Corporation, granting permission
to use water from Water Well on Block 48, University Lands in Resgan
County, Texas, for the purpose of drilling one oil well on non-University land. Consideration of \$500 has been paid. Upon motion by Dr.
Terrell, seconded by Mr. Warren, the Board ratified and approved the
report.

WATER LEASE CONTRACT NO. 47, STANOLIND OIL AND GAS COMPANY. Vice-Chancellor Simmons reported, for the information of the Board and official entry into the Minutes, that in accordance with authorization given by the Board of Regents he had signed and delivered Water Lease No. 47, to Stanolind Oil and Gas Company granting permission to use water from Stanolind's University of Texas "CC" Lease Well No. 1 for the purpose of drilling one oil well on non-University land. Consideration of \$500 has been paid. Upon motion by Dr. Terrell, seconded by Mr. Warren, the Board ratified and approved the report.

FINANCE COMMITTEE MATTERS .--

PURCHASES FOR THE PERMANENT UNIVERSITY FUND. -- Vice-Chancellor Simmons presented the following report of the Finance Committee:

ANNUAL REPORT ON UNIVERSITY PERMANENT FUND INVESTMENTS AND TRUST AND SPECIAL FUND INVESTMENTS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING AUGUST 31, 1950.—Vice-Chancellor Simmons presented in behalf of the Finance Committee signed copies of the annual report on University Permanent Fund Investments, The University of Texas, for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1950, and the annual report on Trust and Special Fund Investments, The University of Texas, for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1950. On motion by Mrs. Tobin, seconded by Dr. Terrell, the Board approved the reports and ordered them filed in the Office of the Secretary.

TAX-FREE ALCOHOL PERMITS. --With Chancellor Hart's approval, Vice-Chancellor Simmons presented a resolution, granting authority for the handling of tax-free alcohol permits at the Main University and the various other component institutions of The University of Texas. Upon motion by Mr. Rockwell, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board unanimously adopted the resolution as follows:

It is hereby ordered by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas that the following named individuals, or their successors in office, shall perform the respective duties set out below in connection with the tax-free alcohol used for the various component institutions of The University of Texas:

- 1. For the Main University at Austin, Mr. Jack G. Taylor, Business Manager of the Main University, is authorized as the agent of the Board of Regents to sign all documents required in connection with the application for and the issuance of permits for the delivery of tax-free alcohol; and Mr. G. J. Stephens, Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, is authorized to have charge of and be responsible for the supply of alcohol and to sign all reports required as to the use of this alcohol.
- 2. For the Madical Branch at Galveston, Mr. E. N. Cappleman, Business Manager of the Medical Branch, is authorized as the agent of the Board of Regents to sign all documents required in connection with the application for and the issuance of permits for the delivery of tax-free alcohol; and Miss Charlotte Reed Coleman, Director of the Drug Room in the John Sealy Hospital, is authorized to have charge of and be responsible for the supply of alcohol and to sign all reports required as to the use of this alcohol at the Medical Branch (including the School of Medicine, the John Sealy College of

Nursing, and the John Sealy and Affiliated Hospitals including the State Hospital for Crippled and Deformed Children and the Galveston State Psychopathic Hospital).

- 3. For the M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research at Houston, Mr. John Musgrove, Business Manager of the M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research, is authorized as the agent of the Board of Regents to sign all documents required in connection with the application for and the issuance of permits for the delivery of taxfree alcohol; and Miss Anna M. Hanselman, Superintendent of Nursing, is authorized to have charge of and be responsible for the supply of alcohol and to sign all reports required as to the use of this alcohol.
- 4. For the School of Dentistry at Houston, Mrs. Elna Birath, Auditor-Bursar of the School of Dentistry, is authorized as the agent of the Board of Regents to sign all documents required in connection with the application for and the issuance of permits for the delivery of tax-free alcohol; and Miss Erma Louise Navratil, Technician, is authorized to have charge of and be responsible for the supply of alcohol and to sign all reports required as to the use of this alcohol.
- 5. For the Southwestern Medical School at Dallas, Mr. Franklin Hutter, Business Manager of the Southwestern Medical School, is authorized as the agent of the Board of Regents to sign all documents required in connection with the application for and the issuance of permits for the delivery of tax-free alcohol; and Mr. Robert W. Lackey, Professor of Physiology, is authorized to have charge of and be responsible for the supply of alcohol and to sign all reports required as to the use of this alcohol.
- 6. For Texas Western College at El Paso, Mr. A. A. Smith, Business Manager of Texas Western College, is authorized as the agent of the Board of Regents to sign all documents required in connection with the application for and the issuance of permits for the delivery of tax-free alcohol; and Mr. William H. Norman, Assistant Professor of Chemistry, is authorized to have charge of and be responsible for the supply of alcohol and to sign all reports required as to the use of this alcohol.

COTTON RESEARCH COMMITTEE. -- Chairman Woodward submitted to the Board the question of whether by reason of the administrative reorganization of the University with the Chancellor as the Chief Executive Officer the Board might wish to sponsor an amendment to the statute creating the Cotton Research Committee so as to substitute the Chancellor of the University for the President of the University as a member of the Committee, as was done by the A. & M. College Board when their Chancellor system was inaugurated. Following discussion, the Board, upon motion by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Swenson, voted to refer the matter to the Regents' Executive Committee with power to act.

INVITATION TO HOLD THE MARCH MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS IN BEAUMONT, TEXAS. -- Chairman Woodward reported receipt of a letter in which an invitation was extended to the Board of Regents to be guests in Beaumont in March at the same time the Board of Directors of A. & M. College is to hold their meeting. It was felt that under the impending circumstances it would be impossible to accept the invitation. Chairman Woodward instructed the Secretary to express the regret of the Board that the invitation cannot be accepted.

WAIVER OF NEPOTISM, DR. BERTHA DAVIS CLARK. -- Chancellor Hart recommended the Nepotism Rule be waived so as to authorize the appointment of Dr. Bertha Davis Clark, wife of Dr. R. Lee Clark, Jr., Director of the M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research, so that she might serve on the staff of the M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research, without solary, as Anaesthesiologist. Upon motion

by Mr. Darden, seconded by Mr. Swenson, the Board approved the recommendation.

LESLIE WAGGENER, JR., MEMORIAL RESOLUTION.--Chairman Woodward called the attention of the Board to the death of a great friend of the University on January 1, 1951. The Board, upon motion by Mrs. Tobin, seconded by Mr. Swenson, adopted the following resolution in memory of Mr. Leslie Waggener, Jr., appended in the Minutes on Page 280A.

ADJOURNMENT. -- The Board adjourned at 1:20 p.m., until the next meeting of the Board March 16 and 17, 1951.

IN MEMORIAM

Leslie Waggener, Jr.

On January 1, 1951, Leslie Waggener, Jr., died in Dallas, Texas, after suffering an acute heart attack while witnessing the football game between The University of Texas and The University of Tennessee. During nearly all of his life, as at the time of the inception of his fatal illness, he was actively and effectively interested in The University of Texas and its many varied activities.

Leslie Waggener, Sr., came to Texas in 1883, as a member of the first faculty of The University of Texas when it opened, and he brought with him Leslie Waggener, Jr., who was then five years old. Leslie Waggener, Sr., continued his connection with The University of Texas until his death in 1896, serving as Professor of English and History, Chairman of the Faculty, and President ad interim. The University of Texas must therefore have been a very important part of the life of Leslie Waggener, Jr., during his formative years, and the illustrious example of his father must have inspired the son's later service in the cause of the University.

In 1898, two years after his father's death, Leslie Waggener, Jr., received his LL.B. degree from The University of Texas and in the following year entered into the practice of the law in Dallas. He soon became interested in the banking business, and in 1924 he was elected a Vice-president and Director of the Republic Trust and Savings Bank and Director of the Republic National Bank. From that date until his death he served in various capacities with those banks and their successors.

In January, 1931, Leslie Waggener, Jr., was appointed to the Board of Regents of The University of Texas by Governor Ross Sterling. He was reappointed in January, 1937, by Governor James V. Allred, and continued to serve on the Board of Regents until his resignation in March, 1942. His service therefore covered a period of over eleven years, during which the University underwent a remarkable growth in its student body, its faculty, and its physical plant. Because of his service and experience as a lawyer and a banker, he was able to render particularly effective service as Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Board of Regents from 1931 until he became Chairman of the Board in 1941. As Chairman of the Finance Committee, he had direct supervision of the financing of the extensive building program carried out on this campus. His term of service saw the campus transformed from a group of ill-assorted and antiquated buildings and shacks to a carefully planned and architecturally consistent and pleasing physical plant. This program, involving the expenditure of millions of dollars, was carried out with the utmost efficiency and economy, largely due to the tireless efforts of Leslie Waggener, Jr.

Even after he resigned from the Board of Regents, Leslie Waggener, Jr., continued his active interest in University affairs. For example, he was mainly responsible for putting the Texas State Historical Association on a sound basis. Putting aside his reluctance to engage in activities of this kind, involving the solicitation of funds, Leslie Waggener, Jr., assumed the duties of Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee of the Association and raised a publication fund of approximately \$80,000. While the magnitude of the sums involved cannot be compared with the money that he handled as Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Board of Regents, his work with the Texas State Historical Association is another manifestation of his willingness to sacrifice his own personal convenience and wishes for the good of the University, and there can be no doubt that in this respect also his efforts will benefit the University for many years to come.

Throughout his life Leslie Waggener, Jr., has typified the best that is to be expected of a graduate of The University of Texas. He lived a long and useful life, achieving success and distinction in his business and professional efforts. Above and beyond that, he devoted himself unselfishly to public service, when calls were made upon him. We regret his passing, and we honor his memory.

Twenty-four semester hours in the social sciences, including Government 610, History 615, Sociology 310, Psychology 310K or three semester hours in Philosophy; and six semester hours chosen from Economics 302, 303, 314, 315.

Nine semester hours in minor fields, including three semester hours of advanced English, and six semester hours of advanced courses in the following subjects or in combinations of them: Business Administration, Economics, English, Government, History, modern foreign languages, Philosophy, Psychology, Sociology.

Eleven additional semester hours, including Music 302L, Foreign Language 406, Phonetics 403 or Foreign Language 407, and Secretarial Studies 001 (unless one credit in typing is presented upon entering the University).

Ten semester hours of elective courses.

Total requirements: 120 semester hours as outlined above, and Radio 001 and 019 as required.

The Secretary has classified the recommendations as minor legislation and of exclusive application and primary interest to only a single school or college.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE SCHOOL OF LAW

A. That item 9 under Provision IV of the Requirements for Ad s. the School of Law, appearing on page 16 of the School of Law catalogs. 15, be amended to real as set forth below and that another item, number 10, be added as indicated:

"9. Business Writing 320 (Business Correspondence), 221 (Business Report Writing), Finance 354 (Short Term Finance), 364 (Long Term Finance), Management 334 (Industrial Organization); Marketing 337 (Principles of Marketing), Statistics 432 (Business Statistics); and seven additional hours in the College of Business Administration, exclusive of Business Law courses.

"10. Sufficient electives to make a total of ninety-two semester hours of pre-law work. (Through September, 1952, the former item 9 under Provision IV (as shown on page 16 of Law School Catalogue No. 4815) may be used by students who started in College of Business Administration prior to September, 1950.)"

The existing provision is as follows:

"9. Economics 332 (Corporation Finance): Business Writing 320 (Business Correspondence), 221 (Business Report Writing); Statistics 432 (Business Statistics): Marketing 437 (Principles of Marketing); Finance 354 (Short Term Finance), and nine additional hours in business administration; enough electives to make the total of ninety-two hours required for admission to the School of Law."

REASONS: A student seeking admission to the Law School must either have a Bachelor's degree or follow one of several three-year courses of study set forth in the catalogue. One of these courses of study is in the College of Business Administration. It is contemplated, and the Law School catalogue so Bachelor of Business Administration degree after the successful completion of the first year's work in the Law School. Some minor changes have been made degree, and it is the purpose of this amendment to incorporate such changes in the admission requirements to the Law School. The most important change was Industrial Organization, Management 334.

B. That the paragraph at the bottom of page 13 under Requirements for Admission to the School of Law be amended to read as follows (new language

"Applicants for admission to the School of Law must be at least nineteen years of age, must satisfy the general and scholarship requirements for admission to the College of Arts and Sciences (see the General Information bulletin), and must comply with one of the five provisions set forth below, unless the applicant has followed a prescribed

three-year course of study at another college or university in Texas which has been specifically approved by this University as a basis for

REASONS: See statement after C. below.

C. That authority be given the Faculty of the School of Law and the Registrar and Dean of Admissions to approve admission to the Law School on the basis of a three-year course of study at another university differing in some ways from the requirements of one of the three-year programs set forth in the Law School catalogue, provided the same general requirements as to subject-matter, quality and quantity are imposed, and provided such university will award a bachelor's degree to an applicant after completion of all or a part of his work in satisfaction of his Bachelor of Laws degree.

REASONS: In view of the obvious fact that degree requirements and the credit value of courses vary from university to university, it is not reasonable to require the same precise requirements for admission to the Law School as would be required of one who seeks admission to the Law School by following a degree program required by The University of Texas. For example, in some universities Business Statistics is a three-hour course, whereas here it is a four-hour course. Likewise, the physical or biological science requirement for a Bachelor of Arts degree may not be the same at a comparable institution as it is here. The proposal made herein will make it possible to make minor adjustments in admission requirements without sacrifice to any of our principal objectives and without burdening the Faculty Council with the details of some degree plan.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES

The College of Arts and Sciences on November 26, 1950, approved by the circularization procedure the changes in degree requirements published below and recommends that they be approved by the Faculty Council.

Amend the College of Arts and Sciences Catalogue (University of Texas Publication No. 4909, May 1, 1949):

I. Page 70 under the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, Plan II, Senior Year:

A. Change "(a) Philosophy 310 (Introduction to Philosophy) and 327

Reason: Philosophy 327 is no longer being offered.

The Premedical Committee believes it is desirable to give students a choice between Economics 315, General Economic History since 1850 (offered for the first time in 1950-1951); Economics 302, Introduction to Economic Principles (formerly) Economics 312); and Economics 303, Introduction to Economic Problems (formerly Economics 313). Students working toward the B. A. degree, Plan IV, Scheme I would still be permitted to elect Economics 379, Contemporary Economic Problems (prerequisite, senior standing), or to choose either Economics 302 or 303 or 315.

III. Page 75 under Degree of Bachelor of Journalism, "A. Prescribed Work,"
A. Requirement 7

Change "Economics 312 and 313" to read "Economics 302 and 303."

Reason: Economics 312 and 313 are now being offered as freshman courses, Economics 302 and 303.

B. Requirement 8

Change "Six semester hours of advanced courses in one of the following subjects: economics, government, history, or sociology."

To read "Six semester hours of advanced courses in one of the following subjects: economics, education, government, history,

home economics, sociology, or speech."

Explanation: At the present time the degree of Bachelor of Journalism requires, in effect, two minors. The first is a minor in English, with a requirement of eighteen semester hours, six of which must be advanced. The second minor, as described in requirement 8 above, is now limited to those fields of social science which are named. The proposal will permit the student to make a choice for his second minor between a social science and the subjects which have been underlined.

Reason

The Bachelor of Journalism degree program was established at a time when newspaper work was considered the only important avenue for journalism graduates. In the last ten to twenty years the nature of journalism work has broadened considerably to include new areas of communication. English will continue to be recognized as the most important minor for journalism students; similarly, a social science will continue to be recognized as the second most important minor for those students who intend to go into newspaper work. However, since students are now being trained for the teaching of journalism; for specialized writing about fashions, food, and the home; and for radio journalism, the School of Journalism believes it is desirable to provide opportunity in the second minor for further background for these new fields of work.

- IV. Pages 78-79 under Degree of Bachelor of Science in Geology, "A. Prescribed Work,"
 - A. Requirement 9

Change "Government 610, Economics 312 or 313, and six semester hours in United States history (History 615)."

To read "Government 610; Economics 302 or 303 or 315; and six semester hours in United States history (History 615)."

Reason: The Department of Geology believes it is desirable to give students a choice between the new course on the sophomore level, Economics 315 (General Economic History since 1850), and Economics 302 and 303.

Change "Forty-eight semester hours in geology, including the following courses: Geology 601, 314K and 314L or 23, 616, 321K, 321L, 328, and 660 or 661."

To read "Forty-eight semester hours in geology, including the following courses: Geology 601, 310, 314K and 314L (or 23), 616, 321K, 321L, 328, and 660 or 661."

Reason: Geology 310, Elementary Field Geology (given by the camp method and offered during the summer), has been approved as one of several prerequisites to Geology 660 and 661, and is, in effect, a required course. To assist students in checking their requirements, it is desirable wherever possible to specify in the degree requirements a course which is prerequisite to a prescribed course.

V. Page 79 under Degree of Bachelor of Science in Home Economics, Plan I, "A. Prescribed Work" requirement 8:

Change "Enough work to make a total of 120 semester hours."

Reason: Four-semester-hour courses in 121 semester hours."

Also, Applied Mathematics 303 may not be used to satisfy the mathematics requirement for any degree in the College of Arts and Sciences except the degree of Bachelo of Science in Home Economics. It seems advisable to have a uniform requirement, as nearly as possible, in order to avoid the penalty of a loss of credit in mathematics if the student changes majors.

VIII. Page 82 under Degree of Bachelor of Science in Home Economics, Plan II, "3. Costume Design, Textiles, and Clothing Group," in the Sophomore

Change "Psychology 310K" to read "three semester hours elective."

Reason: Psychology 310K is no longer being offered, and sophomore standing is the only prerequisite to Psychology 316, Business Psychology, which is required under the Costume Design, Textiles, and Clothing Group. An additional general elective will enable the student who plans to enter the commercial field to elect a course in business administration or a related area.

IX. Pages 82-83 under Degree of Bachelor of Science in Home Economics, Plan II, Freshman Year, under "5. Teacher Education Group" and "7. Child Development Group"

Change "Speech 305" to read "Three semester hours in speech."

Reason: In the Final Announcement of Courses under Curriculum and Instruction 627H (Methods, Observation, and Student-Teaching in Home Economics) and 627K (Special Methods and Student-Teaching in Nursery School) the following statement appears:

"Before seeking admission to this course, students are expected to meet normally accepted standards of health and speech." Student-Teaching is required under Groups 4, 5, and 7 of Plan II for the B.S. in Home Economics Degree, and Speech 303 (Speech for Prospective Teachers) meets the speech needs of these students. Since Speech 305 is "open only to freshmen," the student who transfers to The University of Texas after the freshmen year is forced to choose a speech course other than Speech 305. The change recommended above makes possible a choice.

Change "six semester hours in speech" (now listed in the freshman year)

THE 1951-52 LONG SESSION CALENDAR (AMENDED AND ADOPTED). The Secretary then moved the adoption of the 1951-52 long session calendar as published (D. & P. 1436). Dean Brogan moved to amend by the inscrtion of Friday, October 5 as "the last day on which graduate students may register and pay fees the first semester" and Monday, February 11, "the last day in which graduate students may register and pay fees the second semester." He explained that in view of the large increase in the number of graduate students some such regulation was highly desirable. There was no similar problem in the summer school since graduate students paid their fees promptly. Long session students however were inclined to delay, Vice-President Dolley thought that the proposed amendment should be adopted, but pointed out that it might work a hardship on the graduate student who for some reason or other was not able to attend until a week or ten days had elapsed. Dean Brogen replied that late thesis registrations could be approved by individual petition and there would be no question of penalties. Mr. Cotner wondered whether the proposed time limit would apply to foreign students. Dean Brogan replied that most of them were allowed to sign promisory notes at the Bursar's Office and register on such a basis. Mr. Cotner said that he had in mind especially the person who came in after a specified date. Dean Brogan answered that such a person could be taken care of by special approval of the dean. The amendment was then adopted, and the calendar as amended approved. In this amended form the calendar is as follows:

That the proceeds from the sale of all books and periodicals published in the past under the Research Aid and Publications Account (4653), go into the University Press Account (6637), with the exception of Byron: The Record of a Quest, published in 1949, and The Plays of Mathan Field, published in 1950. (In accordance with an arrangement concluded between Dean Brogan and the Director of the Press, all net proceeds from the sale of these two titles will go back into the Research Aid and Publications Account.)
- 6. That the proceeds from the sale of books and periodicals in the General Publications, Special Account Fund (6345) go into the University Press account (6637), with the approval of the committee concerned.
- 7. That the Funds now in the General Publications, special Account Fund (6345) be transferred to the University Press Account (6637).
- 8. That the proceeds from sales of books and periodicals published under the Bureau of Research in the Social Sciences account (4164) go into the University Press account (6637). This old account is now inactive.
- 9. That the proceeds from sales of books under the Lindholm Publication Account (6348) go into the University Press account (6637) and the Lindholm Publication Account (6348) in accordance with agreement dated August 24, 1943.

UNIVERSITY PUBLICATIONS (CONTINUED)

- 10. That, in the case of publications in which other bureaus, committees, institutes, or departments have a financial stake, the subject of handling distribution and the disposition of proceeds from sales be made the subject of individual agreements between the Director of the Press and the heads of the departments concerned, subject to the approval of the appropriate committees.
- 11. That the distribution of the new University of Texas Hispanic Studies be handled by the University Press, the proceeds from sales (after the deduction of handling costs) to be returned to Account 6346, Publication of the Hispanic Studies Account.
- 12. That, in the case of publications, the postage on which has formerly been paid out of the Stenographic Bureau's Bulletin Account, the same procedure in regard to the payment of postage be followed in the future. It is also recommended that the postage on the new Hispanic Studies series be paid from this account. However, postage on books published in the future by the University Press should be charged to the University Press account (6637).

FACULTY LEGISLATION: The General Faculty by the circularization procedure on December 20, 1950, adopted a recommendation of the Faculty Council on a revision of the Anti-nepotism rule. A copy of this revision is attached hereto as Appendix A. I recommend approval.

1951 SUMMER SESSION BUDGET: I recommend your approval of the budget for the 1951 Summer Session immediately following this docket, which budget is within the appropriation already made for the Summer Session.

DOCUMENTS AND MINUTES OF THE GENERAL FACULTY

PROPOSED REVISION OF THE ANTI-NEPOTISM RULE

The Faculty Council has filed with the Secretary of the General Faculty a recommendation for the revision of the anti-nepotism rule unanimously adopted by the Faculty Council at its meeting of November 20, 1950. The action was taken upon the recommendation of the Special Committee which had been created by the Faculty Council November 7, 1949 for the study of the anti-nepotism rule. The report of this committee is published below. It recommends that the Rules and Regulations of the Board of Regents for the Government of the University of Texas, 6th edition, Part II, pages 7-9, be amended as indicated. For purposes of comparison, the several paragraphs of the present rule are typed alongside the appropriate section of the proposed new rule. A statement of reasons for the suggested changes and the summary of nepotism regulations at other universities are appended. The Faculty Council amended the recommendations only in two places, namely, at the end of paragraph (1) Part-Time Appointments (Faculty Council D. & P. 1429) and f. (Faculty Council D. & P. 1430). These amendments are indicated by capital letters.

Notice is hereby given that this recommendation will be presented to the Board of Regents for adoption unless signed protests in writing, with reasons, have been received by the Secretary of the General Faculty from ten voting members of the General Faculty within ten days of the date of this publication, in which case the recommendation will be presented to the General Faculty in formal session for decision.

REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE FACULTY COUNCIL

The Faculty Council recommends that the present rule en anti-nepotism be amended as indicated below.

PRESENT RULE

PROPOSED NEW RULE

Sec. 2. Appointment of relatives.-Whenever an appointment is made, either on a full- or part-time basis, it shall be made solely with regard to the special fitness of the appointee, subject to the Penal Code, 1925, Articles 432, 433, 434, 435, and 437, and the Revised Civil Statutes, 1925, Article 5095, and amendments thereto; subject also to a general desire on the part of the Board not to appoint even distant relatives. In accord both with the letter and the spirit of these laws. a relative in the following paragraphs, unless otherwise specifically stated, shall be by definition a person related within the second degree of affinity or the third degree of consanguinity, according to the common law.

Sec. 2. Appointment of relatives .-Whenever an appointment is made, either on a full- or part-time basis, it shall be made solely with regard to the special fitness of the apointee, subject to the Penal Code, 1925, Articles 432, 433, 434, 435, and 437, and the Revised Civil Statutes, 1925 Article 5996, and amendments thereto, subject also to the provisions of the following portions of Sec. 2. Unless otherwise specifically stated, a relative shall be defined as a person related within the first degree of affinity or the second degree of consanguinity, according to the common

Reason: The Committee believes that some relaxation in the rule is desirable and that the elimination of the bar occasioned by relationship in the second degree of affinity and in the third degree of consanguinity would both provide a measure of relaxation in the regulations and a simplification in the operation of the rules.

According to the common law (see Webster's New International Dictionary, Second Edition), the first degree of consanguiatty would be father, son or brother; the second degree, grandfather, grandson, uncle, first cousin or nephew; the third degree, great-grandfather, great-grandson,

The first degree of affinity would include the spouse of the employee, and the parents, children, brothers and sisters of the employee's spouse. The second degree of consanguinity would include the parents, children, brothers and sisters, grandparents, uncles and aunts, first cousins,

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great-uncle, great-uncle's son, second cousin, son of the first cousin, son of the nephew, or brother's grandson. Degrees of affinity are computed the same as those of consanguinity.

nephews and nieces, and grandchildren of the employee.

Reason: It seems best to define degrees of affinity and consanguinity at this point rather than at the end.

(The present rule incorporates restrictions on part-time employment within the general rule.)

(1). Part-time Appointments .-No relative, near or distant, of a member of the Board of Regents, and no relative of an administrative officer concerned or of a person holding a position of Instructor or above in the department concerned may be appointed to a part-time position. No relative of a person holding a position of Instructor or above may be appointed to a part-time position having a monthly salary exceeding the maximum rate paid a Teaching Fellow. RELA-TIONSHIP SHALL NOT BE A BAR TO HONORARY POSITIONS OR TO NON-REMUNERATIVE POSITIONS.

Reason: The Committee feels that the rule should be relaxed to allow certain limited types of part-time appointments of relatives. It does not feel that relatives of administrative officers who must pass on an appointment or of full-time Instructors and above in the department concerned should be appointed. It feels, however, that relatives of those holding a position of Instructor and above should be allowed to hold minor part-time positions in departments other than those directly concerned.

- a. No relative, near or distant, of a member of the Board of Regents will be considered for appointment, but will be considered for reappointment in those cases where the appointment was antecedent to the Board numbership.
- (2). Full-time Appointments. a. No relative, near or distant, of a
 member of the Board of Regents will
 be considered for appointment, but such
 person will be considered for reappointment in those cases where the appointment was antecedent to the Board
 membership.

No change recommended.

- b. No person I shall be initially appointed even temporarily when it is the duty of a relative on the University staff to act in some official capacity upon the appointment, or if a relative is a full professor or an administrative official in the University.
- b. No person shall be initially appointed even temporarily when it is the duty of a relative on the University staff to act in some official capacity upon the appointment.

Reason: The last clause in the present paragraph (b) is felt to be unnecessary because the following paragraph (c) is sufficiently restrictive. Equivalence in salary being regarded as equivalence in rank (see below), paragraph (c) is more restrictive than paragraph (b) as it now stands.

- At the Main University or at the Medical Branch, no person any relative of whom occupies a position of the rank of Instructor or higher (full-or part-time), shall be initially appointed even temporarily to the position of Instructor or higher, or to any position if the relationship is within the first degree of affinity or the second degree of consanguinity; if one position be at the Main University and the other at the Medical Branch, the rule shall apply only to those cases where the relationship is within the first degree of either affinity or consanguinity.
- c. No person, any relative of whom occupies a position of the rank of Instructor or higher at the Main University or one of the other component institutions of The University of Texas, shall be initially appointed even temporarily to the position of Instructor or higher at the Main University or one of the other component institutions.

Reason: This change is recommended in line with the present organization of The University of Texas under the chancellorship system. That portion of the present paragraph dealing with part time appointments is covered in the new paragraph (1) above.

- appointed even temporarily in any department or similar subdivision if he has a relative in that depart ment or subdivision holding the position of Instructor or of higher rank; no person related within the first degree of affinity or the second degree of consanguinity to a person in the University with a salary below that of an Instructor shall be initially appointed even temporarily in the same department or the same subdivision of the University.
- d. No person shall be initially appointed even temporarily in any department or similar subdivision if he has a relative in that department or subdivision holding the position of Instructor or of higher rank.

Reason: This change is recommended in line with the relaxation of the present rule to include only the first degree of affinity and the first and second degrees of consanguinity. It should be noted that (d) differs from (c) in that it bars any full-time appointment of a relative in the same department or similar subdivision regardless of the salary of the nominee provided his relative holds a position of Instructor or higher.

- e. Relationship brought about by marriage after appointment is no bar to continuance of employment, except that if a person of the rank of Instructor or higher marries another employee (after August 31, 1936), both positions may not be retained beyond the current fiscal year. Relationship brought about by marriage before September 1, 1935, shall be no ber to continued service. The marriage of a staff member to a person the is not a staff member but "no is a relative of a staff member shall have no effect on either tenure or promotion.
- e. In the case of appointments barred by the above regulation, relationship brought about by marriage after appointment is no bar to continuance of employment, except that if a person of the rank of Instructor or higher marries anot er employee after August 31, 1935, both positions may not be retained beyond the current fiscal year. Relationship brought about by marriage before September 1, 1936, shall be no bar to continued service. The marriage of a staff member to a person who is not a staff member but Tho is a relative of a staff member shall have no effect on either tenure or promotion.

Reason: The addition of the initial phrase is necessary in order to avoid unduly penalizing people who marry after appointment. It is the intention of (e) merely to cause the regulations to apply as of the end of the fiscal year in which marriage occurs.

- f. Relationship shall not be a bar to an honorary hon-remunerative position.
- f Relationship shall not be a bar to honorary POSITIONS OR TO non-remunerative positions.

Reason: The change of wording somewhat relaxes the present-restriction. Notall honorary positions are non-remunerative and not all non-remunerative positions are necessarily regarded as honorary positions.

The provisions just listed shall apply to all positions on the University staff, equivalence in salary being regarded as equivalence in rank.

The provisions of the anti-nepotism rule apply to all programs administered under the Board of Regents, equivalence in salary being regarded as equivalence in rank.

No change recommended

For the purpose of administering these provisions, an employee "occupies" his position from the date at which his employment begins—until his connection with the Institution is formally terminated. This

No change recommended.

The President, acting upon affirma. tive advice from the Administrative Council of the Main University or the Faculty and Admissions Committee of the Medical Branch, in each case is authorized to suspend the above regulations in an emergency, the suspension in no case to extend beyond the end of the current fiscal year. In extraordinary cases where the interest of the University will be best served thereby, the Board of Regents may by a recorded unanimous vote of all members present suspend the rule except as to the appointment of any relative of a Regent or the President.

The President of the Main University or other institutional head, acting upon affirmative advice from the Administrative Council of the Main University or the corresponding committee at any component institution respectively, in each case, is authorized to suspend the above regulations in an emergency, the suspension in no case to extend beyond the end of the current fiscal year. In extraordinary cases where the interest of the University will be best served thereby, the Board of Regents may suspend the rule except as to the appointment of any relative of a Regent, the Chancellor, the President of the Main University or the head of any component institution.

Reason: The University of Texas now being under the new organizational arrangement, this particular paragraph is definitive only for the Main University. Presumably some body at the other branches equivalent to the Administrative Council at the Main University may be authorized by the Board of Regents to act in a similar capacity.

The final sentence of this paragraph places action of the Board of Regents in suspending its rule in the same category as any similar actions of the Board.

APPENDIX A

Anti-Nepotism Regulations in Effect at Other Universities

Indiana University

In the same School or College, relationship in the first or second degree of consanguinity or affinity is a bar to employment except for part-time student positions. The regulation is independent of the rank of the individuals.

There are no nepotism restrictions affecting positions in different functional units of the University.

The University of California

There are no nepotism restrictions on academic appointments.

For non-academic employees in the same department or division, no relatives are permitted within the first or second degree.

University of Illinois

There are no specific rules regarding nepotism. The policy is not to appoint other faculty individuals closely related by blood or marriage to persons already in the University service. The policy does not apply to graduate students working part-time as assistants or to any type of part-time undergraduate student employment.

The University of Kansas

No two or more members related in the first degree are employed in any capacity unless the appointments be on a temporary basis.

University of Michigan

There are no fermal nepotism restrictions. However, relatives are not ordinarily appointed on the teaching staff of the same department or associated units. Marriage after appointment is no bar to continuance. University of Minnesota No more than one member of a family related in the first or second degree of consanguinity or the first degree of affinity may be appointed on a temporary or a permanent capacity without specific approval of the Board.

The regulation does not apply to those who are primarily students or to those positions which are difficult to fill because of the location of the work.

University of Missouri
No relative of the Board of Regents may be employed.

No person related within the first or second degree of consanguinity or affinity to any member of the staff may be employed except in the case of graduate nurses and students living outside Columbia or Rolla who make less than \$55 per month.

The University of Nebraska
No more than one member of a family related in the first or second degree may
be employed in a single department or functional working unit.

No member of the family of the Board, Chancellor, Business Manager, Dean or Director may be employed.

The regulation does not apply to those who are primarily students.

The University of North Carolina
There are no nepotism regulations.

The Ohio State University
There are no nepotism regulations.

University of Pennsylvania
There are no nepotism regulations. In general, however, more than one member of the same family is not employed in one department.

University of Virginia
There are no nepotism regulations.

The University of Wisconsin

There are no nepotism regulations. The University feels, however, that close relatives should not be employed in the same department or in closely allied lines of work or where one relative has administrative responsibility for the work of the other relative.

Simmons, Vice-Chancellor for Business and Finance, to call for competitive bids for refunding the \$578,000 dormitory bonds of the issue, "Board of Regents of the University of Texas, College of Mines and Metallurgy, Dormitory Revenue Bonds, Series 1946." The above includes the authority to do all things necessary to effect the refunding of the bonds, including among other things, the advertising for competitive bids for the refunding bonds, establishing the terms of the refunding bonds, opening the bids for the refunding bonds and accepting or rejecting any or all of said bids, selection of bond counsel, and calling for redemption the outstanding bonds of the original issue.
