Mrs. Devall and Gentlemen:

The dockets prepared by the component institutions listed below are herewith submitted, with my recommendation for approval, for consideration at the meeting of the Board of Regents in Austin on March 11 and 12, 1960:

Listed below are Central Administration items which I recommend be approved.

#### 1959-60 Budget

Office of the Board of Regents

1. Change the salary rate of Miss Betty Anne Thedford, Secretary of the Board of Regents, from \$6,168 to \$6,780 for 12 months, effective February 1, 1960, the additional funds to come from Central Administration Unallocated Account (No. 80250). (Recommended by Academic and Developmental Affairs Committee and approved by the Committee of the Whole on March 11, 1960)

#### Office of the President

- 2. Change the appointment of Mr. Lanier Cox, Vice-President for Administrative Services; Professor of Business Law, from two-thirds to full time for the period February 1 June 10, 1960, the additional \$1,685 needed to come from Central Administration Unallocated Account (No. 80250). His appointment in the Department of Business Services on a one-third time basis will be cancelled for this period.
- 3. Change the appointment of Mr. Frank D. Graydon, Budget Officer; Associate Professor of Accounting, from two-thirds to full time for the period February 1 June 10, 1960, the additional \$1,123 needed to come from Central Administration Unallocated Account (No. 80250). His appointment in the Department of Accounting on a one-third time basis will be cancelled for this period.
- 4. Change the salary rate of Mrs. Henrietta Jacobsen, Executive Assistant, from \$6,168 to \$6,780 for twelve months, effective February 1, 1960, additional funds to come from Central Administration Unallocated Account (No. 80250). This increase is folly merited by the effectiveness of this employee and is reasonable at this time to meet the competition of an even higher salary offer.

CLASSIFIED PERSONNEL PAY PLAN: The position of Assistant Land and Trust Attorney was dropped from the 1959-60 budget, since no one was appointed to fill that position after the transfer of Mr. Burnell Waldrep to the position of Land and Trust Attorney, effective October 1, 1958. With the approval of Vice-President Dolley, Mr. Waldrep now requests the services of an assistant, preferably a young man with at least five years of experience in legal work with a state agency such as the Land Office or the Attorney General's Office. The current Appropriation Bill indicates that persons of similar qualifications in the

Attorney General's Office are paid in a salary range having a maximum of \$8,000 per year. Mr. Waldrep feels that a beginning salary of \$6,468 is sufficient to attract the type of individual he needs. Accordingly, I recommend that the classification for Assistant Land and Trust Attorney be changed as follows:

1. Mr. C. R. Smith, New York City, has sent \$1,000 "for some worthy pur pose." The money has been deposited to the Office of the President account, Various Donors - Various Purposes.

PROXY DESIGNATION: A proxy designation signed by President Logan Wilson has been sent to President Law Sone, Trustee of the Sells Estate, naming My Page Mr. Joe C. Thompson as the University's "true and lawful Attorney, to represent it and to vote its shares of stock in said Corporation at the next Annual Meeting of the share holders of such Corporation, to be held . . . in Dallas, Texas on the 29th day of February, 1960."

Mr. Thompson was named to replace Mr. J. Lee Johnson, III, as a member on the Board of Directors of Sells Petroleum, Inc., at the November, 1959, meeting of the Board.

MAIN UNIVERSITY - APPROVAL OF SALARY INCREASE IN EXCESS OF \$1,000 PER YEAR: Dr. Gordon V. Anderson, Director of Testing and Counseling Center, has forwarded, with the approval of Dean H. Y. McCown, a request to change the title and to increase the salary rate of Dr. Henry Paul Kelley, Psychologist III (Testing) and Assistant Professor of Educational Psychology. Dr. Kelley's present twelve month salary rate is \$8,160, with \$2,040 of this amount coming from the Department of Educational Psychology where he is teaching on a one-third time basis for the Long Session. The recommendation is to change his title to Coordinator of Measurements and Statistical Services; Assistant Professor of Educational Psychology at a twelve month stipend of \$9,200, removing him from the classified program, effective March 1, 1960. His teaching rate on this basis will be \$6,900 for 9 months, to which the Department of Educational Psychology and Dean of College of Education agree.



Dr. Kelley has recently been offered an appointment as research associate with the Educational Testing Service in Princton, New Jersey, with an annual salary of \$10,500, and moving expenses paid. Both Dr. Anderson and Dean McCown say that Dr. Kelley is an outstanding test man, teacher, and researcher, and it would not be possible to attract a person of his qualifications with the recommended salary.

I concur in Dr. Ransom's recommendation that this increase be approved, additional funds to come from Unallocated Salaries - Main University.

FACULTY LEGISLATION: I recommend approval of the following legislation passed by the Faculty Council and/or General Faculty:

1. The Faculty Council on January 13, 1960, approved by the circularization procedure the proposal to add the following (underscored) additional requirement for admission to the College of Pharmacy (D&P 2792):

A student may not be admitted to the College of Pharmacy by individual approval. A student may not enter the first professional year in the College of Pharmacy on scholastic probation.

Reason: With the expected increase in enrollment in the College of Pharmacy affecting the facilities of the College, it is felt that no students should be permitted to enter the first professional year in the five-year program which becomes effective after April 1, 1960, with a handicap of scholastic probation.

2. On January 16, 1960, the Faculty Council approved by the circularization procedure the proposals for Honors Programs in the School of Architecture and the College of Business Administration (D&P 7462).

Each Honors Program requires the student to comply with existing degree requirements and programs. The Honors Program in Architecture merely permits the substitution of a senior tutorial course for one of several other specific courses and requires an over-all 2.0 average. The Honors Program in Business Administration requires selection by a faculty committee and registration in special honors sections of required courses and a senior seminar course.

3. On February 9, 1960, the General Faculty approved by the circularization procedure the recommendations of the Faculty Council in regard to the proposal to change the rules on dropping courses (G. F. Minutes 7462).

The present rule, with changes proposed underlined, is set out below:

Dropping courses. -- Subject to the minimum number of hours permitted by the Quantity of Work Rule, a student may, for good cause, drop a course under the following provisions:

- 1. A student may, with the approval of his adviser, the chairman of the department concerned, and his dean, drop a course at any time during the first four weeks of classwork of any semester, or during the first two weeks of classwork of any summer session, without having grade recorded . . .
- 2. With the approval of his instructor, his adviser, and his dean, a student registered in an undergraduate . . .
  - 3. After the first four weeks of classwork of any semester, or after the first two weeks of any summer session, a dean . . .

The rule now in effect allows six weeks in Long Session and three weeks in summer session. Shortening the time in which courses can be dropped without penalty will have the effect of causing the students to study more seriously at the beginning of the term and raise their over-allacademic performance.

SAIARY INCREASE IN EXCESS OF \$1,000 PER YEAR: Dr. Roger Williams, Director of Clayton Foundation Biochemical Institute, has recommended that the salary of Dr. Charles Gordon Skinner, Research Scientist V, Clayton Foundation Biochemical Institute, be increased from \$7,800 to \$9,240 on a twelve months basis, effective March 1, 1960. In behalf of this increase Dr. William points out that Dr. Skinner has received an offer of a position at \$10,500 per year from the Lasdon Foundation, Inc., Colorado Springs, Colorado. He states further that Dr. Skinner, who has been with the Institute seven years, has published many articles and that he fills a very special need in their program. I recommend approval of this increase, the funds to come from Clayton Foundation grant. (539)



OUTSIDE AND ADDITIONAL DUTIES: I recommend that the staff members listed be permitted to undertake the outside and additional duties outlined, the work to be performed so as not to interfere with University assignments:

- 1. Mr. Robert L. Grinaker, Associate Professor, and Mr. Robert E. Seiler, Assistant Professor, both of the Department of Accounting, to undertake the annual audit of The University Co-Op beginning with the fiscal year 1960.
- 2. Mr. K. H. Jehn, Assistant Professor of Meteorology, to do consulting work.
- 3. Mr. E. W. Cundiff, Professor of Marketing, to act as consultant to Product Research Institute, Inc.

MILITARY LEAVE: I recommend that Dr. A. H. Moehlman, Professor of the History and Philosophy of Education, be granted military leave for the period January 22-February 6, 1960.

DISCONTINUANCE OF CLIFF COURTS AND AUTHORIZATION TO SELL THE CLIFF COURT HUTMENTS: The Business Manager, the Manager of Men's Residence Halls, and the Director of Housing and Food Service recommend that Cliff Courts not be continued in service beyond August 31, 1960. Mr. Landrum, Business Manager, points out that these facilities were constructed in 1946 as temporary, emergency, low-cost housing for veterans of World War II, with the expectation of using them for about ten years. About five years ago major repairs were made, but the present condition is such that they are no longer acceptable temporary, low-cost housing. Of the 120 available spaces, approximately half are filled, which means the units are not being operated on a break-even basis.

I concur in this recommendation and recommend further that the Business Manager be authorized to advertise the 33 Cliff Court hutments for sale, award contracts to the highest bidder, and have these units removed from University property.

SALE OF UNIVERSITY PROPERTY TO STAFF MEMBER: The University Purchasing Office on February 11 advertised for sale a 1950 Chevrolet sedan which had been operated by the Defense Research Laboratory. The high bid of \$352.00 (out of fourteen) was submitted by Mr. Spurgeon E. Smith, an employee of The University of Texas. I recommend that approval be given for Mr. Smith to purchase the car, the proceeds of the sale to be credited to the Car Depreciation account of Defense Research Laboratory.

ACCEPTANCE OF LOAN FUNDS: I recommend acceptance of \$1,600 from the Engineers Loan Fund, Mr. Banks McLaurin, Chairman, for the Reserve Matching Funds - National Defense Student Loan Funds. Recipients of the loans will be informed that local matching funds were provided by the Engineers Fund, and when the National Defense Student Loan program is terminated, the amount of the loan with earned interest will be returned to the Engineers Fund.

CIASSIFIED PAY PIAN: I recommend approval of the following additions to Classified  $\overline{Pay}$  Plan:




