The following changes affecting Central Administration budgetary and fiscal operations are recommended for ratification or approval, as appropriate, by the Board of Regents:

RECOMMENDED AMENDMENTS TO THE 1964-65 CENTRAL ADMINISTRATION BUDGET

Office of the Chancellor

1. Transfer \$1,800 from the Central Administration Unallocated Account to the Institutional Membership Dues Account in the Chancellor's Office. Additional funds were required for payment of dues to the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges, Council on Medical Television, and the Council of Southern Universities. (RBC 109)

2. Increase the salary of J. Robert Morris, Clerk-of-the-Works, from \$7,200 to \$7,800 for twelve months (payable on a month-to-month basis) effective June 1, 1965. Source of funds: Plant Funds Account - Architectural Supervision, New Geology Building. (RBC 119)

University News and Information Service

3. Transfer \$650 from the Central Administration Unallocated Account and \$350 from the News and Information Service Clerical Assistants and Reporters Account to Maintenance and Equipment. Additional funds were needed for operation during the remainder of the fiscal year. (RBC 101 and 114)

AMERICAN UNIVERSITY PUBLISHERS' GROUP: The University of Texas Press in conjunction with other Universities of the United States wishes to establish a joint London office for the sale and warehousing of books in Great Britain. To accomplish this it is recommended that the University of Texas Press form a limited liability corporation under the Great Britain Companies Act of 1948 to be known as the University of Texas Press, Ltd. There are no state funds involved and no commitment of funds other than the proceeds from the sale of books. The matter was referred to the University attorney who sees no legal problems.

At present the University Press has no sales representation in Great Britain or on the Continent except through a New York export house controlled by Doubleday. Establishment of the corporation will make it possible for our books to be published under the imprint "University of Texas Press, Austin and London," which means that they will be listed in all the booklisting media and library selling tools in Great Britain, reviewed by British media, and introduced systematically into British (and later European) bookstores. There will be three directors of the British company: the Director of the Press, the Business Manager of Main University, and the Chairman of the Faculty Advisory Board of the Press.

Other University presses committed to participation in the London office are Wisconsin, Indiana, Illinois, Washington, Pennsylvania State, and Notre Dame. Three more may join shortly. If there are only seven presses included, the cost will be \$4,000 each per year for a three-year trial period; if ten, the cost will drop to \$3,000.

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FACULTY LEGISLATION: The following legislation has been passed by the General Faculty and/or Faculty Council. I recommend approval.

1. The Faculty Council on May 10, 1965, approved by the circularization procedure the proposal to revise the degree programs of the School of Architecture (D&P 3493-3500).

This legislation rearranges some courses and makes some required substitutions which change slightly the required semester hours for the various degrees as follows:

A student in the College of Arts and Sciences who completes certain prescribed courses in Arts and Sciences (i. e. , English, foreign languages, mathematics, history, government, physics, philosophy, etc.) as well as some prescribed architecture courses, under the new legislation needs only 53 semester hours (instead of 55) in the professional requirements in the School of Architecture, thereby lowering from 128 to 126 the total hours to receive the Bachelor of Science in Architectural Studies from the College of Arts and Sciences .

In the six year professional course for the Bachelor of Architecture Degree, the total semester hours are changed from 64 to 63 in addition to the 126 (changed from 128 as above) required for the Bachelor of Science in Architectural Studies, thereby lowering from 192 to 189 the total semester hours required for the degree. This is a two year program beyond the Arts and Sciences degree for the professional degree in Architecture.

In the five year professional course for the Bachelor of Architecture (where the student enters the School of Architecture as a freshman), the total semester hours are changed from a total of 160 to 161.

ROTC courses continue to be applied up to a total of 9 hours (formerly 10 were allowed in the five year course) but only if the ROTC student has completed 24 semester hours of required military or naval sciences courses and receives his commission in one of the services.

The School cites the following reason for these changes:

"The foregoing revisions are recommended to update the curriculum as reviewed and approved by the Architecture Faculty December 18, 1964, and to meet some of the recommendations of the National Architectural Accreditation Board. The revision will better correlate courses in the Five and Six Year Programs being offered concurrently by the School of Architecture. The combining of several courses enables additional hours than can be assigned to liberal arts electives. "

2. The Faculty Council at its meeting of May 17, 1965, approved the changes in the Engineering Degree Plans (D&P 3501-3515) as follows:

In all the degree plans there are rearrangements and substitutions in courses but with no change in any of the plans in the number of semester hours of coursework in the humanities. In the following plans there are some changes in the total semester hours of coursework for the plan as a whole: Plan 2 (Leading to the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Architectural Engineering), from 137 to 130; Plan 3 (Leading to the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Chemical Engineering), from 135 to 128; Plan 6 (Leading to the Degree of Bachelor of Engineering Science), from 131 to 128; and Plan 8 (Leading to the Degree of Bachelor of Science in

Petroleum Engineering, from 138 to 128.

The others remain at the same total semester hour requirement, to-wit, 136: Plan 1 (Leading to the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Aerospace Engineering), Plan 4 (Leading to the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Civil Engineering), Plan 5 (Leading to the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering), and Plan 7 (Leading to the Degree of Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering).

The College of Engineering states that the changes to be incorporated in the 1966-68 Catalogue are desirable in order to bring current catalogue materials in line with current and proposed course offerings that are designed to enhance the engineering degree program.

OUTSIDE EMPLOYMENT: I recommend that the persons listed below be permitted to undertake the outside duties specified for each, the work to be arranged so as not to interfere with University assignments and otherwise to conform to Chapter III, Sec. 13, of Part I of the Rules and Regulations of the Board of Regents for the Government of The University of Texas:

*Merit Supplement
Rules*

1. Mr. James H. Sledd, Professor of English, to act as academic editor in the fields of high school and college English for Scott, Foresman and Company.
2. Mr. Peter J. Riley, Assistant Professor of Physics, to perform consulting services for Texas Nuclear Corporation.
3. Mr. Keith E. Morrison, Professor of Law, to prepare a legal memorandum for a Dallas law firm.

ESTABLISHMENT OF AGENCY FUNDS: I recommend approval of the establishment of the following agency funds:

1. Approximately twenty universities with major commitments in the field of Latin American research have agreed to support and produce a review newsletter entitled Latin American Research: A Review of Current Social and Cultural Studies. On recommendation of the Office of the Business Manager, the contributions from the universities, totalling approximately \$20,000 for the first year (and a like amount for a second year), are to be held in an agency account for financing the printing and attendant clerical costs of preparing and distributing the journal. An allocation roughly similar to the inter-university contribution is expected from the Ford Foundation specifically to cover the preparation of copy and editing of the journal over the first two years, and this will be handled in the customary fashion as a current restricted account. In presenting this matter, Dr. Harrison, Director of Latin American Institute, writes in part:

"It is understood that the constitution of the agency fund in no way constitutes a commitment of The University of Texas to underwrite in any fashion this project. As a matter of fact, the contribution of The University of Texas in large part terminates with the establishment of the special board which it has

been instrumental in creating and which constitutes a singular step in the advancement of inter-university cooperation in the Latin American field. We trust that you and the Board of Regents will approve this course of action and will, like ourselves, take pride in the fact that this significant new organization has been established and will take its first steps at The University of Texas.

"This major effort is an integral part of the ILAS program to make The University of Texas a preeminent center of Latin American studies in the United States."

2. Professor Orville Wyss is chairman for Scientific Planning and Evaluation for Biological Sciences under the National Institute of General Medical Sciences for the next three years. He will administer \$50,000 per year of NIH funds for the payment of expenses of advisory committees in this area. From this fund he is entitled to pay for a half-time secretary and he wishes this portion of the fund set up in an agency account on the University books since the secretary has another half-time position at the University, and this will eliminate Professor Wyss' having to keep payroll and O. A. S. I. records. This has been approved by the Vice-Chancellor subject to review in one year.

TRAVEL PAID FROM NON-TRAVEL FUNDS: The following travel has been approved with payment from funds as indicated which are not specifically marked for travel:

1. Mr. Wilbourn McNutt, Staff Writer, News and Information, May 5-7, 1965, and June 16-18, 1965, to Galveston-Houston, for interviews with faculty for purpose of writing science news releases, and June 2-6, 1965, to Marfa, Texas and McDonald Observatory, to accompany Professor John Wilson on field trip for purpose of taking pictures and writing news releases concerning his research, and to visit McDonald Observatory for same purpose, expenses for all trips to be paid from Miscellaneous Administrative Expenses, Office of the Vice-Chancellor for Academic Affairs.
2. Mr. Joseph C. Kennedy, Director, University Personnel Office, June 27-July 4, 1965, to San Jose, California, to attend the IBM School "Ex-55 Executive Introduction to EDF Systems (1400 series)," with expenses paid from the Maintenance and Operation account of the Personnel Office.
3. Mr. John A. Wilson, Professor of Geology, May 17-19, 1965, to Chicago, Illinois, to have primate skull x-rayed at the Chicago Natural History Museum, expenses to be paid from URI Project assigned to him.
4. Mr. Harry L. Johnson, Associate Professor of Finance, May 24-June 4, 1965, to Birmingham, Alabama, to negotiate for research in connection with the Business Administration Research Program, expenses to be paid from Excellence Funds assigned to Business Administration: College-Wide Research Program.

5. Mr. Ben M. Harris, Associate Professor of Educational Administration, February 1-28, 1965, to travel to Brownsville, Harlingen, League City, and Hitchcock, Texas, in connection with the Educational Administration School Principalship Project, a small portion of the travel to be paid from the Maintenance and Operation account of the Department of Educational Administration.
6. Mr. Archie W. Straiton, Professor of Electrical Engineering, June 18-20, 1965, to Tallahassee, Florida, to attend meeting of Board of Directors of the Gulf Universities Research Corporation, expenses to be paid from Miscellaneous Administrative Expenses.
7. Mr. W. R. Upthegrove, Professor of Mechanical Engineering, June 13-24, 1965, to New York City, Ann Arbor, Michigan, and Chicago, Illinois, to attend professional meetings in each place as well as to undertake faculty recruitment and discuss and study curricula innovations for purpose of adaptation at the University, part of the expenses to be paid from URI Project.
8. Mr. W. Gordon Whaley, Dean of the Graduate School, March 16-19, 1965, to Washington, D. C., to participate in a committee meeting of the Academy of Science - National Research Council for the purpose of evaluating a portion of the National Institutes of Health program, and to Charlottesville, Virginia, to participate, at the request of Chancellor Ransom, in a meeting of the Council of Southern Universities where matters pertinent to education in the universities located in the South were discussed, the latter trip to be paid from Miscellaneous Administrative Expenses.

NATIONAL DEFENSE STUDENT LOAN PROGRAM FOR 1965-66: The Department of Health, Education, and Welfare has advised that the full request of the University for a total of \$256,500 has been approved, subject to approval by Congress of an appropriation of \$179,300,000. The University will need to match this grant up to one-ninth. From the present national allotment, a firm commitment to the University of \$49,363 has been made.

This fund is administered at the University by the Student Financial Aids Office. During 1964-5, a total of \$351,050 was lent to students, this amount being made up of an approximate \$250,000 from HEW, matching University funds, and repayments in the neighborhood of \$75,000.

HOUSING AND FOOD SERVICE PROGRAM FOR ATHLETES IN MOORE-HILL HALL: In 1955, with the opening of Moore Hall, the Board of Regents approved a new program for the housing and feeding of athletes, the primary points of which are as follows:

1. Moore-Hill Hall housing program was to be operated as one unit under the management of the Division of Housing and Food Service - Men's Residence Halls, with the athletes to be interspersed in the dormitory with other students.
2. The Athletics Department was to continue to operate the Hill Hall food service program, the manager's apartment in Hill Hall and the lecture room in the basement of Moore Hall, all of which construction had been paid for by the Athletics Council.

3. The Athletics Department was to be allowed to rent a maximum of 180 man spaces (changed to 200 in 1957) in Moore-Hill Hall at a rental rate of \$135.00 per person per semester, the same rate paid by individual students.
4. The Division of Housing and Food Service was to pay all operating costs of Hill Hall just as for Moore Hall and, in addition, was to pay to the Athletic Council a rental fee of \$7,500.00 for Hill Hall for the 9 months' period.

The following changes are recommended effective September, 1965, which have the approval of the Department of Athletics, the Housing and Food Service Division, and the Business Manager. I concur and recommend approval.

1. Increase the maximum number of athletic spaces in Moore-Hill Hall from 200 to 212 by increasing the capacity of the dormitory from 403 to 415 spaces. These 12 additional spaces will be provided by the Athletics Department in releasing space previously used for other purposes. These spaces are as follows:
 - a. Lecture room in basement of Moore Hall - 3 double rooms for six men.
 - b. Apartment in Hill Hall - 2 double rooms for four men.
 - c. Apartment adjoining Hill Hall dining area - 2 single rooms for two men.
2. The Athletics Department will pay for the remodeling and furnishing of these rooms. The Division of Housing and Food Service will draw the specifications and purchase the furniture as requested by the Athletics Department, with the bill to be paid by that department.
3. The yearly rental payment to be made by the Division of Housing and Food Service - Men's Residence Halls, for the use of Hill Hall will be increased from \$7,500.00 to \$8,500.00 for 9 months' operation.
4. By August 1 of each year the Athletics Department will notify the Division of Housing and Food Service of the exact number of the 212 spaces to be used for athletes. The Athletics Department will pay for this number of spaces for the Fall Semester at the rate of \$135.00 per student per semester and will guarantee for the Spring Semester the same number, less 20 man spaces.
5. The Division of Housing and Food Service assumes responsibility for the operation of the Hill Hall food service program for feeding of athletes. This program will be operated under the management of the Manager of Men's Residence Halls and will be supervised by the Division of Housing and Food Service in the same manner as are all other departments in the Division.

6. An account will be established for the operation of the Hill Hall food service program with the money to be furnished by the Athletics Department. The Division of Housing and Food Service - Men's Residence Halls, will manage the unit to the best of its ability, including hiring of employees, purchasing of food and supplies, payment of bills and approval of vouchers. A monthly operating statement of income and expenditures will be furnished to the Athletics Department by the Division of Housing and Food Service. A pro rata cost of the Division of Housing and Food Service central office and of the Men's Residence Halls office will be included in the Hill Hall food service operating costs.

BUSINESS CONTRACTS: I recommend approval of the following amendment to the contract dated August 15, 1963, between the Neelley Vending Company and Campus Services, Inc., effective July 1, 1965. Item 4 of the schedule of commission rates as it appears in article 4 is changed so that the cost of a pack of cigarettes will be 40 cents with the commission 5-1/2 cents per pack through December 29, 1965, and 5-3/4 cents thereafter. Business Manager James H. Colvin has signed this amendment and explains that on July 1, 1965, the state tax on cigarettes increased 3 cents per pack and since August 15, 1963, the wholesale price on cigarettes, as reported by Campus Services, Inc., has increased 7/10 cents per pack. Under the 1963 agreement cigarettes were sold through the vending machines for 35 cents per pack, the commission being 5 cents.

Set out below are the recommendations of Business Manager James H. Colvin in regard to contracts for the 1965-66 fiscal year in the Housing and Food Service area. I concur in his recommendations and recommend that he be authorized to execute contracts in accordance therewith. Tabulations of the bids on 1 - 4 are set out on pages following his recommendations.

1. Award of Uniform and Linen Rental Contract: On June 15 bids were opened in the Business Manager's Office for the uniform and linen rental contract for the various units of the Division of Housing and Food Service. I recommend that the Board of Regents approve the awarding of a contract for this service for the 1965-66 fiscal year to Capitol Linen Supply, the low bidder.

An examination of the bids shows that Capitol Linen Supply, our present contractor, is again the low bidder. Using October, 1964 as a base for computing a monthly bill, the Capitol Linen Supply total was approximately \$40 less per month than the total for the next lowest bidder, Main Linen Service, Inc.

Therefore, I recommend that the award be made in accordance with the bids submitted.

2. Contract Award for Dairy Products: On June 15 bids were opened in the Business Manager's Office for the dairy products contracts for the various units of the Division of Housing and Food Service. I recommend that the Board of Regents approve contract awards for dairy products for 1965-66 as follows:

A study of the individual unit prices has been made and where differences in unit prices exist we have determined the consumption of the products based on the minimum quantities shown on the Estimate Sheet submitted with the bid specifications. This study revealed that we should make awards to the companies submitting the greater discount on the monthly bill, except for ice cream and frozen dessert mix.

On ice cream, Lily Fresh Ice Cream Company bid the largest discount, 27%, but they failed to be the low bidder because of high bids on two volume items, namely, 5¢ and 10¢ novelties. Their bid of 60¢ per dozen and \$1.20 per dozen was considerably higher than the 45¢ and 90¢ per dozen bid by the other companies. In determining that Carnation was the low bidder on ice cream, a total monthly bill was computed based on both minimum and maximum quantities shown on the Estimate Sheet submitted with the bid specifications. The Carnation Company total was low by about \$20 per month based on minimums and \$59 per month based on maximums. These figures are available in the Division of Housing and Food Service office if any bidders should desire to examine them.

On frozen dessert mix, the Lily Fresh Company again had the highest discount but was not the low bidder because their bid price of \$1.50 per gallon was so much higher than Carnation's bid of 95¢ per gallon. (Carnation - 95¢ per gallon less 12% = .836 per gallon; Lily Fresh - \$1.50 per gallon less 27% = 1.095 per gallon.)

3. Award of Laundry Service Contracts for the University: On June 15 bids were opened in the Business Manager's Office for the laundry service contracts for the several Division of Housing and Food Service units. I recommend that the Board of Regents approve the awarding of contracts for this service for the 1965-66 fiscal year as follows:

It should be pointed out that only two laundries have the capacity to do all the University laundry work -- Austin Laundry and Driskill Laundry. In order to try to get competition, we arrange for bids to be taken on individual groups or on a total basis.

I recommend that the awards be made as indicated. I think the price is reasonable and fair and substantially below the retail price for finished flatwork.

4. Pest Control Contract: On June 14 bids were opened for the Pest Control contract for food service units in the Division of Housing and Food Service. Bid invitations and specifications were sent to the following:

I therefore recommend that the Board of Regents approve the awarding of a contract for this service to the Terminix Company, the low bidder.

5. Contract for Laundry and Dry Cleaning for Occupants of Kinsolving Dormitory: For several years Austin Laundry and Dry Cleaning Company, Inc., and Burtons Laundry and Cleaners have provided laundry and dry cleaning services to the occupants of Kinsolving Dormitory. The contract for these services provides that the University will be paid \$25.00 per month. I concur in the recommendation of Mr. F. C. McConnell, Director of Housing and Food Service, that this contract be extended for the 1965-66 year and request that the Business Manager be authorized to sign such contract, subject to the same conditions and requirements as in the previous year.

6. Air Force ROTC Uniforms Contract: On June 12, 1963, bids were received to supply Air Force ROTC uniforms for the 1963-64 year. Bid invitations were sent to nine firms, but only two bids were received. Sol Frank Company of San Antonio was awarded the contract on a low bid of \$91.92 for the complete uniform. The material and services furnished under this contract has been satisfactory and has met Air Force standards. I concur in the recommendations of Lt. Colonel Benson, Jr., Professor and Chairman of Air Force Science, and Mr. Dustin, Military Property Custodian, that the present contract with Sol Frank Company be extended for the academic year 1965-66, and that the Business Manager be authorized to sign such contract, subject to the same conditions and requirements as in the previous year.



Vacation Schedule

The vacation entitlement for eligible employees will be ten (10) working days. Persons who have been continuously employed for six (6) months or longer and on at least a half-time basis are eligible to take annual leave to the extent of one (1) day for each month of continuous employment in the current year. Employees with fifteen (15) years or more of continuous service with the State of Texas shall be entitled to three (3) extra days of vacation.

BUSINESS CONTRACT ITEMS

I recommend approval of the following contracts:

1. Contract with Associated Food Services, Inc., P. O. Box 19235, Dallas 18, Texas, to operate the Main Dining Hall and Miners Hall Dining Room for the 1965-66 fiscal year beginning September 1, 1965. This company has had the contract for the last five years and the service has been excellent. The contract will be on the basis of cost plus a fixed fee of \$500.00 per month for the Main Dining Hall and \$150.00 per month for Miners Hall Dining Room.
2. Contract with Clinton D. Green for maintenance of refrigerated air-conditioning systems and heating facilities for the fiscal year beginning September 1, 1965, for the sum of \$5,700.00. The funds for this contract will come from the maintenance and operation appropriation for Physical Plant - Building Maintenance in the 1965-66 general budget.

BUSINESS CONTRACT ITEMS (CONTINUED)

3. Contract with Western Container Corporation, Inc., 1615 Wyoming, El Paso, Texas, to collect and dispose of trash and rubbish from the campus for the fiscal year beginning September 1, 1965, for the sum of \$6,800.00. The funds for this contract will come from the maintenance and operation appropriation for Physical Plant - General Services in the 1965-66 general budget.

4. Contract with Anderson and Callery, 4600 Hondo Pass, El Paso, Texas, to remove the last six (6) buildings in Veterans Village, Invitations to bid and specifications were sent to seven prospective bidders; two bids were received with Anderson and Callery proposing to pay \$1,373.86. The other bid was \$1,245.06. The contractor will furnish all labor and materials to do the job and will receive all materials, equipment, debris, etc. resulting from the demolition and removal.

5. Contract with Vowell Construction Company, 607 North Mesa, El Paso, Texas to level and pave certain parking areas on the campus. Invitations to bid were sent to three paving contractors; two bids were submitted with Vowell Construction Company submitting the low bid of 92¢ per square yard. The funds for this contract will come from Auxiliary Enterprises Funds - Parking Services.
