HOGG FOUNDATION FOR MENTAL HEALTH

AND IMA HOGG FOUNDATION

Allocations were made from the Hogg Foundation for Mental Health and Ima Hogg Foundation to the following institutions and agencies:

1. DePelchin Children's Center

Parent Education Program - \$38,000

The Ima Hogg Foundation is recommending for approval a fourth and final grant for the period May 1, 1986 to April 30, 1987. Robert Barker, the Center's executive director, has submitted a satisfactory progress report on the activities of the Parent Education Program during the past year. The program, which serves adolescent mothers and their infants, has made great strides over the last grant period and will receive a grant to build a research component into the service. Mr. Barker will be responsible for the administration of the grant.

2. Family Service Center

Fort Bend County Services for Emotionally Disturbed Children - \$15,000

The Family Service Center has secured a \$15,000 matching grant from the George Foundation for the challenge grant offered by the Ima Hogg Foundation in January of this year. We recommend for approval a grant for the period June 1, 1986 to May 31, 1987. This grant will represent a third and final year of support for the project. The funds will be used to provide salary support for a psychotherapist in the Richmond/Rosenberg satellite office. Mr. E. F. Christman, Jr., the executive director, will be responsible for the administration of the grant.

3. Office of the Governor, Austin, Texas

Statewide Evaluation of Communities in Schools - \$5,000

The Hogg Foundation Executive Committee recommends for approval a one-time grant for the period July 1 through December 31, 1986. This grant is for support of a statewide evaluation of the Communities in Schools program and will be used in combination with grants from the Texas Employment Commission, the Texas Department of Community Affairs, and the Dayton Hudson Foundation. Communities in Schools, an innovative program using outplaced staff of various agencies within the schools and communities where the students reside, is now operating in five Texas cities—Houston, Austin, El Paso, San Antonio, and Dallas. Its goals are to reduce dropouts, improve social service delivery, increase interagency cooperation, increase the number of productive citizens, improve educational service delivery, and increase community involvement in public education. Mrs. Jill Shaw, State Director, is responsible for the administration of this project.

4. The Institute for the Humanities at Salado

"Coping with Physical Illness" Lecture - \$1,000

The Hogg Foundation Executive Committee recommends for approval a grant for the period October 1 to November 30, 1986. These funds will be used for partial support of a symposium on coping with physical illness. The Institute's past programs dealing with mental health issues have been consistently of very high quality and of great interest to a broad audience. The Hogg Foundation grant will support, in part, the travel and honorarium for Dr. Edgar Heim, Professor of Pyschiatry at the University of Bern, Switzerland, who is an authority on coping with physical illness from a psychological perspective. Dr. Harry A. Wilmer, President and Director, will serve as project administrator.

5. Mental Health Association, Austin Area

Community Residential Alternatives Boarding Home Enhancement Program - \$11,050

The Hogg Foundation is recommending for approval a first-year grant for the period June 1, 1986 to May 31,1987. These funds will be used to initiate an investigation of existing boarding homes for the mentally ill in the Austin area and subsequently to develop a training model for home personnel. One of the features of the project is the utilization of outstanding volunteers to do the actual implementation of the study and the training. Kathy Edwards, Executive Director, will be responsible for the administration of the grant.

6. Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation

Governor's Conference on Suicide Intervention and Prevention Strategies - \$1,000

The Hogg Foundation Executive Committee recommends for approval a one-time grant for the period July 1, 1986 through August 31, 1986. This grant is for partial support of the Governor's Conference on Suicide: Intervention and Prevention Strategies. This statewide conference will be attended by professionals and community leaders and will focus on adolescents and young adults. Mr. H. Ed Calahan, Assistant Deputy Commissioner, is responsible for the administration of the grant.

7. Texas Wesleyan College

Personal Competency Intervention Project - \$5,000

The Hogg Foundation Executive Committee recommends for approval a second and final grant for the period October 1, 1986 through September 30, 1987. This grant, along with major support by Texas Wesleyan College, will be used to assure the continuation of a personal competency intervention project. Texas Wesleyan College will continue to require all incoming freshmen to participate in a one-hour credit personal/social skills credit course. The students will receive skill building in self control, affect management, social skills, and problem solving. Dr. James Cannici, Director of Counseling and Testing, will continue to serve as the project director.

8. Women in Action, Inc.

Group Home for Teen Mothers and Their Infant - \$30,000

The Ima Hogg Foundation is recommending for approval a second and final grant for the period July 1, 1986 to June 30, 1987. Currently, there are six mothers and their infants in residence. The residential services they are providing for these young women help meet an important need in the Houston area. Mrs. Mildred Bohn, the president of the board, will be responsible for the administration of the project.

9. U. T. Health Science Center - San Antonio - Department of Pyschiatry

Texas Consortium for Biological and Psychopharmacologic Psychiatric Research - \$43,006

The Hogg Foundation Executive Committee recommends for approval a first-year grant for the period June 1, 1986 to May 31, 1987. This cooperative research plan involves all four Medical Schools under The University of Texas System with a focus upon highly controlled studies with large numbers of depressed patients and experimental treatments.

9. U. T. Health Science Center - San Antonio - Department of Pyschiatry (Continued)

This data should go a long way toward an understanding of the interactions between symptomatology, drug therapy, and institutional settings as reflected in both behavioral and biochemical changes in the depressed patients who are studied. Dr. Charles L. Bowden of the Department of Psychiatry will be responsible for the administration of the grant.

10. U. T. Cancer Center

Living Through Childhood Cancer--A Psychosocial Management Model - \$14,116

The Ima Hogg Foundation is recommending for approval a second-year grant for the period May 1, 1986 to April 30, 1987. The program, which is aimed at "normalizing" the pediatric cancer ward, is off to an excellent start and will place increased emphasis on the involvement of parents during the next year. Dr. Jan van Eyes, Head of the Division of Pediatrics, is responsible for the administration of the grant.

11. U. T. Austin - Department of Pyschiatry

Fetal Alcohol and the Ontogeny of Reactions to Frustration and Discrepancy - \$20,110

The Hogg Foundation Executive Committee recommends for approval a grant for the period July I, 1986 to June 30, 1987. These funds will be used for support of research on fetal alcohol effects on the development of learned reactions to frustration and discrepancy. Progress has been made the past year in development of an animal model for the fetal alcohol syndrome in children and should be continued for another year. Dr. Abram Amsel, Ashbel Smith Professor of Psychology, will serve as project administrator.

12. U. T. Austin - Department of Music

Ethnological and Pyschological Foundations of Music in Therapy and Mental Health Symposium - \$3,000

The Hogg Foundation Executive Committee is recommending for approval a one-time grant from the Eloise Helbig Chalmers Fund. These funds will be used to bring three outstanding speakers and consultants to participate in a symposium on June 16-17, 1986, regarding the psychotherapeutic use of music with handicapped students. The Austin Independent School District is giving continuing education credit for their participating teachers. Dr. Judith Jellison is responsible for the administration of the project.

13. U. T. Austin - School of Social Work

An Exploratory Study of Black Families in Two Texas Communities: Their World Views and Mental Health - \$13,536

The Executive Committee of the Hogg Foundation recommends for approval a final supplemental grant for the period April 1 to August 31, 1986. This supplemental grant will enable Dr. English and his staff to complete interviewing of families in the Prarie View community, analyze the data collected, and begin making interim reports to community groups in Austin and Prarie View. Dr. Richard A. English is responsible for administration of the project.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

The Parking and Traffic Regulations recommended for approval by the U.T. Board of Regents have been approved by an attorney in the Office of General Counsel and are based on model regulations approved by that office. These regulations supercede all prior Parking and Traffic Regulations.

SECTION I QUICK REFERENCE TO PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

- 1. PERMITS REQUIRED FOR ACCESS & PARKING: Only vehicles conspicuously displaying proper University permits (as specified in Section VI, infra) may park on the campus (as shown by the boundaries on the map accompanying the regulations) Monday through Friday from 7:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. (Motor-cycles, mopeds and motor scooters may park only in areas designated for such vehicles as specified in Section IV, infra).
- 2. DISPLAY OF PERMITS: Parking permits must be properly affixed to the vehicle(s) as described in Section VI. Decals which are taped or affixed by unauthorized materials or displayed on a vehicle other than the vehicle to which issued will subject the holder to a citation. Additionally, the permit will be revoked and the holder may lose all parking privileges (Section VII, infra).
- 3. REMOVAL OF PERMITS: Permits (Decals) shall be removed when there is a change of vehicle ownership; when association with the University is terminated; when a replacement permit has been issued to take the place of a previously issued permit; or upon expiration or revocation (Section VI).
- 4. CLASSES OF PERMITS: Section VI, E.
- 5. PERMIT RESTRICTIONS: Section VI.
- 6. LOADING ZONE PERMITS: A Loading Zone permit is required to use these spaces/ areas. Permits (normally valid for 15 minutes) may be obtained from the guards at the traffic control stations. When the control stations are closed call 2331 for assistance.
- 7. BICYCLES, MOPEDS AND SKATES: Bicycles and mopeds must be operated in accordance with, and skaters must conform to, the ordinances of the City of Richardson, the specific applicable provisions of these regulations, all provisions of these regulations concerning parking restrictions and traffic control IV and applicable state law.
- 8. PARKING LOTS: On occasion during the year, certain parking lots may be closed upon recommendation of the Chief of Police or Parking and Security Committee and approval by the President of the University.
- 9. SPEED LIMIT: The speed limit on all parts of the campus, whether on streets or in parking areas, is 30 mph unless otherwise posted. (Section IV, infra).
- 10. POSTED SIGNS: Posted signs, whether permanent or temporary, must be obeyed at all times and take precedence over painted curbs, pavement markings and designations shown on any University maps.
- 11. PARKING IMPROPERLY: A vehicle shall not park on a street or parking lot where angle parking is required, with the back of the vehicle toward the curb or stop bumper, nor shall a vehicle be parked opposite the flow of traffic in the traffic lane where parallel parking is required. Parking wholly within the marked boundaries of the parking space is required at all times. Vehicles shall not park in a manner that obstructs walkways, driveways, ramps, loading docks, marked crosswalks, or inflicts damage to shrubbery, trees, grass, grounds or structures. Additionally, no vehicle may park on any unmarked or unimproved ground area which has not been marked or designated for parking.

- 12. REGISTRATION OF VEHICLES: Alternate vehicles may be registered by students, faculty or staff upon separate application and by paying the required additional fee. Only one vehicle may enter or park on campus at the same time. (Section VI, infra).
- 13. ENFORCEMENT AND IMPOUNDMENTS: Failure to abide by these regulations may be on the basis for disciplinary action against students, and faculty/staff (Section V, infra). Upon notice, violators may be subject to impoundment of their vehicle(s) pending payment of overdue charges (Section VIII, infra). Students may also be barred from readmission and have grades, degree, refunds or official transcripts withheld pending payment of overdue charges (Section VIII, infra). Vehicles may also be impounded for specific impound violations.
- 14. APPEAL OF CITATION: University parking and traffic citations may be appealed, within 15 calendar days from date of citation by filing a Citation Appeal Form with the Decal Sales Office, (see Section VIII for detailed procedures). Court Appearance citations are handled by the appropriate county or municipal court.
- 15. VISITORS: Visitors must obtain permits when parking on campus. OFFICIAL VISITORS are those who conduct important business with or who render an important service to the University and who are not otherwise eligible for annual parking permits. Official Visitors may obtain temporary parking permits from the guards at the traffic control stations. These permits entitle the holder to park only in a space designated "Official Visitor". Permits must be conspicuously displayed on the driver's side of the vehicle. (Section VI, infra).
- 16. PEDESTRIAN RIGHTS AND DUTIES: Pedestrians must obey all traffic control devices. They have the right-of-way at marked crosswalks, in intersections and on sidewalks extending across a service drive, building entrance or driveway. Pedestrians crossing a street at any point other than within a marked crosswalk or within an unmarked crosswalk at an intersection shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles on said street. Pedestrians shall not leave the curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle which is so close that it is impossible for the driver to yield. Pedestrians may cross an intersection diagonally only where permitted by special pavement marking.
- 17. INOPERABLE VEHICLES: If a vehicle becomes inoperable, a telephone call shall be placed to the University Police Department at 2331. The police will either render assistance or authorize temporary parking. Temporary parking shall not exceed 24 hours and must not create an obstruction or hazard.

SECTION II GENERAL PROVISIONS

Pursuant to the authority granted by Sections 51.201 et seg.; 54.005, 54.503, 65.31 and 70.01 et seg., of Title 3 of the Texas Education Code, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System has promulgated Parking and Traffic Regulations to regulate and control parking and traffic and the use of parking facilities, to provide for issuance of vehicle identification insignia (parking permit), and to provide for jurisdiction over offenses. This booklet contains those regulations and procedures applicable to any person who walks or drives and parks a motor vehicle or bicycle on the campus of The University of Texas at Dallas. These rules and regulations are supplementary to the ordinances of the City of Richardson and the statutes of the State of Texas which govern pedestrians and the use of motor vehicles and bicycles.

The operation of a motor vehicle or bicycle on The University of Texas at Dallas campus is a PRIVILEGE granted by the University and is not an inherent right of any faculty/staff member or student. All faculty, staff and students who have motor vehicles in their possession or control for use, operation or parking on the University campus must register said vehicle with the Decal Sales Office. Registration of a motor vehicle does not guarantee a parking place on campus.

The University is not responsible for fire, theft, damage to, or loss of vehicle parked or operated on the University campus. No bailment is created by granting of any parking or operating privileges regarding a vehicle on any property owned, leased or otherwise controlled by the University.

The administration and enforcement of the regulations contained in this booklet are as follows:

UNIVERSITY POLICE: The University Police have the responsibility and the legal authority for the enforcement of the Parking and Traffic Regulations listed in this booklet. University police officers may issue University citations or Court Appearance citations ENFORCEABLE IN COURT. (See Section VIII). On special occasions and emergencies, such parking limitations may be imposed by the Chief of the University Police as are required by the conditions which prevail. When conditions warrant such action, the Chief may waive parking limitations.

The University reserves the right to enforce parking and traffic regulations:

- 1. through the issuance of University citations and the collection of administrative enforcement charges for offenses;
- 2. through the impoundment of vehicles interfering with the movement of vehicular or pedestrian traffic or blocking a sidewalk, ramp, loading dock, crosswalk, entrance, exit, fire lane or aisle and through the impoundment of vehicles for unpaid charges after proper notice as provided by these regulations;
- by suspension or revocation of permits;
- 4. by requiring either the vehicle owner or the person who has registered the vehicle with the University Decal Sales Office, to appear in court or at a University hearing for non-payment of outstanding charges;
- 5. by barring the readmission and withholding the grades, degrees, refunds and official transcripts of any student for non-payment of outstanding charges;
- by disciplinary action against employees or students who fail to abide by these regulations;
- by denying parking permits to those with overdue charges;
- 8. by the issuance of Court Appearance Citations requiring an appearance in the appropriate state or municipal court; and
- 9. by such other methods as are commonly employed by city governments or state agencies in control of traffic regulation enforcement.

Proof of the fact that any parking or traffic control device, sign, parking meter, signal or marking was actually in place at any location on campus of The University of Texas at Dallas, shall constitute prima facie evidence that the same is official and was installed under the authority of applicable law and these regulations.

When any person is charged with having stopped, parked and left standing a motor vehicle on the campus of The University of Texas at Dallas, in violation of any provision of the Parking and Traffic Regulations of The University of Texas at Dallas, proof that said vehicle was, at the date of the offense, bearing a valid University of Texas at Dallas parking permit shall constitute prima facie evidence that said vehicle was then and there stopped, parked and left standing by the holder of the parking permit. However, if the vehicle does not bear a valid University of Texas at Dallas parking permit, proof that said vehicle at the date of the offense alleged, was owned by an individual is prima facie proof that said vehicle was then and there stopped, parked and left standing by said individual.

The University assumes no responsibility for any vehicle or any duty to protect any vehicle or its contents at anytime the vehicle is operated or parked on the campus.

The University may deem a motor vehicle including a motorcycle, or motor scooter, or moped or bicycle parked on the University campus for more than 48 hours to be abandoned and may dispose of such vehicle as provided in Section 10.6 of Chapter VII, Part Two of the Regents' Rules and Regulations, and Article 6687-9 of Texas Revised Civil Statutes.

SECTION III DEFINITIONS

BICYCLE means every device propelled by human power upon which any person may ride, having two tandem wheels either of which is more than fourteen (14) inches in diameter.

CARPOOL is a private motor vehicle occupied by two or more persons traveling together.

CROSSWALK: any portion of a roadway at an intersection or elsewhere distinctly indicated for pedestrian crossing by lines or other markings on the surfaces.

DRIVER: every person who drives or is in actual physical control of a vehicle.

MOTORCYCLE means every motor vehicle having a saddle for the use of the rider and designed to travel on not more than three (3) wheels in contact with the ground but excluding a tractor.

MOTOR DRIVEN CYCLE means every motorcycle, including every motor scooter, with a motor which produces not to exceed 5-brake horsepower (brake horsepower developed by a prime mover, as measured by a brake applied to the driving shaft), and every bicycle with motor attached.

MOTOR VEHICLE means every vehicle which is self-propelled.

OFFICIAL TRAFFIC-CONTROL DEVICES: all signs, signals, markings, and devices not inconsistent with the Act placed or erected by authority of a public body or official having jurisdiction, for the purpose of regulating, warning, or guiding traffic.

NWNER means any person who holds the legal title of a vehicle or who has the legal ight of possession thereof, or the legal right of control of said vehicle.

'ARK OR PARKING means the standing of a vehicle, whether occupied or not, otherrise than temporarily for the purpose of and while actually engaged in loading ir unloading merchandise or passengers.

ARKING FACILITY means any public or private property used for restricted and/or said parking of vehicles. This includes a restricted portion or portions of an otherwise unrestricted parking facility.

PARKING FACILITY OWNER means any operator or owner (including any lessee, employee, or agent thereof) or a parking facility.

COWING COMPANY means any individual, corporation, partnership, or association engaged in the business of towing vehicles for compensation or with the expectation of compensation for the towing, storage, or repair of vehicles. The term lowing company includes the owner, operator, employee, or agent of a towing company, but does not include cities, counties, or other political subdivisions of the state.

All other words and phrases unless otherwise defined in this booklet will be used in accordance to definitions in the Texas Laws Relating to Uniform Act, J.C.S. 6701d - Uniform Act Regulating Traffic on Highways.

SECTION IV GENERAL TRAFFIC REGULATION

TRAFFIC RULES:

- Pedestrian traffic shall have the right-of-way at all times.
- The speed limit on all parts of the campus is 30 miles per hour 2. unless otherwise posted.
- Every vehicle is required to stop completely at each STOP sign, pause 3. briefly, and then proceed with caution.
- В. BICYCLE RULES: Bicycles ridden on campus must observe the general traffic rules as well as the following:
 - 1.
 - Bicycles must not interfere with the passage of pedestrians. Bicycles may be ridden only in areas which are open to vehicle traffic. 2.
 - Bicycles may be walked in areas which are open to pedestrian traffic. 3.
 - 4. Bicycles are not allowed in buildings, not even for parking or storage.
 - 5.
 - Bicycles may be parked only in the bicycle racks provided. Violation of bicycle regulations are considered traffic violations. Violators will be subject to the same enforcement fees.

SECTION V PARKING REGULATIONS

The various classes of parking permits and their eligibility requirements, privileges and limitations are described in detail in Section VI.

On University holidays, only those parking restrictions which regulate parking at all times shall remain in effect.

Failure to abide by parking and traffic regulations may be the basis for lisciplinary action against students and employees. Students may be subjected to penalties ranging from disciplinary probation to expulsion from the Institution as outlined in Section 3.13 of the Rules and Regulations of the Board of Regents of The Univeristy of Texas System, Chapter VT, Part One. Employees may be subjected to disciplinary penalties including termination of employment as butlined in Section D8-130.0 of the HANDBOOK OF OPERATING PROCEDURES. When an employee has accumulated three or more unpaid parking or traffic violations and/or charges of \$15.00 or more, the employee's Dean, Director or Administrative Difficial shall be notified by Parking and Traffic Administration. When a student is placed on the bar list for unpaid parking or traffic violations, the Vice President for Administration and Student Services shall be notified by Parking and Traffic Administration.

SECTION VI PARKING PERMITS

A. FACULTY AND STAFF: A parking permit will be issued upon application to the Decal Sales Office located in Founders North, Room 1.202. Permits will be issued to the vehicle for which the faculty or staff member, spouse or parent is the registered owner. If the registered owner is other than above, (1) the owner or person in custody of the vehicle must be either related to or domiciled with the applicant, and (2) the owner or person in custody of the vehicle must not be otherwise eligible for a University Parking Permit.

Faculty/Staff members may register no more than two additional vehicles for a total of three vehicles, providing all vehicles are owned by the applicant or another person as specified above. Upon separate application and payment of required fees (proof of ownership is required when registering more than one vehicle) and with the understanding that only one vehicle may be parked on campus at the same time, parking permits will be issued.

- 8. STUDENTS: A parking permit will be issued for a vehicle owned by the student, spouse, parent, or guardian. If the registered owner is other than above, (1) the owner or person in custody of the vehicle must be either related to or domiciled with the applicant, and (2) the owner or person in custody of the vehicle must not be otherwise eligible for a University Parking Permit. Students may register two additional motor vehicles, motorcycles, or motor scooters upon separate application and payment of the required fee to the Decal Sales Office, however, only one vehicle may be operated or parked upon the campus at the same time. In addition, student must present a paid fee receipt for the current semester. (Proof of ownership is required when registering more than one vehicle).
- C. DISPLAY OF PERMITS: Permit(s) must be displayed on the vehicle to which it was issued. Permits (decals) shall be affixed on the vehicle according to the instructions furnished on the decal. Taping or otherwise affixing the decal will result in citations being issued.
- D. REMOVAL OF PERMITS: Permits (decals) shall be removed:
 - whenever there is a change of vehicle ownership;
 - 2. when association with the University is terminated;
 - 3. when a replacement permit (decal) has been issued to take the place of a previously issued permit (decal); or
 - 4. upon expiration or revocation of the permit or decal.

CLASSES OF PERMITS AND ANNUAL FEES:

- GREEN Permit (Decal)
 - a. Student Ceneral Parking
 - 1) Fall for entire year, \$40.50
 - 2) Spring for rest of year, \$24.50
 - 3) Summer, \$14.00
 - 4) Fee per semester, \$14.00
 - b. Student Motorcycle Special Parking, same as Student General Parking
 - c. Faculty/Staff General Parking, \$48.00 prorated as follows: \$4.00 per month
 - d. Faculty/Staff Motorcycle Special Parking, same as Faculty/Staff General Parking
- 2. RED Permit (Decal) Staff at Administration Building or Physical Plant. Same fee as GREEN Faculty/Staff General Parking
- 3. GOLD Permit (Decal) Close-in Parking: optional for faculty, staff and graduate students appointed 50% or more as teaching or research assistants, \$83.00 prorated as follows: \$7.00 per month.
- 4. ORANGE Permit (Decal) Administrative: optional for those designated by the President, \$148.00 prorated as follows: \$12.00 per month.
- 5. BLUE Permit (Decal)
 - a. Student Handicapped/Disabled Parking, \$40.50 prorated same as Student General Parking
 - b. Faculty/Staff Handicapped/Disabled Parking, \$48.00 prorated same as Faculty/Staff General Parking
- 6. Any vehicle bearing a Disabled Vets license plate: no fee for parking
- 7. Additional decals so authorized by the Rules and Regulations, \$5.00 each

Permits (Decal):

Motorcycle Parking Permit (decal) will be honored only after it has been properly and completely affixed on the front fender of the vehicle so that it may be readily seen when viewed from the front of the vehicle. NOTE: If no front fender is available, mount permit on right front fork so that it may be readily seen when viewed from the front of the vehicle. Permits (decals) may not be affixed by tape or any other unauthorized method. The permit (decal) is not transferable and must be affixed to the vehicle for which it was issued. [A fee of \$5.00 AND the remnants of the old permit are required for any permit (decal) replacement].

Parking:

- a. Motorcycles and Motor Scooters shall park ONLY in designated parking areas. [A current permit (decal) is required Monday through Friday 7:00 A.M. to 10:00 P.M.].
- b. Mopeds (with a total engine displacement of less than 50cc) may park in <u>either</u> motorcycle designated areas <u>or</u> in those designated bicycle racks located outside the traffic control stations Monday through Friday from 7:00 A.M. to 10:00 P.M.

NOTE:

Motorcycles, Motor Scooters and Mopeds shall NOT be parked or otherwise secured in unauthorized places e.g. sidewalks, posts, railings, trees, etc. Neither may these vehicles use spaces marked for passenger cars or trucks.

Operation:

Motorcycles, Motor Scooters and Mopeds shall NOT be ridden or operated on pedestrian walkways or sidewalks. On University streets, operators shall comply with ALL traffic control devices e.g. one-way signs, stop signs, etc.

"Disabled" plates and devices:

All disabled veterans whose vehicles display the specially designed license plates issued by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with the words "DISABLED VET" printed thereon in accordance with the provisions of Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes Article 6675a-5e and all permanently disabled persons whose vehicles display the specially designed symbols, tabs or other devices (to include a vehicle in which a temporarily disabled person identification card is placed in the lower left—hand side of the front windshield) issued by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with the word "DISABLED" printed thereon in accordance with the provisions of Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes Article 6675a-53.1 are exempt from parking permit fees and from parking meter fees and time limits. These exemptions permit parking only in spaces where parking would otherwise be appropriate and do not permit the parking of a vehicle at a place where parking is restricted or prohibited.

- F. PAYMENT OF FEES: When an application is made for a permit, the fee charged will be for a complete year or for the entire unexpired portion of the University's permit year. Payment of the fee must be made before the permit will be issued.
- 3. REPLACEMENT CHARGES: Any time replacement permits are issued there will be a \$5.00 charge made. Remnants of old permits are to be returned at that time. If remnants are not returned, replacement permit(s) will be at the REGULAR RATE.
- H. REFUNDS: A request for refund will not be honored unless it is filed with the Decal Sales Office during the University's fiscal year in which payment for the permit was made. A request for refund must be accompanied by the remnants of the appropriate permit. Refunds will be made to members of the faculty and staff upon request and only in the event service is terminated by a resignation or leave of absence without pay. The refund will be based on a prorated refund schedule. A request for a refund will not be honored when a person's privilege to park and drive on campus has been suspended nor if outstanding charges or other debts remain unpaid. Requests for refunds of the entire amount paid will be subject to a \$7.50 administrative and handling charge.

I. OTHER TYPES OF PERMITS ISSUED:

- 1. New faculty and staff members may obtain a free temporary parking permit from the Personnel Office during orientation. These temporary permits expire one week after the employees' first payday.
- 2. Individuals who have registered a vehicle but find it necessary to use a non-registered vehicle for not more than two weeks may obtain a temporary replacement vehicle permit from the Decal Sales Office.

The registration decal number of the vehicle being temporarily replaced is required for issuance of this permit. After three permits have been issued during an academic year, a fee of \$5.00 will be charged for each additional permit.

- 3. Emergency Access Passes for Handicapped or Disabled Persons: Provisions have been made for temporary UTD handicapped/disability parking for individuals who will be handicapped or disabled for a limited time. They are as follows:
 - a. One Day Pass A person who becomes disabled may receive an emergency one day pass from the gate guard upon request. This emergency pass will allow sufficient time to clear requests through Student Health Services.
 - b. Ten Day Pass A disabled person who needs to apply for a disabled symbol at the county tax office may obtain a 10 day parking pass from the Decal Sales Office. This 10 day pass will allow sufficient time to clear requests through the county tax office.
 - c. Sixty Day Pass Applications for emergency parking (not to exceed 60 days) for disabled individuals must be reviewed by Student Health Services. Each application must be accompanied by a medical report signed by an attending physician stating the disability of the individual. EXCEPTION: Medical proof may be waived by Student Health Service personnel when in their opinion those individuals making a request meet the requirements of being temporarily handicapped or disabled.

SECTION VII DRIVING AND PARKING OFFENSES

- A. OFFENSES: Police may issue citations for but are not limited to the following offenses:
 - 1. Parking along curbs bordered in yellow.
 - 2. Parking in areas not designated for the decal issued.
 - 3. Parking in loading zones.
 - 4. Parking in driveways.
 - 5. Forging or altering a permit, or using a forged or altered permit.
 - 6. Committing any of the following acts with the intention of providing any person with parking to which he or she is not entitled under these regulations.
 - a. Transferring a permit.
 - b. Affixing a permit to a vehicle other than that for which it was issued.
 - c. Failing to destroy a permit when required to do so by these regulations.
 - d. Parking or driving a vehicle to which there has been affixed a permit other than that issued for such vehicle, with knowledge thereof.
 - 7. Blocking crosswalk.
 - 8. Failing to park within the lines of individually marked spaces.
 - 9. Altering, damaging, moving, or ignoring University traffic signs or markings.
 - 10. Failing to display parking permit in prescribed manner or location.
 - 11. Failing to obey requests and/or directions of a University police officer.

- 12. Parking in a backed-in position.
- 13. Failing to stop before passing stop sign.
- 14. Operating motor vehicle in prohibited direction.
- 15. Driving on sidewalks.
- 16. Failing to yield right-of-way to pedestrians.
- 17. Driving vehicle into barricaded area or removing barricades.
- 18. Violating any of the provisions of the official Texas Motor Vehicle Laws booklet.
- 19. Driving in an imprudent manner.
- B. IMPOUND VIOLATIONS: Offenses designated impound violations.
 - 1. When an unauthorized vehicle is parked in a reserved space or facility, marked by a readable sign(s) specifying who may park there, prohibiting all others. If a facility, the sign(s) are at all entrances.
 - 2. When the owner or operator of an unauthorized vehicle has actually received notice from the parking facility owner that the vehicle will be towed away if it is not removed.
 - When an unauthorized vehicle is:
 - a. obstructing an entrance to a building or parking facility
 - b. obstructing an exit of a building or parking facility
 - c. obstructing a fire lane
 - d. obstructing an aisle of a parking facility
 - e. parked within a marked crosswalk or intersection
 - f. abandoned (Section 10.6 of Chapter VII, Part Two of the Regents' Rules and Regulations.

SECTION VIII ENFORCEMENT

- A. PARKING AND TRAFFIC CITATIONS: University Police are authorized to issue two types of citations for violation of University parking and traffic regulations:
 - UNIVERSITY CITATIONS Those handled by the University, subject to University administrative enforcement charges and a right to appeal within the University (Paragraph E below).
 - 2. COURT APPEARANCE (CA) CITATIONS Those issued by the University Police constituting a summons to appear in either municipal court or a justice court.
- B. POLICY WITH RESPECT TO COURT APPEARANCE (CA) CITATIONS: The University reserves the right to issue a CA citation for any violation. It is the general policy of the University, however, to issue CA citations at the University's option as follows:
 - 1. for moving violations;
 - 2. for any violation when the individual's driving or parking privilege has been suspended (See Paragraph E below); or
 - 3. when an individual receives a University citation and all reasonable attempts at collection have failed.
- C. PROCEDURE FOR UNIVERSITY CITATIONS: University citations are issued for offenses described in Section VII. The administrative enforcement charges are:

- \$5.00 for a vehicle with a current valid permit (decal);
- 2. \$15.00 for a vehicle not displaying a current permit (decal). In this case, the student, faculty or staff member will be given the opportunity to register the vehicle in lieu of the first "no decal" citation enforcement fee within 15 calendar days from the date of citation. If the vehicle is registered as a second or third vehicle, the enforcement fee will be reduced to \$5.00.

If the charge is not paid within 15 calendar days after issuance of the citation, a \$7.50 late charge will be assessed.

Every person receiving a University citation shall remit the amount of the charge to the Bursar's Office. Payment must be received within 15 calendar days after issuance of the citation, to avoid a late charge.

If a person desires to appeal a University citation, he/she shall comply with Paragraph D below within 10 calendar days after date of issuance of the citation.

Requests for exceptions to the above referenced days will be considered on an individual basis, if mitigating or unusual circumstances exist. Such requests shall be submitted in writing to the Decal Sales Office and shall detail the reason(s) such a request is being made. Requests based solely on alleged non-receipt of a copy of the citation will not be honored.

Unpaid charges for parking offenses are recorded either in the name of the person in whose name the vehicle is registered with some official state motor vehicle registration department or agency, or in the name of the person who has registered the vehicle with the Decal Sales Office.

NOTE: If a student has the same family name and/or home address as the registered owner, then the unpaid charges will also be recorded in the student's name. Unpaid charges for other offenses (such as moving violations) may be recorded in the name of the person driving said vehicle, in the name of the person who has registered it with the University Decal Sales Office, or in the name of the registered owner.

When Court Appearance citations are issued, the University citations will be cancelled. Failure to discharge CA citations may result in the issuance of a warrant for the arrest of such person.

Persons with unpaid charges recorded in their names shall be ineligible to receive parking permits while such charges remain unpaid. To obtain a permit, a person shall either pay the charges or timely request a University hearing, paying one month's parking fee until the hearing date.

D. IMPOUNDMENT OF VEHICLES, BARRING OF READMISSION AND WITHHOLDING OF GRADES, DEGREES, OFFICIAL TRANSCRIPTS AND REFUNDS: When unpaid charges are recorded, the Decal Sales Office shall send a return receipt letter to the last known address of the person in whose name the charges are recorded.

Such letter shall state that unless (1) payment of all accumulated charges is made within 15 calendar days after the date of such letter or (2) a written request is made within 10 calendar days to appear before a University hearing committee concerning impoundment of the vehicle in case of faculty, staff, student or visitor, or for barring of readmission and/or withholding of grades, degree, official transcripts and refunds in the case of students as authorized in the Regents' Rules and Regulations, Part One, Chapter VI, Section 9 and state law, the appropriate enforcement action will take place without further notice.

Such a hearing is not an appeal of the Parking and Traffic citations but is a limited hearing to allow the individual an opportunity to show that the vehicle in question was not owned, registered or used by the individual or to show that the individual receiving notice of impending sanctions does not have unpaid Parking and Traffic charges.

At such hearing, which will be held after a reasonable period of time, the person requesting the hearing will assume the burden of showing why the appropriate enforcement action should not take place.

If timely payment is not received and either the registered owner or the person who has registered the vehicle with the University has failed to appear at the requested University impoundment hearing or has appeared and has failed to meet his or her burden of proof, the vehicle may be impounded pending payment of all outstanding charges, including towing and storage charges, without further notice.

If timely payment is not received from a student and the student has failed to appear at the requested hearing or has appeared and has failed to meet his or her burden of proof, the student may be barred from readmission and grades, degrees, official transcripts and refunds may be withheld, without further notice. Additionally, the vehicle registered to the student may be subject to impoundment.

E. APPEALS FROM UNIVERSITY CITATION(S): Any person who has received a University citation may file a request to have the citation reviewed. This appeal must be filed with the Decal Sales Office no later than 10 calendar days after the citation was issued. If an appeal is not filed within this time the citation is deemed final.

Appeals shall be prepared in writing on the "Citation Appeal" form provided by the Decal Sales Office. Appeals may be based solely on the written statement or the appealing party may also request a personal appearance. Failure to request a personal appearance or failure to appear at the hearing (as requested) will result in the decision being rendered on the basis of the written statement (including any supporting material submitted) and the information as shown on the citation(s).

Each "Citation Appeal" form will be reviewed by the Appeals Committee for a decision and the appealing party will be notified, in writing, of the decision. The Appeals Committee may order the payment of part or the cancellation of such charge(s). If the appeal is denied and the appealing party fails to pay the charge(s) or to request a review of the appeal (See Paragraph F below) within 10 calendar days after date of notification, a \$7.50 late charge will be assessed on the citation(s).

F. REVIEW OF APPEAL FROM UNIVERSITY CITATION(S): Any person who has appealed a University citation(s) and who is not satisfied with the decision by the Appeals Committee, may have the decision reviewed by the University Parking and Traffic Appeals Panel. Such request shall be submitted in writing to the Traffic Appeal Panel Office within 10 calendar days from the date of the original decision.

This request shall set forth the grounds on which the appealing party believes the decision was improper or inequitable. Such written request shall be submitted in an original plus 5 legible copies (reproduced copies are acceptable) and include the following:

- citation number(s);
- license number of vehicle(s);
- 3. date of notification of original decision;

- 4. date review requested; and
- 5. printed or typed name, address, and signature of person requesting the review.

Each review will be considered by a University Appeals Panel consisting of faculty, staff and student members. The Panel may uphold the decision of the Parking and Traffic Administration or they may reverse the decision in whole or in part, as deemed appropriate.

The decision of the University Appeals Panel shall be final.

SUSPENSION OF PRIVILEGE TO DRIVE AND PARK ON CAMPUS: The loss of the privilege of driving or parking a motor vehicle on campus shall commence 15 days after the Parking and Traffic Office mails a letter to the person, at the address of such person as shown in the records of that office, stating that such person's privilege of driving or parking a motor vehicle on campus has been suspended. Such letter shall state the term of the suspension and will give notification of possible impoundment for parking offenses committed during the period of suspension and shall state the reason for such suspension.

Any person who (a) forges or alters a permit; (b) uses a forged or altered permit; (c) transfers a permit, affixes a permit to a vehicle other than for which it was issued, or fails to destroy a permit when required to do so by these regulations with the intention of providing any person with parking privileges he/she is not entitled to under these regulations; (d) provides false information to obtain a parking permit with knowledge thereof; or (e) parks or drives a vehicle to which there has been affixed a permit which the registered owner, or regular driver, did not purchase, shall lose the privilege of driving or parking on the University campus for six months. While a person's privilege of driving or parking a vehicle on campus is suspended, it is unlawful (1) for that person to drive or park any motor vehicle on the campus (2) for any person to drive or park a vehicle registered in the name of such person on the campus.

If a person whose privilege of driving or parking on campus has been suspended receives a University citation by reason of having a vehicle on campus during the period of his/her suspension, the period of suspension shall be extended so that it expires twelve months from the date the person received such additional citation. In addition, the violation of the suspension shall be reported to the Vice President for Administration and Student Services if the person is a student, or to the appropriate Dean, Director or Administrative Official for possible disciplinary action if the person is a faculty or staff member.

A person receiving notice that his/her privilege of driving or parking a vehicle on campus has been suspended may appeal the suspension within fifteen calendar days on the grounds that the imposition of such suspension is improper or will create serious and substantial hardship. Such appeal shall be considered if there are any unpaid citations outstanding at the time such appeal is filed, unless special arrangements are made with the University Appeals Panel.

I. DESTRUCTION OF PERMIT WHEN SUSPENDED: Every person receiving notice that his/her privilege of driving or parking on the campus has been suspended shall remove the parking permit(s) from every vehicle registered in his/her name and return the remnants thereof to the Decal Sales Office within fifteen calendar days after date of such notice. Failure to do so shall be reported to the Vice President for Administration and Student Services if the person is a student, or to the appropriate Dean, Director or Administrative Official, if the person is a faculty or staff member.

- I. ELIGIBILITY TO OBTAIN NEW PERMIT DURING PERIOD OF SUSPENSION: A person whose privilege of driving and parking on the campus is suspended and not reinstated, shall be ineligible to receive a parking permit of any type during the period of suspension.
- I. TWO VEHICLES ON CAMPUS: When an applicant who has registered two vehicles is found to have both vehicles parked on campus at the same time in violation of the Alternate Vehicle Policy (Section VI, infra), the following shall apply:
 - 1. First offense The Decal Sales Office shall notify the permit holder that he/she has violated these regulations and that any further violation will result in the loss of the permit for the alternate vehicle. Additionally any citation(s) which may have been issued are due and payable.
 - 2. Second offense The Decal Sales Office shall notify the permit holder that he/she has again violated these regulations. Such written notice will inform the permit holder that he/she must surrender the permit from the alternate vehicle in addition to making payment for any citation(s) which may have been issued for this offense. Additionally, the permit holder shall not be able to register an alternate vehicle for the remainder of the current permit year. Failure to abide by this second notice will subject the permit holder to all enforcement sanctions including those described in Section V.
- K. IMPOUNDMENT: The term "impoundment" includes towing, removal, immobilization, and storage of the vehicle in question.

In addition to any charge that may be levied by the University for an offense resulting in removal or immobilization, the owner of an impounded vehicle must also pay a commercial wrecker service fee and storage charges. When an IMPOUND VIOLATION occurs and the owner or driver of the vehicle appears on the scene before the arrival of the wrecker, the vehicle will not be impounded. If the owner or driver appears on the scene after the arrival of the wrecker and the wrecker driver has made a hookup, the following will apply:

- the vehicle will not be impounded; and
- 2. the owner or driver will be expected to pay the wrecker a fee, in lieu of towing.

If the vehicle is impounded, the registered owner or permit holder will be sent notice at the address on file with the Decal Sales Office.

SECTION IX CARPOOLING

- A. A carpool may be formed by at least two persons who will travel to The University of Texas at Dallas together. The carpool may use any vehicle which displays a currently valid permit (decal). In order to secure a no-cost carpool vehicle card it will be necessary for all participants (both drivers and riders) to present themselves as a group to the Decal Sales Office. Each of the drivers should know the permit numbers of the vehicles he/she will drive. These permit numbers will be registered to the carpool card.
- B. Properly registered vehicles displaying the carpool card on the driver's side of the dashboard and occupied by two or more persons will be permitted to park in the close-in parking area.

- C. The carpool card remains the property of The University of Texas at Dallas and will be confiscated for violation of these carpool regulations.
- D. A replacement for a lost or stolen carpool card will be issued only after completion of the appropriate police report and payment of \$15.00 replacement fee. Use of a lost or stolen carpool card will result in cancellation of parking privileges for the remainder of the year.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

The Parking and Traffic Regulations recommended for approval by the U.T. Board of Regents have been approved by an attorney in the Office of General Counsel and are based on model regulations approved by that office. These regulations supercede all prior Parking and Traffic Regulations.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

SECTION I

QUICK REFERENCE TO PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

- 1. PERMITS REQUIRED FOR ACCESS AND PARKING: Only vehicles conspicuously displaying proper University permits (as specified in Section VI, infra) may enter or park on the campus (as shown by the boundaries on the map accompanying these regulations). Only vehicles conspicuously displaying proper University permits (as specified in Section VI, infra) may enter or park in the Central Control Zone (as described in Section III) between the hours of 7:00am and 4:00pm, Monday through Friday during Fall and Spring Sessions, and between 6:00am and 3:00pm, Monday through Friday during Summer Sessions. (Motorcycles, mopeds (motor assisted bicycles) and motor scooters may drive through the Central Control Zone only after these hours, and may park only in areas designated for such vehicles or in motorcycle areas or in bicycle racks/concrete parking blocks as specified in Section IV, infra.)
- 2. DISPLAY OF PERMITS: Parking permits must be properly affixed to the vehicle(s) as described in Section VI. Decals which are taped or affixed by unauthorized materials or displayed on a vehicle other than the vehicle to which issued will subject the holder to citation. Additionally, the permit may be revoked and the holder may lose all parking privileges (Section VIII, infra)
- 3. REMOVAL OF PERMITS: Permits (decals) shall be removed when there is a change of vehicle ownership; when association with the University is terminated; when a replacement permit has been issued to take the place a previously issued permit; or upon expiration or revocation (Section VI, infra).
- 4. CLASSES OF PERMITS: Class F permits will be issued to members of the faculty only.

 Class S permits will be issued to members of the staff, non-classified personnel and to other persons approved by the Committee.

 Class A permits will be issued to all students, including graduates.

 Class H permits will be issued to disabled students.

 Class M permits will be issued to students with motorcycles, motorbikes, mopeds and motor scooters. The

Class D permits will be issued to residents of the University Residence Halls.
Class V permits will be issued to residents of UTEP village.
Class R permits will be issued to participants of Student Share-A-Ride Program.
Class O permits will be issued to persons specified and approved by the Parking and Traffic Committee.

- 5. PERMIT RESTRICTIONS: Class F permit holders are permitted to park in any area designated for faculty, faculty-staff, or faculty-staff-visitor. Class S permit holders are permitted to park in any area designated for staff, faculty-staff or faculty-staff-visitor, but not in an area designated for faculty only. Class A permit holders are permitted to park in any areas designated for students only. Class A permit holders may park within the Central Control Zone between the hours of 4:00pm and 7:00am, Monday through Friday during Fall and Spring Sessions and between the hours of 3:00pm and 6:00am, Monday through Friday during the Summer Sessions. They may park in any area not restricted by proper sign or marking. Class H permit holders may park in any faculty, staff or visitor parking area, or in marked Handicap spaces if severely disabled requiring wheelchair or walker. Class M permit holders are permitted to park in areas designated for motorcycles, or two wheeled vehicles, only. Class D permit holders are permitted to park in areas designated for dormitory residents only. They are permitted to purchase a Class A permit to park in any other areas. Class V permit holders are permitted to park in areas designated for Village parking only. They may purchase Class A permits to park in any other areas. Class R permit holders are permitted to park in designated student Share-A-Ride spaces. Class O permit holders are permitted to park in the space marked as reserved for the holder.
- 6. LOADING ZONE PERMITS: A Loading Zone Permit is required to use these spaces/areas Monday through Friday from 7:00am to 4:00pm unless otherwise posted. Permits (normally valid for 30 minutes) may be obtained from the guards at the traffic control stations. When the control stations are closed, call 5724 for assistance.
- 7. BICYCLE REGISTRATION: Bicycles operated or parked on the campus shall be registered with the University Police Department. Contact the Crime Prevention Officer at 747-5611 for assistance. There shall be no charge for this service.

- 8. BICYCLES, MOPEDS (MOTOR-ASSISTED BICYCLES) AND SKATES: Bicycles and Mopeds must be operated in accordance with, and skaters must conform to, the ordinances of the City of El Paso, the specific applicable provisions of these regulations concerning parking restrictions and traffic control as specified in Section IV, infra, and applicable State Law.
- 9. PARKING LOTS: On occasion during the year, certain parking lots, or portions thereof, may be closed upon recommendation by the Parking and Traffic Committee and approved by the President of the University.
- 10. SPEED LIMITS: The speed limit on all parts of the campus, whether on streets or in parking lots, is 15mph, unless otherwise posted. The speed limit on Sun Bowl Drive, from it's intersection with Schuster Avenue to it's intersection with Dawson Road, will be 20mph. The speed limit on Sun Bowl Drive, from it's intersection with Dawson Road to a point immediately west of the Special Events Center, at it's juncture with the City of El Paso Jurisdiction, will be 30mph.
- 11. POSTED SIGNS: Posted signs, whether permanent or temporary, must be obeyed at all times and take precedence over painted curbs, pavement markings and designations shown on any University maps.
- 12. PARKING IMPROPERLY: A vehicle shall not park on a street where angle parking is required, with the back of the vehicle towards the curb, nor shall a vehicle be parked opposite the flow of traffic in the traffic lane where parallel parking is required. Parking wholly within the marked boundaries of the parking space is required at all times. Vehicles shall not park in a manner that obstructs walkways, driveways, ramps, loading docks, marked cross-walks or inflicts damage to shrubbery, trees, grass, grounds or structures. Additionally, no vehicle may park on any unmarked or unimproved area which has not been marked or designated for parking.
- 13. REGISTRATION OF TWO VEHICLES: An alternate vehicle may be registered by faculty or staff at a fee of five (\$5.00) dollars. Students may register one additional vehicle upon separate application and by paying the required additional fee. Both vehicles may not enter or park on campus at the same time. (Section VI,infra).
- 14. ENFORCEMENT AND IMPOUNDMENTS: Failure to abide by these regulations may be the basis for disciplinary action against students, and faculty/staff (Section V, infra). Upon notice, violators may be subject to impoundment of their vehicle(s) pending payment of overdue charges (Section VII, infra). Students may also be barred from readmissions and have grades, degree, refunds or official transcripts withheld pending payment of overdue charges (Section VII, infra). Vehicles may also be impounded for specific impound violations.
- 15. APPEAL OF CITATION: University parking and traffic citations may be appealed, within 10 working days from date of citation, by filing a Citation Appeal Form with the Parking and Traffic Administration Office, (See Section VIII for detailed procedures). Court Appearance Citations are handled by the appropriate state or municipal court.
- 16. VISITORS: All visitors need permits to park on campus UNLESS parked at Athletic, Special Event or Extra-curricular Activities open to the public. OFFICIAL VISITORS are those who conduct business or who render an important

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service to the University and who are not otherwise eligible for annual parking permits. Official Visitors may obtain temporary parking permits from the guards at the traffic control stations, in the Police Dispatcher's Office or from officers on the street. These permits entitle the holder to to park only in a space designated "Official Visitor". Permits must be conspicuously displayed on the driver's side of the vehicle. (Section VI.infra).

- 17. PEDESTRIAN RIGHTS AND DUTIES: Pedestrians must obey all traffic control devices. They have the right-of-way at marked crosswalks, in intersections and on sidewalks extending across a service drive, building entrance or driveway. Pedestrians crossing a street at any point other than within a marked crosswalk or within an unmarked crosswalk at an intersection shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles on said street. Pedestrians shall not leave the curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle which is so close that it is impossible for the driver to yield. Pedestrians may cross at an intersection diagonally only where permitted by special pavement marking.
- 18. INOPERABLE VEHICLES: If a vehicle becomes inoperable, a telephone call shall be placed to the to the University Police at 747-5611. The police will either render assistance or authorize temporary parking. Temporary parking shall not exceed 24 hours and must not create an obstruction or hazard.

SECTION II

GENERAL PROVISIONS

Pursuant to the authority granted by Sections 51.201 et seq.; 54.005, 54.503, 65.31 and 69.02 of Title 3 of the Texas Education Code, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System has promulgated Parking and Traffic Regulations to regulate and control parking and traffic and the use of parking facilities, to provide for the issuance of vehicle identification insignia (parking permit). and to provide for jurisdiction over offenses. This booklet contains those regulations and procedures applicable to any person who walks or drives and parks a motor vehicle or bicycle on the campus of The University of Texas at El Paso. These rules and regulations are supplementary to the ordinances of the City of El Paso and the Statutes of the State of Texas which govern pedestrians and the use of motor vehicles and bicycles.

The operation of a motor vehicle or bicycle on The University of Texas at El Paso campus is a PRIVILEGE granted by the University and is not an inherent right of any faculty/staff member or student. All faculty, staff and students who have motor vehicles in their possession or control for use, operation or parking in the University campus must register said vehicle with the Parking and Traffic Administration Office. Registration of a motor vehicle does not guarantee a parking place on campus.

The University is not responsible for fire, theft, damage to, or loss of vehicle parked or operated on the University campus. No bailment is created by granting of any parking or operating privileges regarding a vehicle on any property owned, leased or otherwise controlled by the University.

The administration and enforcement of the regulations contained in this booklet are as follows:

UNIVERSITY PARKING AND TRAFFIC COMMITTEE: This committee is composed of faculty, staff and students and is responsible for formulating regulations for the control of parking and traffic upon the campus in the form of recommendations to the President of the University. Within the limitations imposed by restricted facilities and staff, it attempts to provide reasonable regulations for the control of the very high density of vehicular and pedestrian traffic on the campus, toward the goal of optimum convenience and safety of all concerned. Requests for individual consideration or any communications concerning these regulations should be directed to this committee.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC ADMINISTRATION OFFICE: This office is responsible for all administrative functions relating to the issuance of parking permits, the recording of parking and traffic violation charges, the acceptance of appeals from such violations and the collection, through it's representative in the Cashier's Office in the Bursar's Office in the Administration Building, of charges for parking and traffic violations. Questions relating to these functions should be directed to Parking and Traffic Administration in the University Police Building.

STUDENT TRAFFIC COURT: This panel is composed of three student justices appointed by the Student Association. Student Parking and traffic violation appeals may be directed to this panel upon application through the Parking and Traffic Administration. Appeals may be made in writing or in person, preferably in person. Appeals for moving traffic citations must be made in person. Decisions of the panel may be appealed further to the Student Supreme Court or the Dean of Students.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC APPEALS BOARD: This panel, appointed by the President of the University, is composed of 2 faculty members and 1 staff member and rules on appeals from citations issued to faculty and staff by University Police for violations of parking and traffic regulations.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REVIEW BOARD: This board is composed of the members of the Parking and Traffic Appeals Board and the Student Traffic Court. It conducts limited hearings concerning impoundment, suspension of driving and parking privileges on the campus, and cases to allow an individual an opportunity to show that the vehicle in question was not owned, registered or used by the individual or to show that the individual receiving notice of impending sanctions does not have unpaid parking and traffic charges.

UNIVERSITY POLICE: The University Police have the responsibility and the legal authority for the enforcement of the Parking and Traffic Regulations listed in this booklet. University police officers may issue University citations or Court appearance citations ENFORCEABLE IN COURT. (See Section VIII). On special occasions and emergencies, such parking limitations may be imposed by the Chief of the University Police as are required by the conditions which prevail. When conditions warrant such action, the Chief may waive parking limitations.

The University reserves the right to enforce parking and traffic regulations:

1. through the issuance of University citations and the collection of administrative enforcement charges for offenses;

2. through the impoundment of vehicles interfering with the movement of vehcular or pedestrian traffic or blocking a sidewalk, ramp, loading dock, cross-walk, entrance, exit, fire lane or aisle and through the impoundment of vehicles for unpaid charges after proper notice as provided by these regulations;

3. by the suspension or revocation of permits;

4. by requiring either the vehicle owner or the person who has registered the vehicle with the University Parking and Traffic Administration Office, to appear in court or at a University hearing for non-payment of outstanding charges;

5. by barring the readmission and withholding the grades, degrees, refunds and official transcripts of any student for non-payment of outstanding charges;

6. by disciplinary action against employees or students who fail to abide by these regulations;

7. by denying parking permits to those with overdue charges;8. by the issuance of Court Appearance Citations requiring an appearance in the appropriate state or municipal court; and

9. by such other methods as are commonly employed by city governments or state

agencies in control of traffic regulation enforcement.

Proof of the fact that any parking or traffic control device, sign, parking meter, signal or marking was actually in place at any location on campus of the University of Texas at El Paso, Shall constitute prima facie evidence that the same is official and was installed under the authority of applicable law and these regulations.

When any person is charged with having stopped, parked and left standing a motor vehicle on the campus of The University of Texas at El Paso, in violation of any provision of the Parking and Traffic Regulations of The University of Texas at El Paso, proof that such vehicle was, at the date of the offense, bearing a valid University of Texas at El Paso parking permit shall constitute prima facie evidence that said vehicle was then and there stopped, parked and left standing by the holder of the parking permit. However, if the vehicle does not bear a valid University of Texas at El Paso parking permit, proof that said vehicle at the date of the offense alleged, was owned by an individual is prima facie evidence that said vehicle was then and there stopped, parked and left standing by said individual.

The University assumes no responsibility for any vehicle or any duty to protect any vehicle or it's contents at anytime the vehicle is operated or parked on the campus,

The University may deem a motor vehicle, including a motorcycle, or motor scooter, or moped or bicycle parked on the University campus for more than 48 hours to be abandoned and may dispose of such vehicle as provided in Article 6687-9, Texas Revised Civil Statutes.

SECTION 111

DEFINITIONS

1. UNIVERSITY CAMPUS: All property owned or under the control of The University of Texas at El Paso.

2. CENTRAL CONTROL ZONE: The Central Control Zone is that area enclosed by the manned traffic control points and any other barriers erected on access streets running into or through the University Campus.

3. PARKING AREA: Any area on campus which has been designated and marked for

parking, whether on streets or in lots.

4. DESIGNATED PARKING SPACE: That area outlined by white painted boundary lines on the pavement of any parking area. Areas not marked by boundary lines are not parking spaces.

5. NO PARKING ZONE: In addition to zones marked by posted signs, any yellowpainted curbs or yellow-painted zones on pavements designated no parking at

6. TOW-AWAY ZONE: An area designated by an official posted sign which constitutes public notice that a vehicle parked in violation will be

removed.

7. LOADING ZONE: A zone marked by posted signs and yellow-painted curbs or zones reserved for loading/unloading only.

8. VEHICLE: Includes automobiles, buses, trucks, trailers, motorcycles, motorbikes, motorscooters, mopeds tractors or any other self-propelled vehicle.

9. VISITORS: A person who is neither a student nor a faculty/staff member.

10. STUDENT: Every person duly registered, enrolled and attending classes at the University, either full or part time.

11. DRIVER: Every person who drives, operates, or is in actual physical

control of a vehicle.

SECTION IV

GENERAL TRAFFIC REGULATION

1. The purpose of these regulations is to facilitate the safe and orderly conduct of University business and to provide for the control of traffic

2. On special occasions or in emergencies, parking and traffic limitations may be imposed or changed by the Chief of the University Police as conditions

warrant.

3. The operation of a vehicle shall be restricted to the campus drives, streets

and parking lots.

- 4. The Speed Limit on the campus is 15 miles per hour on all drives and streets and 10 miles per hour in all parking lots, unless otherwise posted. Speed Limit on Sun Bowl Drive shall be 20 miles per hour from its intersection with Schuster Avenue to it's intersection with Dawson Road, and 30 miles per hour from it's intersection with Dawson Road to a point directly west of the Special Events Center at it's juncture with the City of El Paso jurisdiction.
- 5. It shall be a violation to commit any act prohibited by these regulations
- or to fail to do any act required by these regulations.

 6. No person shall fail or refuse to comply with any lawful order or direction of any University Police Officer, Police Guard or Police Parking Controller invested by law or these regulations to direct, control or regulate traffic.
- 7. If any part of these parking and traffic regulations is held to be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions which can be given effect without the invalid provision, and to this end the provisions of these regulations are declared to be severable.

SECTION V

PARKING REGULATIONS

The various classes of parking permits and their eligibility requirements, privileges and limitations are described in detail in Section VI.

On University holidays, only those parking restrictions which regulate parking at all times shall remain in effect.

Failure to abide by parking and traffic regulations may be the basis for disciplinary action against students and employees. Students may be subjected to penalties ranging from disciplinary probation to expulsion from the Institution as outlined in Section 3.13 of the Rules and Regulations of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System, Chapter VI, Part One. Employees may be subjected to disciplinary penalties including termination of employment as outlined in Section C of the Handbook of Operating Procedures. When an employee has accumulated three or more unpaid parking or traffic violations and/or charges of \$25.00 or more, the employee's Dean, Director or Administrative Official shall be notified by the Parking and Traffic Administration Office Supervisor. When a student is placed on the bar list for unpaid parking or traffic violations, the Dean of Students shall be notified by the Parking and Traffic Administration Office Supervisor.

SECTION VI

PARKING PERMITS

A. FACULTY AND STAFF: A parking permit will be issued upon application to the Parking and Traffic Administration Office or the Parking and Traffic Administration Office Representative in the Bursar's Office. Fees must be paid in the Bursar's Office. Permits will be issued to the vehicle for which the faculty or staff member, spouse or parent is the registered owner. If the registered owner is other than above, (1) the owner or person in custody of the vehicle must be either related to or domiciled with the applicant, and (2) the owner or person in custody of the vehicle must not be otherwise eligible for a University Parking Permit.

Holders of Class F and S permits may register an alternate vehicle by paying an additional fee of \$5.00 in the Bursar's Office, provided that both vehicles are owned by the applicant or another person as specified above, with the understanding that both vehicles shall not be parked on campus at the same time unless one is parked at a meter. Proof of ownership may be required with such applications.

- B. STUDENTS: A parking permit will be issued for a vehicle owned by the student, spouse, parent or guardian. If the registered owner is other than above, (1) the owner or person in custody of the vehicle must be either related to or domiciled with the applicant, and (2) the owner or person in custody of the vehicle must not be otherwise eligible for a University Parking Permit. Students may register ONE additional motor vehicle, motor-cycle, motor-assisted bicycle, or motor scooter upon separate application and payment of the required fee to the Bursar's Office, however, both may not be operated or parked on the campus at the same time. In addition, students must present a paid fee receipt for the current semester. Students may pay the required parking permit fees at time of regular registration.
- C. DISPLAY OF PERMITS: Permit(s) must be displayed on the vehicle to which it was issued. Permits (decals) shall be affixed on the vehicle according to the instructions furnished with the decal. Taping or otherwise affixing the decal will result in citations being issued.
- D. REMOVAL OF PERMITS: Permits (decals) shall be removed:
 - 1. whenever there is a change of vehicle ownership;
 - 2. when association with the University is terminated;
 - 3. when a replacement permit (decal) has been issued to take the place

of a previously issued permit (decal); or 4. upon expiration or revocation of the permit or decal.

A Class F or S permit allows the holder to enter the Central Control Zone and park in any area designated for their particular class of permit. Holders of these permits may also park in areas outside the Central Control Zone designated for their particular class of permit.

A Class A permit allows the holder to park in any area designated for student parking. Holders of these permits may not enter or park within the Central Control Zone except between the hours of 4:00pm and 7:00am Monday through Friday during the Fall and Spring Semesters and between the hours of 3:00pm and 6:00am Monday through Friday during Summer Sessions.

A Class H Permit allows the holder to enter the Central Control Zone and park in any area designated for parking except for those spaces specifically marked as reserved. Designated Handicapped spaces should be utilized by persons with severe walking disabilities (wheelchair or walker assisted).

All disabled veterans whose vehicles display the specially designed license plates issued by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with the words "Disabled Vet" printed thereon in accordance with provisions of Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes Article 6675a-5e and all permanently disabled persons whose vehicles display the specially designed symbols, tabs or other devices (to include a vehicle in which a temporarily disabled person identification card is placed in the lower left hand side

> of the front windshield) issued by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with the word "Disabled" printed thereon in accordance with the provisions of Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes Article 6675a-5e.1 are exempt from parking fees and from parking meter fees and times limits. These exemptions permit parking only in spaces where parking would otherwise be appropriate and do not permit the parking of a vehicle at a place where parking is restricted or prohibited.

A Class M permit will be honored only after it has been properly and completely affixed on the front fender of the vehicle so that it may be readily seen when viewed from the front of the vehicle. NOTE: IF no front fender is available, mount permit on the right front fork so that it may be readily seen when viewed from the front of the vehicle. Permits may not be affixed by tape or any other unauthorized method. The permit is not transferrable and must be affixed to the vehicle for which it was issued.

PARKING:

A. <u>Motorcycles and Motor Scooters</u> shall park <u>only</u> in designated Class M parking parking areas at all times.

B. Motor-Assisted Bicycles and Mopeds (with a total engine displacement of Tess than 50cc) may park in either designated Class M areas or in those bicycle racks/blocks located outside the Central Control Zone during hours that zone is restricted for student parking as outlined in Section 1. After those hours, these vehicles may park in either a Class M area or in any bicycle rack/block provided for bicycle parking.

NOTE: Motorcycles, Motor Scooters, Mopeds and Motor-Assisted Bicycles shall not be parked or otherwise secured in unauthorized places e.g. sidewalks, posts, railings, trees, etc. Neither may these vehicles use spaces marked for passenger cars or trucks.

OPERATION:

Motorcycles, Motor Scooters, Mopeds and Motor-Assisted Bicycles shall not be ridden or operated on pedestrian walkways or sidewalks. On University streets, operators shall comply with ALL traffic control devices e.g. one-way signs, stop signs, etc.

A Class D permit allows the holder to park in ONLY the area designated for residents of University Residence Halls. Residents may purchase a Class A permit if they desire to park in other authorized student parking.

A Class V permit allows the holder to park in ONLY the area designated for residents of UTEP Village. Residents may purchase a Class A permit if they desire to park in other authorized student parking.

A Class R permit allows the holders to park in areas designated and marked for STUDENT SHARE-A-RIDE participants. Each member of the car pool must display a current Glass-A-permit [Class R validation decal] on the vehicle being used. Class R permit holders may purchase and display a Class A permit if desired.

A Class O permit allows the holder to park in a space designated for the holder. These spaces are reserved at all times and the use of the space may not be informally assigned to anyone other than the holder. These pennits will only be issued to persons specified and approved by the Parking and Traffic Committee.

A Loading Zone permit allows the holder to park in designated Loading Zones for a period of time only long enough to conduct the actual loading or unloading operations. Loading Zone permits are valid only for the date and time issued and must reflect an expiration time. Loading Zone permits may

be obtained from the Traffic Control Station officers or the Parking and Traffic Administration Office. A visitor permit allows the holder to park in designated visitor spaces or in any area specified at the time of issuance. Visitor permits may be issued at the Traffic Control Stations or through the Parking and Traffic Administration Office.

A temporary permit allows the holder to park in areas authorized by the regular class permit held by the person requesting the temporary permit. Temporary permits will be issued for periods not to exceed two weeks when needed by regular permit holders in cases where the registered vehicle is in need of repair or similar reasons. Temporary permits may also be issued to persons with official business on campus for short periods of time, or as authorized by the Parking and Traffic Committee.

Special permits may be issued to persons retired from the University or other persons as authorized by the President and who render a continuing, valuable service to the University.

- F. PAYMENT OF FEES: When an application is made for a permit, the fee charged will be for a complete year or for the entire unexpired portion of the University's permit year. Payment of the fee must be made before the permit will be issued.
- G. REPLACEMENT CHARGES: Any time replacement permits are issued there will be a \$.50 charge made. Remnants of old permits are to be returned at that time. If remnants are not returned, replacement permits will be at the REGULAR RATE.
- H. REFUNDS: A request for refund will not be honored unless it is filed with the Parking and Traffic Administration Office during the University's fiscal year in which payment for the permit was made. A request for refund must be accompanied by the remnants of the appropriate permit. Refunds will be made to members of the faculty and staff upon request and only in the event service is terminated by a resignation or leave of absence without pay. The refund will be based on the number of full months remaining in the University's permit year. No refunds will be made after the end of the spring semester. Refunds will be made, upon request, to students who withdraw from the University at the end of the fall semester, but refunds will not be made to students who withdraw at the end of the spring semester. A request for a refund will not be honored when a person's privilege to park or drive on campus has been suspended nor if outstanding charges or other debts remain unpaid. Requests for refunds of the entire amount paid will be subject to a \$5.00 administrative and handling charge.

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If the administrative enforcement charges are not paid within 12 calendar days after issuance of the citation, a \$5.00 late charge will be assessed.

SECTION VIII

ENFORCEMENT

- A. PARKING AND TRAFFIC CITATIONS: University Police are authorized to issue two types of citations for violation of University parking and traffic regulations:
 - UNIVERSITY CITATIONS Those handled by the University, subject to University administrative enforcement charges and a right to appeal

within the University (Paragraph E below).

2. COURT APPEARANCE (CA) CITATIONS - Those issued by the University Police constituting a summons to appear in either municipal court or a justice court.

B. POLICY WITH RESPECT TO COURT APPEARANCE (CA) CITATIONS: The University reserves the right to issue a CA citation for any violation. It is the general policy of the University, however, to issue CA citations at the University's option as follows:

1. for moving violations;

- 2. for any violation when the individual's driving or parking privileges has been suspended (See Paragraph E below); or
- 3. when an individual receives a University citation and all reasonable attempts at collection have failed.
- C. PROCEDURE FOR UNIVERSITY CITATIONS: University citations are issued for offenses described in Section VII. The administrative enforcement charges are as shown. If the charge is not paid within 12 calendar days after issuance of the citation, a \$5.00 late charge will be assessed.

Every person receiving a University Citation shall remit the amount of the charge to the Cashier's Office in the Bursar's Office. Payment must be received within 12 calendar days after issuance of the citation, to avoid a late charge.

If a person desires to appeal a University citation, he/she shall comply with Paragraph E below within 12 calendar days after issuance of the citation.

Requests for exceptions to the above referenced calendar days, will be considered on an individual basis, if mitigating or unusual circumstances exist. Such requests shall be submitted in writing to the Parking and Traffic Administration Office and shall detail the reason(s) such a request is being made. Requests based solely on alleged non-receipt of a copy of the citation will not be honored.

Unpaid charges for parking offenses are recorded either in the name of the person in whose name the vehicle is registered with some official state motor vehicle registration department or agency, or in the name of the person who has registered the vehicle with the Parking and Traffic Administration Office.

NOTE: If a student has the same family name and/or home address as the registered owner, then the unpaid charges will also be recorded in the student's name. Unpaid charges for other offenses (such as moving violations) may be recorded in the name of the person who has registered it with the Parking and Traffic Administrative Office, or in the name of the registered owner.

When Court Appearance citations are issued, the University citations will be cancelled. Failure to discharge CA citations may result in the issuance of a warrant for the arrest of such person.

Persons with unpaid charges recorded in their names shall be ineligible to receive parking permits while such charges remain unpaid. To obtain a permit, a person shall either pay the charge or timely request a University hearing.

D. IMPOUNDMENT OF VEHICLES, BARRING OF READMISSION AND WITHHOLDING OF GRADES, DEGREES OFFICIAL TRANSCRIPTS AND REFUNDS: When unpaid charges are recorded, the Parking and Traffic Administration Office shall send a return receipt letter to the last known address of the person in whose name the charges are recorded.

Such letter shall state that unless (1) payment of all accumulated charges is made within 12 calendar days after the date of such letter or (2) a written request is made within 12 calendar days to appear before a University hearing committee concerning impoundment of the vehicle in case of faculty, staff, student or visitor, or for barring of readmission and/or withholding of grades, degree, official transcripts and refunds in the case of students as authorized in the Regent's Rules and Regulations, Part One, Chapter VI, Section 9 and state law, the appropriate enforcement action will take place without further notice.

Such a hearing is not an appeal of the Parking and Traffic citations but is a limited hearing to allow the individual an opportunity to show that the vehicle in question was not owned, registered or used by the individual or to show that the individual receiving notice of impeding sanctions does not have unpaid Parking and Traffic charges.

At such a hearing, which will be held after a reasonable period of time, the person requesting the hearing will assume the burden of showing why the appropriate enforcement action should not take place.

If timely payment is not received and either the registered owner or the person who has registered the vehicle with the University has failed to appear at the requested University impoundment hearing or has failed to meet his or her burden of proof, the vehicle may be impounded pending payment of all outstanding charges, including towing and storage charges, without further notice.

If timely payment is not received from a student and the student has failed to appear at the requested hearing or has appeared and has failed to meet his or her burden of proof, the student may be barred from readmission and grades, degrees, official transcripts and refunds may be withheld, without further notice.

APPEALS FROM UNIVERSITY CITATION(S): Any person who has received a University citation may file a request to have the citation reviewed. This appeal must be filed with the Parking and Traffic Administration Office no later than 12 calendar days after the citation was issued. If an appeal is not filed within this time the citation is deemed final.

Appeals shall be prepared in writing on the "Citation Appeal" form provided by the Parking and Traffic Administration Office. Appeals may be based solely on the written statement or the appealing party may also request a personal appearance. Failure to request a personal appearance or failure to appear at the hearing (as requested) will result in the decision being rendered on the basis of the written statement (including any supporting material submitted) and the information as shown on the citation(s).

Each "Citation Appeal" form will be reviewed by the appropriate University Appeals Panel for a decision and the appealing party will be notified, in

> writing, of the decision. The Appeals Panel may order the payment of the administrative enforcement charge(s) in whole or in part or the cancellation of such charge(s). If the appeal is denied and the appealing party fails to pay the charge(s) or to request a review of the appeal (See Paragraph F below) within 12 calendar days after date of notification, a \$5.00 late charge will be assessed on the citation(s).

REVIEW OF APPEAL FROM UNIVERSITY CITATION(S): Any person who has appealed a F. University citation(s) and who is not satisfied with the decision by the appropriate appeals panel, may have the decision reviewed by the Student Supreme Court or Dean of Students in case of students, Vice President of Academic Affairs in case of faculty or the Vice President of Business Affairs or Dean of Students in case of respective staff. Such request shall be submitted in writing to the Parking and Traffic Administrative Office within 12 calendar days from the date of the original decision.

This written request shall set forth the grounds on which the appealing party believes the decision was improper or inequitable. Such written request shall be submitted in an original plus 2 legible copies (reproduced copies are acceptable) and include the following:

citation number(s);

license number of vehicle(s);
 date of notification of original decision;

4. date review requested; and

5. printed or typed name, address, and signature of person requesting the review.

Each review will be considered by the appropriate appeals authority. The authority may uphold the decision of the appropriate appeals panel or they may reverse the decision in whole or in part, as deemed appropriate.

The decision of the appropriate University Appeals Authority shall be final.

SUSPENSION OF PRIVILEGE TO DRIVE AND PARK ON CAMPUS: The loss of the privilege of driving or parking a motor vehicle on campus shall commence 12 calendar days after the Parking and Traffic Administration Office mails a letter to the person, at the address of such person as shown in the records of that office, stating that such person's privilege of driving or parking a motor vehicle on campus has been suspended. Such letter shall state the term of suspension and will give notification of possible impoundment for parking offenses committed during the period of suspension and shall state the reason for such suspension.

Any person who (a) forges or alters a permit; (b) uses a forged or altered permit; (c) transfers a permit, affixes a permit to a vehicle other than for which it was issued, or fails to destroy a permit when required to do so by these regulations with the intention of providing any person with parking privileges he/she is not entitled to under these regulations; (d) provides false information to obtain a parking permit with knowledge thereof; or (e) parks or drives a vehicle to which there has been affixed a permit which the registered owner, or regular driver, did not purchase, shall lose the privilege of driving or parking on the University campus for six months. While a person's privilege of driving or parking a vehicle on campus is suspended, it is unlawful (1) for that person to drive or park any motor vehicle on the campus and (2) for any person to drive or park a

vehicle registered in the name of such person on campus.

If a person whose privilege of driving or parking on campus has been suspended receives a University citation by reason of having a vehicle on campus during the period of suspension, the period of suspension shall be extended so that it expires twelve months from the date the person received such additional suspension. In addition, the violation of the suspension shall be reported to the Dean of Students if the person is a student, or to the appropriate Dean, Director or Administrative Official for possible disciplinary action if the person is a faculty or staff member.

A person receiving notice that his/her privilege of driving or parking a vehicle on campus has been suspended may appeal the suspension within twelve calendar days on the grounds that the imposition of such suspension is improper or will create serious and substantial hardship. Such appeal will be governed by the provisions of Part D above. No appeal shall be considered if there are any unpaid citations outstanding at the time such appeal is filed, unless special arrangements are made with the Parking and Traffic Administration Office.

- 1. DESTRUCTION OF PERMIT WHEN SUSPENDED: Every person receiving notice that his/her privilege of driving or parking on the campus has been suspended shall remove the parking permit(s) from every vehicle registered in his/her name and return the remnants thereof to the Parking and Traffic Administration Office within twelve days after date of such notice. Failure to do so shall be reported to the Dean of Students if the person is a student, or to the appropriate Dean, Director or Administrative Official, if the person is a faculty or staff member.
- 1. LLIGIBILITY TO OBTAIN NEW PERMIT DURING PERIOD OF SUSPENSION: A person whose privilege of driving and parking on the campus is suspended and not reinstated, shall be ineligible to receive a parking permit of any type during the period of suspension.
- 1. TWO VEHICLES ON CAMPUS: When an applicant who has registered two vehicles is found to have both vehicles parked on campus at the same time in violation of the Alternate Vehicle Policy (Section VI, infra), the following shall apply:

First Offense - The Parking and Traffic Administration Office shall notify the permit holder that he/she has violated these regulations and that any further violation will result in the loss of the permit for the alternate vehicle. Additionally any citation(s) which may

have been issued are due and payable.

2. Second Offense - The Parking and Traffic Administration Office shall notify the permit holder that he/she has again violated these regulations. Such written notice will inform the permit holder that he/she must surrender the permit from the alternate vehicle in addition to making payment for any citation(s) which may have been issued for this offense. Additionally, the permit holder shall not be able to register an alternate vehicle for the remainder of the current permit year. Failure to abide by this second notice will subject the permit holder to all enforcement sanctions including those described in Section V.

(. IMPOUNDMENT: The term "impoundment" includes towing, removal, immobilization, and storage of the vehicle in question.

In addition to any charge that may be levied by the University for an offense resulting in removal or immobilization, the owner of an impounded vehicle must also pay a commercial wrecker service fee and storage charges after the first 24 hours. When an IMPOUND <u>VIOLATION</u> and the owner or driver of the vehicle appears on the scene before the arrival of the wrecker, the vehicle will not be impounded. If the owner or driver appears on the scene after the arrival of the wrecker and the wrecker driver has made a hookup, the following will apply:

The vehicle will not be impounded; and

 the owner or driver will be expected to pay the wrecker a fee, in lieu of towing.

If the vehicle is impounded, the registered owner or permit holder will be sent a notice at the address on file with the Parking and Traffic Administrative Office.

PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS 1986-1987

SECTION 1 QUICK REFERENCE TO PARKING AND TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

- 1. PERMITS REQUIRED FOR ACCESS AND PARKING (visitors excepted)
 - A. The University of Texas at San Antonio's parking permit for four-wheel vehicles is a transferable hanging permit (hereinafter called "hanging permit") made of sunlight resistant polyvinyl and is printed on both sides.

Two-wheel vehicles will require the self-adhering parking permit.

- B. Only vehicles conspicuously displaying proper University permits (as specified in Section VI, infra) may enter or park on the campus (as shown by the boundaries on the map accompanying the regulations). Special parking areas are provided for the handicapped and for two-wheel vehicles.
- 2. DISPLAY OF PERMITS

- A. Hanging permits must be clearly visible and hanging from the interior rearview mirror on all four-wheel vehicles as described in Section VI.
- B. Self-adhering permits must be properly affixed to all two-wheel vehicles as described in Section VI.
- 3. REMOVAL OF PERMITS

Parking permits [shall-be-removed-when-there-is-a-change-of-vehicle-ownership;] are to be returned to The University Police Traffic Office when association with The University is terminated[;] or the permit is revoked. [when-a replacement-permit-has-been-issued-to-take-the-place-of-a-previously-issued permit;-or-upon-expiration-or-revocation] (Section VI, Item 3.H.).

- 4. CLASSES OF PERMITS (Section VI, infra)
 - CLASS O Executive Officer
 - CLASS R Reserved (Faculty and Staff)
 - CLASS A General (Faculty and Staff)
 - CLASS G General (Student)
 - CLASS C Motorcycles, Motor Scooters, Motorbikes, Mopeds
 - CLASS D Dormitory (Student)
 - CLASS B Bicycles
 - CLASS H Handicapped

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- CLASS K Mini-Car (Faculty and Staff)
- CLASS M Mini-Car (Student)
- CLASS P Carpool (Faculty and Staff)
- CLASS S Carpool (Student)
- CLASS T Vendors, Salespersons, Technical Representatives, and Other Servicing Personnel

. PERMIT RESTRICTIONS

- A. Parking permits are available for GENERAL parking or MINI-CAR (vehicles fifteen (15) feet or less in length) parking for both students and employees.
- B. Disabled students and/or employees who qualify for handicapped parking privileges in accordance with Section VI must obtain a Handicapped parking permit before parking in specially designated HANDICAPPED parking areas.
- C. All two-wheel vehicles must be parked in those areas specially designated for TWO-WHEEL vehicles except for bicycles which should be parked in any of the BICYCLE parking areas.
- D. RESERVED parking areas are restricted to faculty members and authorized staff members. All vehicles parked in the RESERVED parking areas must display a Reserved parking permit.
- E. CARPOOL parking permits are available for two or more students or employees. All members of the carpool must be present when requesting carpool parking privileges (see Section VI, Item 7, for rules and regulations regarding carpool).
- F. Spaces marked for VISITOR parking are restricted to individuals who are not currently affiliated with either The University of Texas at San Antonio (UTSA) or The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio (UTHSCSA) and should not be utilized by students, employees, or persons who use the facilities on a regular basis. Individuals who need to park on the UTSA campus for purposes of using any of the facilities should contact the University Police Traffic Office, MS 1.02.04 (691-4246), for parking instructions.
- G. DORMITORY parking is restricted for students residing in the dormitory.

6. LOADING ZONE PARKING

Permission to utilize the loading dock areas must be obtained from the University Police Dispatcher upon entering the service drive through any of the controlled access gates. Parking in any of the service drive areas not otherwise marked is restricted to a 30-minute time limit. Any vehicle parked in excess of the 30-minute time limit will be subject to receiving a parking violation citation.

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= BICYCLES, MOPEDS (MOTOR-ASSISTED BICYCLES) AND SKATES

Bicycles and mopeds must be operated in accordance with, and skaters must conform to, the ordinances of the City of San Antonio, the specific applicable provisions of these regulations, all provisions of these regulations concerning parking restrictions and traffic control, and applicable state law.

On occasion during the year, certain parking lots may be closed upon recommendation by the Chief of Police and approval by the President of The University.

SPEED LIMIT

Unless otherwise posted, the speed limit on roads and streets of the campus is 20 mph and the speed limit on all parking lots and service drives is 15 mph (Section IV).

±-} 0. POSTED SIGNS

Posted signs, whether permanent or temporary, must be obeyed at all times and take precedence over painted curbs, pavement markings and designations shown on any University maps.

2-]
1. PARKING IMPROPERLY

A vehicle shall not be parked on a street where angle parking is required, with the back of the vehicle toward the curb, nor shall a vehicle be parked opposite the flow of traffic in the traffic lane where parallel parking is required. Parking wholly within the marked boundaries of the parking space is required at all times. Vehicles shall not be parked in a manner that obstructs walkways, driveways, ramps, loading docks, marked cross-walks or inflicts damage to shrubbery, trees, grass, grounds or structures. Additionally, no vehicle may park on any unmarked or unimproved ground area which has not been marked or designated for parking. Parking is not allowed where prohibited by signs either permanently or temporarily posted, red or yellow curbs, or other markings on streets and parking lots. The fact that other vehicles are parked improperly shall not constitute an excuse for parking with any part of the vehicle extending beyond the marked boundaries of the parking space.

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ENFORCEMENT AND IMPOUNDMENT

Failure to abide by these regulations may be the basis for disciplinary action against students, faculty and staff (Section V, infra).

Upon notice, violators may be subject to impoundment of their vehicle(s) pending payment of overdue charges (Section VIII, infra). Students may also be barred from readmission and have grades, degree, refunds or official transcripts withheld pending payment of overdue charges (Section VIII, infra). Vehicles may also be impounded for specific impound violations.

i÷]3. APPEAL OF CITATION

University parking and traffic citations may be appealed, within five (5) working days from date of citation, by filing a "Citation Appeal" form with the University Police Traffic Office (see Section VIII for detailed procedures). Court Appearance citations are handled by the appropriate state or municipal court.

57) <u>4.</u> VISITORS

Official visitors are those who conduct business with or who render a service to The University and who are not otherwise eligible for parking privileges (Section VI, infra).

Persons who will be on campus for the purpose of using UTSA facilities should contact the University Police Traffic Office for parking information. Students and employees are NOT allowed to park in areas designated for VISITOR parking at any time.

7-1 5. PEDESTRIAN RIGHTS AND DUTIES

Pedestrians must obey all traffic control devices and signs. They have the right-of-way at marked crosswalks, in intersections and on sidewalks extending across a service drive, building entrance or driveway. Pedestrians crossing a street at any point other than within a marked crosswalk or within an unmarked crosswalk at an intersection shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles on said street. Pedestrians shall not leave the curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle which is so close that it is impossible for the driver to yield. Pedestrians may cross an intersection diagonally only where permitted by special pavement marking. No person shall stand in the roadway for the purpose of soliciting a ride.

8-7 inoperable vehicles

If a vehicle becomes inoperable while on the UTSA campus, the driver of said vehicle shall notify the University Police Dispatcher by using one of the parking lot emergency telephones. The police will either render assistance or authorize temporary parking. Temporary parking shall not exceed twenty-four (24) hours and the vehicle must be parked so as not to create an obstruction or hazard.

Auditing students are required to purchase parking permits.

3. RESPONSIBILITY FOR PARKING PERMITS

THE INDIVIDUAL WHO PURCHASES A PARKING PERMIT WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR PARKING VIOLATIONS BY ANY VEHICLE BEARING THE PERMIT.

SECTION 11 GENERAL PROVISIONS

Pursuant to the authority granted by Sections 51.201 et seq., 54.005, 54.503, 65.31, and 71.01 et seq. of Title 3 of the Texas Education Code, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System has promulgated parking and traffic regulations to regulate and control parking and traffic and the use of parking facilities, to provide for the issuance of motor vehicle identification and insignia (parking permit), and to provide for jurisdiction over offenses.

This booklet contains those regulations and procedures applicable to any person who walks or drives and parks a vehicle on the campus of The University of Texas at San Antonio. These rules and regulations are supplementary to the ordinances of the City of San Antonio and the statutes of the State of Texas which govern pedestrians and the use of motor vehicles and bicycles.

The operation of a motor vehicle or bicycle on The University of Texas at San Antonio campus is a PRIVILEGE granted by The University and is not an inherent right of any faculty/staff member or student. All faculty, staff and students who have vehicles in their possession or control for use, operation or parking on The University campus must [register-said-vehicle-with] purchase a parking permit at the University Police Traffic Office. [Registration-of-a-vehicle] Purchase of a parking permit does not guarantee a parking place on campus.

The commissioned University Police Officers are vested with all the powers, privileges and immunities of peace officers while on the property and are empowered to enforce all of these laws and the UTSA Parking and Traffic Regulations.

The University is not responsible for fire, theft, damage to, or loss of any vehicle parked or operated on The University campus. No bailment is created by granting any parking or operating privileges regarding a vehicle on any property owned, leased or otherwise controlled by The University.

The administration and enforcement of the regulations contained in this booklet are as follows:

THE UNIVERSITY STANDING COMMITTEE ON PARKING AND TRAFFIC is composed of eight members consisting of two faculty, two staff members, and two students (one graduate and one undergraduate), the Physical Plant Director (ex officio with vote), and the University Police Chief (ex officio without vote). Faculty and staff shall serve two-year terms. Students serve a one-year term. The charge is to review the Parking and Traffic Regulations for The University of Texas at San Antonio and to develop recommendations for revisions in these regulations as are necessary to an efficient parking and traffic system as it relates to differential parking zones, parking fees, penalties for violations of regulations, arrangements for bicycle and motorcycle traffic, and arrangements for pedestrian paths. The major responsibility of the Committee is to meet monthly, or more often as needed, in order to hear the appeals for parking and traffic violations at The University. The Committee shall also meet prior to early registration and regular registration for each semester.

THE CHIEF OF POLICE, University Police Department, shall review all appeals before forwarding the appeals to the chairperson of the Parking and Traffic Committee.

THE TRAFFIC OFFICE, University Police Department, receives and processes all appeals received within five (5) working days of the date of the ticket and submits all valid appeals to the Chief of Police for review. The Traffic Office maintains files of all [registered-vehicles] parking permits and all campus traffic tickets.

THE UNIVERSITY POLICE DEPARTMENT has the responsibility and the legal authority for the enforcement of the parking and traffic regulations listed in this booklet. Iniversity police officers may issue University citations or court appearance titations ENFORCEABLE IN COURT (See Section VIII). For special occasions and emergencies, such parking limitations may be imposed by the Chief of the University Police Department as are required by the conditions which prevail. When conditions warrant such action, the Chief may waive parking limitations.

The University reserves the right to enforce parking and traffic regulations:

- 1. through the issuance of University citations and the collection of administrative enforcement charges for offenses;
- through the impoundment of vehicles interfering with the movement of vehicular or pedestrian traffic or blocking a sidewalk, ramp, loading dock, crosswalk, entrance, exit, fire lane or aisle and through the impoundment of vehicles for unpaid charges after proper notice as provided by these regulations;
- 3. by the suspension or revocation of permits;
- 4. by requiring either the vehicle owner or the person [who-has-registered-the vehicle-with-the-University-Police-Traffic-Office] whose parking permit is displayed on the vehicle to appear in court or at a University hearing for nonpayment of outstanding charges;
- 5. by barring the readmission and withholding the grades, degrees, refunds and official transcripts of any student for nonpayment of outstanding charges;
- 6. by disciplinary action against employees or students who fail to abide by these regulations;
- 7. by denying parking permits to those with unpaid charges;
- 8. by the issuance of court appearance citations requiring an appearance in the appropriate state or municipal court; and
- 9. by such other methods as are commonly employed by city governments or state agencies in control of traffic regulation enforcement.

Proof of the fact that any parking or traffic control device, sign, parking meter, signal or marking was actually in place at any location on campus of The University of Texas at San Antonio, shall constitute prima facie evidence that the same is official and was installed under the authority of applicable law and these regulations.

When any person is charged with having stopped, parked and left standing a vehicle on campus, in violation of any provision of the UTSA Parking and Traffic Regulations, proof that said vehicle, at the date of the offense, was bearing a valid UTSA parking permit shall constitute prima facie evidence that said vehicle was then and there stopped, parked and left standing by the holder of the parking permit. However, if the vehicle does not bear a valid UTSA parking permit, proof that said vehicle, at the date of the offense alleged, was owned by an individual is prima facie proof that said vehicle was then and there stopped, parked and left standing by said individual.

The University assumes no responsibility or duty to protect any vehicle or its contents anytime the vehicle is operated or parked on the campus.

The University may deem a vehicle parked on The University campus for more than 48 hours without prior authorization to be abandoned and may dispose of such vehicle as provided in Article 6687-9 of the Texas Revised Civil Statutes.

SECTION III DEFINITIONS

The following defined terms are in addition to the definitions and terms of the Texas Motor Vehicle Laws which shall apply on the campus.

UNIVERSITY or UTSA

The University of Texas at San Antonio, Texas.

CAMPUS

The property under the control of The University of Texas at San Antonio.

CHIEF OF POLICE

The Chief of the University Police Department of The University of Texas at San Antonio.

UNIVERSITY POLICE

The University Police Department of The University of Texas at San Antonio acting directly or through its duly authorized officers and agents.

DRIVER

Any person who drives, operates or is in actual physical control of a vehicle.

VEHICLE

Includes automobiles, buses, trucks, trailers, motorcycles, motor scooters, motorbikes, mopeds, bicycles, and tractors.

VISITOR

A person who is neither a student nor an employee of The University of Texas at San Antonio or the UT-Health Science Center at San Antonio; nor is said person someone who uses University facilities for the benefit of any student or employee of either aforementioned institution.

STUDENT

Any person duly registered, enrolled and attending classes at The University of Texas at San Antonio or the UT-Health Science Center at San Antonio (including special students, part-time students and auditing students).

EMPLOYEE

Any person employed by The University of Texas at San Antonio or the UT-Health Science Center at San Antonio, regardless of whether the person is employed with salary or without salary; to include those persons who perform services on campus.

PARKING PERMIT

[Either-a-temporary-mard-or-self-adhering-decal-issued-by-The-University-of-Texas at-San-Antonio-to-be-displayed-on-all-vehicles-authorized-to-park-on-campus.]

Hanging permits for four-wheel vehicles, and self-adhering permits for two-wheel vehicles sold by The University of Texas at San Antonio shall be displayed on all vehicles parked on the campus.

DORMITORY STUDENT

Any person duly registered, enrolled and attending classes at The University of Texas at San Antonio and residing in the dormitory.

SECTION IV GENERAL TRAFFIC REGULATIONS

- The purpose of these regulations is to provide for the safety and welfare of students, employees and visitors and to provide for the control of traffic and parking.
- 2. If any part of these parking and traffic regulations is held to be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions which can be given effect without the invalid provision, and to this end the provisions of these regulations are declared to be severable.
- 3. The provisions of these regulations shall be cumulative of all other laws.
- 4. The driver of an authorized emergency vehicle, when responding to an emergency call or when in pursuit of an actual or suspected violator of the law, or when responding to a fire alarm, may exercise the privileges set forth in this section, but subject to conditions stated.
 - A. The driver of an emergency vehicle may:
 - (1) park or stand, irrespective of the provisions of these regulations and Texas Motor Vehicle Laws;
 - (2) proceed past a red or stop signal or stop sign, but only after slowing down as may be necessary for safe operation;
 - (3) exceed the maximum speed limits so long as life or property is not endangered; or
 - (4) disregard regulations governing direction of movement of traffic or turning in specified directions.
 - B. The exemptions herein granted to an authorized emergency vehicle shall apply only when such vehicle is making use of audible and visual signals, except that an authorized emergency vehicle operated as a police vehicle need not be equipped with or display a red light visible from in front of the vehicle.
- 5. On special occasions and in emergencies, the Chief of Police may impose temporary parking and traffic control restrictions. These temporary restrictions shall have all the force of other written and approved regulations and shall be subject to the same penalties.
- 6. It shall be a violation to commit any act prohibited by these regulations or to fail to do any act required by these regulations.
- 7. The operation of a vehicle shall be restricted to the campus drives, streets and parking lots.
- 8. Vehicles operated or parked on the campus must comply with all State Laws, City Ordinances and the Parking and Traffic Regulations of The University of Texas at San Antonio.
- 9. The speed limit on roads and streets of the campus is 20 miles per hour. The speed limit on all parking lots and service drives is 15 miles per hour, unless otherwise specified.

- 10. The driver of any vehicle involved in a collision shall immediately stop at the scene of such accident or collision, and by the quickest means of communication report such accident or collision to the University Police Department.
- 11. No person shall fait or refuse to comply with any lawful order or direction of any University police officer invested by law with the authority to direct, control and regulate traffic.
- 12. Any person who willfully or through negligence causes damage to The University of Texas at San Antonio property shall be liable for any damage done to said property.
- 13. All vehicles operated or parked upon the campus shall properly display a current parking permit (Visitors refer to Item No. 23, this section).
- 14. All vehicles are required to stop completely at each STOP sign, and then proceed cautiously without creating a hazard to vehicles not required to stop.
- 15. Bicycles shall not be operated on pedestrian walkways or sidewalks. Operation of bicycles is regulated by Texas Motor Vehicle Laws.
- 16. The operator of a vehicle shall yield right-of-way to pedestrians in crosswalks.
- 17. Pedestrians shall cross streets at designated marked pedestrian crosswalks.
 - A. Every pedestrian crossing a roadway at any point other than within a marked crosswalk or within an unmarked crosswalk at an intersection shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles upon the roadway (VCS 6701d, Art. IX, Sec. 78a).
 - B. Pedestrians shall not leave the curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle which is so close that it is impossible for the driver to yield.
 - C. Pedestrians may cross an intersection diagonally only where permitted by special pavement marking.
 - D. No person shall stand in the roadway for the purpose of soliciting a ride.
- 18. No operator of a vehicle shall drive beyond a barricaded area, or where prohibited by temporary or permanent signs and no operator or person shall remove such barricades or signs. University employees whose job is to deliver, install or pick up such barricades or temporary signs upon request by the Chief of Police are excepted.
- 19. No driver or operator of any vehicle shall back any vehicle into an intersection or back upon any shoulder or any traffic lane.
- 20. No person driving a vehicle shall cross, drive in or on a sidewalk, parking lot, driveway or entrances at an intersection for the purpose of making a right or left turn from one street or roadway to another street or roadway as a shortcut or to avoid any traffic control device.
- 21. No person in control or possession of a motor vehicle shall bring the same to a sudden start or stop in a parking lot or street, or accelerate or race the motor so as to cause a loud noise in a manner calculated to disturb the person or persons present.

- $22.\,$ No person may throw or deposit any trash, litter or other waste on any parking area, street or sidewalk.
- 23. Visitors are those individuals who conduct business with or who render a service to The University and who are not otherwise eligible for parking privileges. Persons who will be on campus for the purpose of using UTSA facilities should contact the University Police Traffic Office for parking information (Section VI, infra).
- 24. Color of stripes and curbs are in compliance with the Texas State Department of Highway Specifications. The colors used are red, white and yellow. Red designates no parking at anytime, white identifies crosswalks, parking spaces and stop lines, yellow designates warning, no parking (zebra stripes), traffic lanes, and no passing zones.

SECTION V PARKING REGULATIONS

- The various classes of parking permits and their eligibility requirements, privileges and limitations are described in detail in Section VI.
- 2. Parking and traffic regulations on campus are in effect at all times with the exception that Lot 3 and Lot 9, CARPOOL and RESERVED only, are open to vehicles displaying GENERAL parking permits AFTER 4:30 p.m. weekdays and on weekends.
- Failure to abide by parking and traffic regulations may be the basis for disciplinary action against students and employees.

A. STUDENTS

Students may be subjected to penalties ranging from disciplinary probation to expulsion from the institution as outlined in Section 3.13 of the Rules and Regulations of the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System, Part One, Chapter VI, and the UTSA Institutional Rules on Student Services and Activities. When a student has accumulated four (4) or more unpaid parking or traffic citations and/or charges of \$25.00 or more, the Dean of Students shall be notified by the UTSA Parking and Traffic Committee. See Section VIII (infra) for rules regarding disciplinary action.

B. EMPLOYEES

Employees may be subjected to disciplinary penalties including termination of employment as outlined in the Handbook of Operating Procedures. When an employee has accumulated four (4) or more unpaid parking or traffic citations and/or charges of \$25.00 or more, the employee's Dean, Director or Administrative Official shall be notified by the UTSA Parking and Traffic Committee.

4. GENERAL PARKING REGULATIONS

- A. Only vehicles which have a valid parking permit issued by The University may park on campus.
- B. Parking is restricted to lined parking spaces. Vehicles shall be parked within the boundaries of the designated lined spaces. The fact that other vehicles are parked improperly shall not constitute an excuse for parking with any part of the vehicle over the line.
- C. Bicycles shall not be parked anywhere except in the bicycle parking areas.
- D. Parking is not allowed where prohibited by signs either permanently or temporarily posted, red or yellow curbs, or other markings on streets and parking lots.
- E. Parking is prohibited on any lawn, curb, sidewalk, or any area not designated as a parking space or lot, or in any restricted or unauthorized area.

- F. It is prohibited to park a vehicle in any place where it may create a traffic hazard or where it blocks or impedes pedestrian or vehicular traffic.
- G. Parking a vehicle on campus for more than twenty-four (24) continuous hours requires approval of the University Police Department. Vehicles which are the property of The University are excepted.
- H. VISITOR parking areas may NOT be utilized by UTSA faculty, staff members, or students at any time. See Section VI for permit information.
- I. When four-wheel vehicles are parked diagonally or perpendicular to a curb the front wheels must be within twelve (12) inches of the face of the curb.
- J. Parking spaces designated for the handicapped may be used only by persons who have a parking permit for that space.
- K. Every vehicle parked upon a two-way roadway shall be so parked with the right-hand wheels parallel to and within eighteen (18) inches of the right-hand curb.
- L. Every vehicle parked upon a one-way roadway shall be so parked parallel to the curb in the direction of authorized traffic movement, with its right-hand wheels within eighteen (18) inches of the right-hand curb, or its left-hand wheels within eighteen (18) inches of the left-hand curb.
- M. Vehicles found parked in violation of any State Law, City Ordinance or in violation of these regulations or parked in such a manner as to create a traffic hazard may be impounded, relocated or immobilized at the expense of the violator. The University shall not, nor shall any of its authorized personnel, be liable or assume any responsibility for any loss or damage suffered because of such impoundment, immobilization or relocation.
- N. Passenger vehicles or trucks shall not be parked in spaces reserved for motorcycles or bicycles.
- O. Motorcycles, motor scooters, motorbikes or bicycles shall not be parked in spaces designated for passenger vehicles or trucks.
- P. Vehicles shall not be parked so as to obstruct the entrance or exit of a building.
- Q. Vehicles shall not be parked in any area other than that designated by the permit on the vehicle.
- R. On special occasions and during emergency periods, the Chief of Police may prohibit or extend parking and traffic regulations or any portion thereof.
- S. No person shall stop, park or leave standing any vehicle within an intersection, on a crosswalk, or on a sidewalk.
- T. Temporary parking in the Student Health Service parking lot is restricted only to students requiring emergency or scheduled medical assistance at the Student Health Service facilities.

- U. Parking in loading zones and service drives is restricted to a maximum time limit of thirty (30) minutes and will be allowed only for the actual process of loading and unloading equipment, supplies, and merchandise.
- V. Dormitory parking is restricted to vehicles displaying DGRMITORY parking permits.

SECTION VI PARKING PERMIT REGULATIONS

FACULTY AND STAFF

- A. A [parking] hanging permit or self-adhering permit will be issued upon application and the payment of parking fees to the University Police Traffic Office located in MS 1.02.04. This temporary permit shall expire on the fifth day following the first pay period of said faculty or staff member. All parking permit fees must be paid [and-the-vehicle-properly-registered] upon expiration of the temporary parking permit.

C. Permits for motorcycles, motor scooters, motorbikes, mopeds, and bicycles are to be affixed to the rear fender, or on a tab, or in a case specially designed for use on such vehicles.

MOTOR-ASSISTED TWO-WHEEL VEHICLES

Eligibility for mini-car parking permits will be based on the size of the vehicle. Any vehicle which measures fifteen (15) feet or less from front to rear and has been measured and/or approved by authorized representatives of the University Police Department will qualify for the mini-car parking permit. Any vehicle authorized for mini-car parking will be issued a mini-car parking permit. Mini-car parking areas are located in Lot 1 (north end near Margaret Tobin Drive) and Lot 6 (entire lot) for convenience to either side of the campus.

The mini-car measurement site is located in Lot 6. Special arrangements may be made for obtaining mini-car authorization by contacting the University Police Traffic Office.

- A. Any department or organization requiring parking privileges for groups of visitors should contact the Chief of Police for specific parking instructions. On occasion, the Chief of Police may deem it necessary for the visitors to obtain temporary parking permits.

HANDICAPPED QUALIFICATIONS

- A. Acceptable medical proof that the operator or regularly transported person (faculty, staff, or student) is currently disabled must accompany the application for a handicapped permit.
- B. All disabled veterans whose vehicles display the specially designed license plates issued by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with the words "BISABLED VET" printed thereon in accordance with the provisions of Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes Article 6675a-5e and all permanently disabled persons whose vehicles display the specially designed symbols, tabs or other devices (to include a vehicle in which a temporarily disabled person identification card is placed in the lower left-hand side of the front windshield) issued by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with the word "DISABLED" printed thereon in accordance with the provisions of Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes Article 6675a-5e.1 are exempt from parking permit fees. These exemptions allow parking only in

spaces where parking would otherwise be appropriate and do not allow the parking of a vehicle at a place where parking is restricted or prohibited.

Congressional Medal of Honor winners who have registered their vehicle to obtain special license plates have the same parking privileges as a person operating a vehicle bearing plates issued for disabled veterans in accordance with the provisions of Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes Article 6675a-5e.2.
- D. State issued handicapped permits are available through the office of the County Tax Assessor Collector and are the only acceptable evidence of disability. However, temporary handicapped permits may be obtained from the University Police Traffic Office by presenting a letter from the attending physician indicating the nature of the short-term disability.

PAYMENT OF FEES

When an application is made for a permit, the fee charged will be for a complete year or the entire unexpired portion of The University's permit year. Payment of the fee must be made before the permit will be issued.

REPLACEMENT CHARGES

[Any-time-replacement-permits-are-issued-there-will-be-a-\$2.00-charge-mader Remnants-of-old-permits-are-to-be-returned-at-that-timer]

A replacement fee of \$5.00 will be charged for replacing or exchanging a parking permit. Lost or stolen permits must be reported to the University Police.

REFUNDS

- A. Students, faculty and staff members may apply for a refund of parking fees by completing the "REFUND REQUEST FORM" available in the University Police Traffic Office, MS 1.02.04.
- B. A request for refund will not be honored unless it is filed with the University Police Traffic Office during The University's fiscal year in which payment for the permit was made. A request for refund must be accompanied by the [remnants-of-all] unexpired permit[s] issued to the person requesting the refund.
 - (1) Refunds will be made to members of the faculty and staff upon request and only in the event service is terminated. [by-a-resignation-or-leave-of-absence-without-pay:] The refund will be based on the number of full months remaining in The University's permit year from the date the request form and [decal-remnants] unexpired permit are received in the University Police Traffic Office.
 - (2) Refunds will be made, upon request, to students who withdraw or graduate from The University at the end of the fall semester, provided the request is received in the University Police Traffic Office before Census Date of the following Spring Semester; but refunds will not be made to students who withdraw or graduate from The University at the end of the Spring Semester. A student who registers and withdraws during the same semester will be refunded in accordance with current academic catalog refund policies.

- C. A request for a refund will not be honored when a person's privilege to park and drive on campus has been suspended nor if outstanding charges or other debts remain unpaid. The University reserves the right to deduct from the refund any outstanding enforcement fee owed The University.
- D. No refund is available for bicycle or Class T parking permits.

SECTION VII DRIVING AND PARKING OFFENSES

late penalty fee of \$5.00 will be assessed to each ticket that is not paid, pealed, or otherwise cleared within five (5) working days of the date of the cket. The University Police Department is not responsible for a ticket being moved from a vehicle after said ticket has been placed on the vehicle by an ficer.

ENFORCEMENT FEES will be assessed for each violation of parking a vehicle on campus without a valid parking permit. The student, faculty or staff person will be given the opportunity to register the vehicle in lieu of the FIRST ticket issued for parking without a valid parking permit, provided such registration is done at the University Police Traffic Office within five (5) working days from the date the ticket was issued. Each subsequent violation for parking any vehicle without a valid parking permit is subject to the full enforcement fee.

SECTION VIII ENFORCEMENT

PARKING AND TRAFFIC CITATIONS

University Police are authorized to issue two types of citations for violation of UTSA Parking and Traffic Regulations.

- A. UNIVERSITY CITATIONS Those handled by The University, subject to University administrative enforcement charges and a right to appeal within The University (Paragraph 5 below).
- B. COURT APPEARANCE (CA) CITATIONS Those issued by the University Police constituting a summons to appear in either municipal court or a justice court.

POLICY WITH RESPECT TO COURT APPEARANCE (CA) CITATIONS

The University reserves the right to issue a CA citation for any violation. It is the general policy of The University, however, to issue CA citations at The University's option:

- A. for moving violations;
- B. for any violation when the individual's driving or parking privileges have been suspended (See Paragraph 6 below); or
- C. when an individual receives a University citation and all reasonable attempts at collection have failed.

PROCEDURE FOR UNIVERSITY CITATIONS

University citations are issued for offenses described in Section VII. The administrative enforcement charges are as shown. If the charge is not paid within five (5) working days after issuance of the citation, a \$5.00 late charge will be assessed.

- A. All outstanding campus traffic citations are retained as part of the permanent records. Multiple violations within one academic year will result in increased fines and/or disciplinary action.
- B. Every person receiving a University citation shall remit the amount of the charge to the University Police Traffic Office. Payment must be received within five (5) working days after issuance of the citation to avoid a late charge.

If a person desires to appeal a University citation, he/she shall comply with Paragraph 5 below within five (5) working days after issuance of the citation.

Requests for exceptions to the above referenced working days will be considered on an individual basis if mitigating or unusual circumstances exist. Such requests shall be submitted in writing to the Chief of Police and shall detail the reason(s) such a request is being made. Requests based solely on alleged nonreceipt of a copy of the citation will not be honored.

Unpaid charges for parking offenses are recorded either in the name of the person in whose name the vehicle is registered with some official

state motor vehicle registration department or agency, or in the name of the person who has registered the vehicle with the University Police Traffic Office.

- TE: If a student, staff or faculty has the same family name and/or home address as the registered owner, then the unpaid charges will also be recorded in the name of the student, staff or faculty. Unpaid charges for other offenses (such as moving violations) may be recorded in the name of the person driving said vehicle, in the name of the person who has registered it with the University Police Traffic Office, or in the name of the registered owner.
 - C. When Court Appearance citations are issued, the University citations will be cancelled. Failure to discharge CA citations may result in the issuance of a warrant for the arrest of such person.

Before a Court Appearance ticket is issued, a written notice shall be sent via certified mail advising the person of the number of campus tickets issued, the violations, enforcement fees due, and that Court Appearance tickets for each campus ticket shall be issued if the campus ticket enforcement fees are not paid within ten (10) working days of the date of the notice.

- D. Persons with unpaid charges recorded in their names shall be ineligible to receive parking permits while such charges remain unpaid.
- E. The enforcement fees assessed for violation of these regulations constitute an indebtedness to The University of Texas at San Antonio. In the event that a person fails to pay such fees, The University will:
 - (1) suspend the privilege of driving or parking on the campus for up to one year from the date of suspension;
 - (2) withhold any remuneration, refund or monetary payment to which the person may otherwise have been entitled;
 - (3) deny readmission to The University of Texas at San Antonio;
 - (4) withhold the individual's grades and/or official transcript;
 - (5) withhold any degree to which the person may be entitled; and/or
 - (6) take appropriate disciplinary action.

See Section V for additional information concerning disciplinary action.

IMPOUNDMENT OF VEHICLES, BARRING OF READMISSION AND WITHHOLDING OF GRADES, DEGREES, OFFICIAL TRANSCRIPTS AND REFUNDS

When unpaid charges are recorded, the University Police Traffic Office shall send a return receipt letter to the last known address of the person in whose name the charges are recorded.

Such letter shall state that unless (1) payment of all accumulated charges is made within ten (10) calendar days after the date of such letter or (2) a written request is made within ten (10) calendar days to appear before a University hearing committee concerning impoundment of the vehicle in case of faculty, staff, student or visitor, or for barring of readmission and/or withholding of grades, degrees, official transcripts and refunds in the case of students, as authorized in the Regents' Rules and Regulations, Part One,

Chapter VI, Section 9 and state law, the appropriate enforcement action will take place without further notice.

Such a hearing is not an appeal of the parking and traffic citations but is a limited hearing to allow the individual an opportunity to show that the vehicle in question was not owned, registered or used by the individual or to show that the individual receiving notice of impending sanctions does not have unpaid parking and traffic charges.

At such hearing, which will be held after a reasonable period of time, the person requesting the hearing will assume the burden of showing why the appropriate enforcement action should not take place.

If timely payment is not received and either the registered owner or the person who has [registered-the-vehicle] a parking permit with The University has failed to appear at the requested University impoundment hearing or has appeared and has failed to meet his or her burden of proof, the vehicle may be impounded pending payment of all outstanding charges, including towing and storage charges, without further notice.

If timely payment is not received from a student and the student has failed to appear at the requested hearing or has appeared and has failed to meet his or her burden of proof, the student may be barred from readmission and grades, degrees, official transcripts and refunds may be withheld, without further notice. Additionally, the vehicle (registered-to-the-student) may be subject to impoundment.

APPEALS FROM UNIVERSITY CITATION(S)

Any person who has received a University citation may file a request to have the citation reviewed by submitting an appeal to the University Police Traffic Office no later than five (5) working days after the citation was issued. If an appeal is not filed within this time, the citation is deemed final.

- A. Appeals shall be prepared in writing on the "Citation Appeal" form provided by the University Police Traffic Office. Appeals may be reviewed based solely on the written statement or the appealing party may also request a personal appearance. Failure to request a personal appearance or failure to appear at the hearing (as requested) will result in the decision being rendered on the basis of the written statement (including any supporting material submitted) and the information as shown on the citation(s).
- B. The appeal must include the following:
 - (1) Citation number(s)
 - (2) License number of vehicle(s)
 - (3) Faculty, staff, or student identification number
- C. The Chief shall review all appeals before forwarding the appeals to the chairperson of the Parking and Traffic Committee.
- D. The Parking and Traffic Committee may order the payment of the administrative enforcement charge(s) in whole or in part or the cancellation of such charge(s). If the appeal is desired and the appealing party fails to pay the charge(s) within ten (10) working days after date of notification, a \$5.00 late charge will be assessed on the citation(s).

- E. If the Parking and Traffic Committee rules in favor of the appellant, said appellant shall be entitled to any enforcement fee that has been paid as a result of such alleged violation.
- F. The decision of the Parking and Traffic Committee shall be final.

SUSPENSION OF PRIVILEGE TO DRIVE AND PARK ON CAMPUS

The loss of the privilege of driving or parking a motor vehicle on campus shall commence ten (10) days after the University Police Traffic Office mails a letter to the person, at the address of such person as shown in the records of that office, stating that such person's privilege of driving or parking a motor vehicle on campus has been suspended. Such letter shall state the term of the suspension and will give notification of possible vehicle impoundment for parking offenses committed during the period of suspension and shall state the reason for such suspension. Persons who have had their parking privileges cancelled shall lose the privilege of driving or parking on The University campus for six (6) months. While a person's privilege of driving or parking a vehicle on campus is suspended, it is unlawful (1) for that person to drive or park any motor vehicle on the campus and (2) for any person to drive or park a vehicle registered in the name of such person on the campus.

A. The Parking and Traffic Committee may prohibit a person from operating or parking a vehicle on campus if that person has received four (4) or more tickets in an academic year or has been guilty of a Class B or Class C violation.

Such suspension of the privilege of driving or parking on the campus may be imposed for a period not to exceed six (6) months from the date of suspension.

- B. Any person who has had his or her operating and parking privileges on campus cancelled or suspended and who continues to operate or park a vehicle on campus is subject to having the vehicle towed off campus at the expense of the operator.
- C. If a person whose privilege of driving or parking on campus has been suspended receives a University citation by reason of having a vehicle on campus during the period of his/her suspension, the period of suspension shall be extended so that it expires twelve (12) months from the date the person received such additional citation. In addition, the violation of the suspension shall be reported to the Dean of Students if the person is a student, or to the appropriate Dean, Director or Administrative Official for possible disciplinary action if the person is a faculty or staff member.
- D. A person receiving notice that his/her privilege of driving or parking a vehicle on campus has been suspended may appeal the suspension within ten (10) working days on the grounds that the imposition of such suspension is improper or will create serious and substantial hardship. A reinstatement fee of \$10.00 must accompany the request for reinstatement. This will be in addition to any other fees due for traffic violations.

Such appeal shall be governed by the provisions of Item 4 of this section. No appeal shall be considered if there are any unpaid citations on record at the Lime such appeal is filed.

DESTRUCTION OF PERMIT WHEN SUSPENDED

Every person receiving notice that his/her privilege of driving or parking on the campus has been suspended shall [remove] return the parking permit(s) [from-every-vehicle-registered] in his/her name [and] or return the remnants thereof to the University Police Traffic Office within ten (10) working days after date of such notice. Failure to do so shall be reported to the Dean of Students if the person is a student, or to the appropriate Dean, Director or Administrative Official if the person is a faculty or staff member.

ELIGIBILITY TO OBTAIN NEW PERMIT DURING PERIOD OF SUSPENSION

A person whose privilege of driving and parking on the campus is suspended, and not reinstated, shall be ineligible to receive a parking permit of any type during the period of suspension.

IMPOUNDMENT

•]

The term "impoundment" includes immobilization, towing, removal and storage of the vehicle in question.

- A. Any vehicle which has been issued two (2) or more campus tickets and which does not display a valid parking permit while parked on campus shall be immobilized until the operator of said vehicle is properly identified.
- B. The identified operator of an immobilized vehicle shall be held liable for all unpaid tickets which have been issued to the immobilized vehicle unless the operator shows proof of someone else driving said vehicle.
- C. When a vehicle has been immobilized for being parked on campus without a valid parking permit, the operator of said vehicle shall be required to [register-the-vehicle] purchase a parking permit in accordance with the UTSA Parking and Traffic Regulations.
- D. The University of Texas at San Antonio reserves the right to remove and impound all vehicles parked so as to (1) obstruct ingress or egress to buildings, or (2) obstruct vehicular or pedestrian traffic. The Univer-

sity also reserves the right to impound vehicles [registered-to] of individuals with unpaid traffic fees after notice has been given as outlined in this section.

- E. Neither The University nor its authorized personnel shall be liable for any loss or damage resulting from such impoundment.
- F. In addition to any charge that may be levied by The University for an offense resulting in impoundment, the owner of a vehicle that has been towed, removed and stored must also pay a commercial wrecker service fee and storage charges after the first twenty-four (24) hours. When an IMPOUND VIOLATION occurs and the owner or driver of the vehicle appears on the scene before the arrival of the wrecker, the vehicle will not be impounded. If the owner or driver appears on the scene after the arrival of the wrecker and the wrecker driver has made a hookup:
 - (1) the vehicle will not be impounded; and
 - (2) the owner or driver may be required to pay the wrecker a fee in lieu of towing.

If the vehicle is impounded, the registered owner or permit holder will be sent a notice at the address on file with the University Police Traffic Office.

SECTION IX RECIPROCAL PARKING RULES

THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS AT SAN ANTONIO AND THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS HEALTH SCIENCE CENTER AT SAN ANTONIO

PURPOSE

- A. The purpose of this agreement is to provide limited, temporary parking for UTSA faculty, staff and students at The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio (UTHSCSA). Employees at either institution must register their vehicles at their primary place of employment.
- B. Any individual having questions concerning parking at UTHSCSA should contact the University Police Department.

ENFORCEMENT

- A. Vehicles bearing UTSA permits are required to abide by the UTHSCSA Parking and Traffic Regulations while on the UTHSCSA campus.
- B. Student's academic records will be placed on hold at UTHSCSA and UTSA for unpaid tickets on record at either institution.
- C. UTSA faculty and staff with unpaid UTHSCSA tickets are subject to UTSA Parking and Traffic Regulations concerning the renewal of parking permits.

DESIGNATED PARKING BY PERMIT

- A. Numbered reserved spaces are reserved for the UTHSCSA President, Vice President, Academic Deans, and Department Chairmen who have paid the fee for these spaces. These numbered reserved spaces are designated for UTHSCSA type "A" permits only. Vehicles displaying UTSA parking permits are not permitted to park in these numbered reserved spaces.
- B. Vehicles bearing UTSA Class O Executive Officer and Class R Reserved parking permits must park in spaces marked "RESERVED." Should the reserved spaces be full, the driver of said vehicle should contact the nearest UTHSCSA guard and request a temporary pass for another parking area.
- C. Vehicles bearing UTSA Class A or K Faculty and Staff parking permits must park in any unrestricted parking lot marked for C permits.
- D. Vehicles bearing UTSA Class \underline{D} , G or \underline{M} Student parking permits must park in any unrestricted parking lot marked for \underline{D} permits.
- E. Two-wheel vehicles bearing UTSA Class C Motorcycle parking permits must park in any restricted areas marked E parking for two-wheel vehicles.
- F. UTSA carpool permits are not valid for parking in UTHSCSA carpool spaces.
 - (1) Vehicles bearing UTSA CLASS P Carpool Faculty/Staff parking permits must park in any unrestricted parking lot marked for C permits.
 - (2) Vehicles bearing UTSA CLASS S Carpool Student parking permits must park in any unrestricted parking lot marked for D permits.

G. Vehicles bearing UTSA Class H Handicapped parking permits may park in any handicapped or reserved spaces. Should the handicapped and reserved spaces be full, the driver of said vehicle should contact the nearest UTHSCSA guard and request a temporary pass for another parking area.

The greater of \$100 or \$12 per semester credit hour. Thus a student registering for from 1 to 8 semester hours would be charged \$100; a student registering for 9 semester hours would be charged \$108.

The 10-hour charge would be \$120, and so forth.

The greater of \$100 or \$16 per semester credit hour. Thus a student registering for from 1 to 6 semester hours would be charges \$100; a student registering for 7 semester hours would be charged \$112.

B. Summer Sessions I & II, six weeks each:

1. Summer 1986 - per session

The greater of \$50 or \$12 per semester credit hour. Thus a student registering for from 1 to 4 semester hours would be charged \$50; a student registering for 5 credit hours would be charges \$60; and so forth.

\$120 per semester credit

2. Summer 1987 - per session

The greater of \$50 or \$16 per semester credit hour. Thus a student registering for from 3 semester hours would be charged \$50; a student registering for 4 semester hours would be charged \$64; and so forth.

\$120 per semester credit

C. Charges to Texas residents for each semester credit hour may increase increase each biennium.

The non-resident charge is to be determined by the Coordinating Board with the 1987 - 1988 academic year.

ATALOGUE CHANGES - continued

No nonresident of the State of Texas shall be enrolled as a new or transfer student in any school, college, or degree-granting program at any component institution of the System when all three following conditions occur: (1) when there is a limitation on the number of students who will be enrolled in the class of which such non resident would be a member if he were enrolled; (2) when the result of enrolling such nonresident would be to increase by greater than 10% the percentage of nonresidents enrolled in the class of which such nonresident would be a member if he were enrolled; and (3) when at the time of the proposed enrollment of such nonresident, admission to the school, college, or degree-granting program is being denied to one or more Texas residents who have applied for admission and who reasonably demonstrate that they are probably capable of doing the quality of work that is necessary to obtain the usual degree awarded by the school, college, or degree-granting program....

A bona fide resident of the State of Texas is defined under state law and is further interpreted in "Rules and Regulations for Determining Resident Status" available from the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System.

III. Payment of Fees

House Bill 1147, Acts of the 69th Legislature, Regular Session, 1985, provides the option for a student to pay tuition and fees by one of the following three alternatives:

- A. Full payment of tuition and fees in advance of the beginning of the semester.
- B. One-half of tuition and fees in advance of the beginning of the semester and one-half approximately mid-way of the semester.
- C. One-fourth payment of tuition and fees in advance of the beginning of the semester and three additional separate one-fourth payments at evenly spaced periods.

A student electing one of the installment payment options is responsible for all tuition and fees due for the period of registration and for all calendar leadline dates relating to refunds, schedule changes, withdrawals, late fee tharges and so forth. A student who fails to make timely payment will be ineligible to continue in class. The classes in progress at that time will be treated as though the student withdrew.

Installment payment option forms are available in the Registrar's office. There is a processing charge for deferred payment. Also, there is a late charge associated with any late payment.

NURS 3323 Aging and the Aged

This theoretical course is designed to provide the undergraduate nursing student with the opportunity to explore the many dimensions of aging. The physical, sociological, psychological and cultural aspects of aging will be studied to provide a basis for understanding the unique characteristics of and health behaviors in the aged. Levels of care, methods and resource options will be examined. An out-of-class project provides opportunity for recognition and interpretation of health behaviors and the developmental aspects of aging.

Prerequisites: NURS 3501, 3402 and 3703. Three class hours average per hour per semester. Three semester hours credit.

NURS 3327 Diabetic Child Care in a Camp Setting

This clinical course is designed to allow undergraduate students to develop an increased degree of expertise in working with 6 - 16 year old children/adolescents with insulin dependent diabetes mellitus (IDDM). The settings for the clinical experiences are the Texas Lions Camps for Children with Diabetes in Hunt and Kerrville, Texas. The student will live in with the campers during this experience. Two days of orientation are followed by twelve days of actual camp experience working with the children. Prerequisites: NURS 3204, 3605, 3506 and 3307. Three semester hours credit. This credit is based on the ratio of one hour of theory and four hours of clinical for one hour of credit for one semester week equivalent. The theory hours will be acquired through 15 hours of lecture/discussion during orientation, daily medical staff education and pre-camp preparation. The two clinical hours are the equivalent of sixty actual clinical hours acquired through twelve days at camp averaging five hours per day.

NURS 3331 Stress Management

This theoretical course is designed to provide the student the opportunity to explore the many dimensions of stress. Biological, psychological, sociological and environmental influences creating stress will be assessed, using a variety of evaluation tools. Selected stress reduction techniques will be introduced. Planning implementation and evaluating effectiveness of these strategies will be discussed. Emphasis will be placed on prevention of stress-related disorders and promotion of health. The learning experiences of this course will facilitate the development of skills which students may use in nurse/client interaction, the nursing process and the refinement of a professional nursing role. Prerequisites: NURS 3501, 3402 and 3703 or approval of the instructor. Three class hours average per week per semester. Three semester hours credit.

CATALOGUE CHANGES - continued

NURS 3340 Multidisciplinary Cancer Care

This course is designed to prepare students in medicine, nursing and allied health sciences for collaborative roles in delivery of preventive, diagnostic and therapeutic services in the area of oncology. Students will have the opportunity to learn together some principles and methods of cancer stiology, prevention, diagnosis and therapy and to apply these as a vell-integrated, effective health team. The course will consist of lecture, small group and clinical activities. Clinical areas for students' practice will include various hospital units and outpatient clinics at The University of Texas dedical Branch and selected areas in the community. Prerequisite: senior standing or, for Flexible Option Track students, completion of Semester I. One lecture and six clinical hours average per week per semester. Three semester nours credit. Lab fee: \$3.

NURS 3341 Women's Health Care

This theoretical course is designed to provide the student with the apportunity to develop an indepth knowledge of life-cycle concepts and theories and socio-historical, cultural and environmental factors as they relate to the nealth and health care of women. Emphasis is on the role of the baccalaureate prepared nurse in identifying and responding to the needs of women for preventive health care services. Students have the opportunity to collaborate with other providers of nursing care services in planning and implementing a nealth promotion project. Prerequisite: Semester II and/or consent of the instructor. Three class hours average per week per semester. Three semester nours credit.

C. Charges to Texas residents for each semester credit hour may increase each biennium.

The non-resident charge is to be determined by the Coordinating Board beginning with the 1987-1988 Academic Year.

II. The Rules and Regulations of The University of Texas System provides for the admission of non-resident students as follows:

No nonresident of the State of Texas shall be enrolled as a new or transfer student in any school, college or degree-granting program at any component institution of the System when all of the three following conditions occur:

(1) when there is a limitation on the number of students who will be enrolled in the class of which such nonresident would be a member if he were enrolled; (2) when the result of enrolling such nonresident would be to increase to greater than 10% their percentage of nonresidents enrolled in the class of which such nonresident would be a member if he were enrolled; and (3) when at the time of the proposed enrollment of such nonresident, admission to the school, college, or degree-granting program is being denied to one or more Texas residents who have applied for admission and who reasonably demonstrate that they are probably capable of doing the quality of work that is necessary to obtain the usual degree awarded by the school, college, or degree-granting program.

A bona fide resident of the State of Texas is defined under state law and is further interpreted in "Rules and Regulations for Determining Resident Status" available from the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System....

III. <u>Payment</u> of Tuition and Fees

House Bill 1147, Acts of the 69th Legislature, Regular Session, 1985, provides the option for a student to pay tuition and fees by one of the following 3 alternatives:

- following 3 alternatives:

 A. Full payment of tuition and fees in advance of the beginning of the term.
- B. Payment of ½ of tuition and applicable fees in advance of the term and ½ approximately mid-way of the term.
- C. Payment of 1 of tuition and applicable fees in advance of the term and 3 additional separate 1 payments at evenly spaced periods.

A student electing one of the installment payment options is responsible for all tuition and fees due for the period of registration and for all calendar deadline dates relating to refunds, schedule changes, withdrawals, late fee charges, and so forth. A students who fails to make timely payment will be ineligible to continue in class and the appropriate drop symbol will be assigned to those courses in progress.

The Office of the Registrar will provide a statement of the provisions, regulations and conditions applicable to the installment payment plan to each student who applies for an installment option. Installment plan option forms are available in the Office of the Registrar. There will be a processing charge for installment payment and there could also be a late charge associated with any late payment.

Emphasis is on conceptualizing the role of the master's prepared nurse in working collaboratively with other health care professionals to identify and respond innovatively and effectively to the needs of women for health care services. New course: GNRS 5392 Educational Media. This course focuses on the gaining of skill in planning, producing and presenting instructional materials. To do this we will stress the basics of communication and production. Some specific competencies to be achieved will be in photography, television, media graphics, transparency production, and the analysis of presentation. New course: GNRS 5393 Microcomputing: Nursing Applications in Process and Administration. In addition to providing crisis and intervention services and brief therapy, the Center maintains a referral file and after initial screening, can refer students to appropriate specialized programs within the University (e.g., the Academic Reinforcement Program and the Legal Counsel Advisory Service). The Center is open each weekday (8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.) for scheduled appointments and walkin visits. All information is held in strict confidence to the extent allowed by state and federal law.

With the co-sponsorship of Student Government, the Center has offered workshops for personal development, such as couples' enrichment, assertiveness training, and financial management.

The Center is located in Room G. 204, Ashbel Smith Building, extension 3148.

The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston, through a health insurance contract common to all U. T. Health Science Centers, makes (available—to students) comprehensive health insurance available to students, at very reasonable rates. Each student is responsible for (the—expenses—of—his—own—health—care—with—the—exception—of—) personal health care—expenses, except for the preventive medicine measures, as noted above. Page 28 New material has been added to describe Children's Nephrology Service and Children's Diabetes Management Center. This follows Family Planning.

Children's Nephrology Service

The CNS is operated by the Division of Nephrology/Diabetes of the Department of Pediatrics and is housed in the Child Health Center. The CNS offers both inpatient and outpatient facilities. Inpatients are housed either on the standard Renal Nursing Unit or in the Care-by-Parent Unit. On the 6th Floor of the Child Health Center is the Pediatric Dialysis Unit where children are dialyzed either by hemo or the peritoneal routes and where families are taught home usage. The ambulatory renal clinic meets once weekly in the Child Health Center and once monthly at two different satellite programs in Austin and Corpus Christi.

The CNS is staffed by a multi-disciplinary team whose full-time members include four physicians, a renal failure (ESRD) nurse-coordinator, a head nurse for the renal unit, four dialysis nurses, a dietitian, and a social worker. Part-time adjunct members include counselors, transplant surgeons, physical therapists, and psychologists.

The inpatient service has about 250 admissions per year and an average inpatient census which ranges from between 2 and 10 children. One hundred and thirty-two children have been transplanted, with a yearly average of about 15-18. A recent innovation has been the early intervention in neonatal renal failure with transplantation at 5 to 6 months of life.

Children's Diabetes Management Center

he CDMC is operated by the Division of Diabetes/Nephrology of the Department of Pediatrics and is located in the Child Health Center. The CDMC offers both opatient and outpatient service to children with diabetes mellitus and to their amilies. Patients on the inpatients units are housed either on the regular pediatric nursing unit or in the Care-by-Parent Unit. Intensive care facilities or the diabetic are also available when needed. An additional feature of the opatient service is the Diabetes Control Unit which houses various clinical and esearch instruments such as the Glucose-Controlled Insulin Infusion System Biostator). Ambulatory clinics for diabetic children meet once weekly.

Student Responsibility

At the time of registration and throughout a student's enrollment in the Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences, it shall be his/her responsibility to keep the Office of (Admissions—and—Student—Personnel—Services) the Registrar and the (deam) Office of the Dean of the Graduate School informed of his current (local address, (2) local telephone number or where (he-may-be-reached) contact can be made, and (3) home address and phone number. Cambling, immoral conduct, dishonesty, or the excessive use of intoxicating liquors renders the student subject to discipline. Any student who is guilty of the illegal use, possession and/or sale of a drug or narcotic on the campus of a component institution of The University of Texas System is subject to discipline, including expulsion pursuant to the procedures set forth in the Rules and Regulations of the Board of Regents.

Individuals who are not currently enrolled at a component institution of The University of Texas System remain subject to the disciplinary process for conduct that occurred during any period of enrollment, and for statements, acts or omissions related to application for enrollment or the award of a degree.

Page 39 Last paragraph revised by substituting chief administrative officer for institutional head.

Page 40 Second paragraph revised as follows:

No former student who has been suspended or expelled for disciplinary reasons from a component institution of The University of Texas System shall be permitted on the campus of any component institution during the period of such suspension or expulsion without the prior written approval of the chief administrative officer of that institution.

Page 40 Sixth paragraph revised as follows:

Any student who, acting either singly or in concert with others, obstructs or disrupts, by force or violence, any teaching, research, administrative, disciplinary, public service, or other activity authorized to be held or conducted on the campus of a component institution of The University of Texas System or on any real property over which the System has possession and control shall be subject to discipline, including expulsion. As used in this subsection, the words "force or violence" include such acts as "stand-ins," and "lie-ins," when such acts are in fact obstructive or disruptive of any of the authorized activities listed above.

Page 40 Last paragraph has been deleted.

Page 41 New information follows first paragraph on page 41 as follows:

The Dean of Students or the chief administrative officer of the institution may take immediate interim disciplinary action, including suspension pending a hearing, against a student for violation of a rule and regulation of the System or of the institution at which the accused is a student when the continuing presence of the student poses a danger to persons or property or an ongoing

threat of disrupting the academic process. The Dean may authorize interim withholding of the student's grades, degree or official transcript when such withholding would be in the best interest of the institution.

Page 41 Second paragraph revised as follows:

Each component institution shall maintain for every student who has (received-any disciplinary-penalty-at) been charged with dishonesty or other serious misconduct at such institution, a permanent written disciplinary record that shall reflect the nature of the charge, the disposition of the charge, the penalty assessed, if any, and other pertinent information. This disciplinary record shall be separate from the student's academic record and shall be treated as confidential, and the contents shall not be revealed to third parties except upon the request of the student or (upon-direction-of-the-institutional-head-or-his-delegate.) in accordance with applicable state or federal laws.

The University of Texas Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences at Galveston is in compliance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 as amended (P.L. 93-380), which protects the privacy of educational records and establishes the right of students to inspect and review their educational records. The Act also provides guidelines for the correction of inaccurate or misleading data through informal and formal hearings. Students have the right to file complaints with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act Office (FERPA) concerning alledged failures by the institution to comply with the Act. Questions concerning the Act may be referred to the Registrar.

Transcripts and other information from a student's academic record will be released by the (Director-of-Admissions) Registrar only upon written request from the student, or other person authorized by law. (-and-upon-payment of the appropriate-fee-(\$1.00-per-transcript).--An exception may be made in response to-a-subpocha or a court-order.) Exceptions may be made as allowed by the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act.

Page 48 Graduate Degree Program

Listing of degrees offered has been revised to show change from Master of Arts (M.A.) to Master of Science (M.S.) as per approval by the Board of Regents and the Coordinating Board.

Page 48 and 49M. D.-Ph.D. Program

Second paragraph has been revised as follows:

A small number of funded positions will be available. The stipends will be at the level set by the Graduate School for Ph.D. candidates. (Ht-is-anticipated that-the-first-year-stipend-for-a-beginning-student-will-be-approximately \$7,000:00:) The stipend will continue, with increments, throughout the program. However, if a funded student withdraws from the program, the student will be required to repay that part of the stipend that was used.

Transcripts from foreign universities must be accompanied by an official English translation of the transcript.

Page 52 Application deadline changed from November to December.

Page 52 In third paragraph, change from M. A. degree to M. S. degree as per approval by the Board of Regents and the Coordinating Board.

Page 52 Special Students- III, change in word as follows:

III. Students whose applications are not received in time for regular (admittance) admission to the graduate school, but are otherwise qualified.

Page 53 Special Students- Post MSN (terminal degree students are added to this category, V, revised as follows:

V. Postdoctoral (students) and post Master of Science in Nursing students

Admission as a special student does not confer on an individual any of the privileges of a regular student except the right to attend classes, take examinations, receive credit, and obtain an official transcript of work completed. Special students are not eligible to receive state-funded graduate assistantships. Special students are expected to maintain the same academic standing as regular students. Registration for more than one term is permitted only if previous work has been performed satisfactorily. (Special-students-in categories-1-and-11) Category I special students may register for consecutive terms only after consultation with and approval by the dean. (Only in exceptional circumstances will-a category-1-or-11-special-student-be permitted to register for-more than one course:-Exceptions-must-be approved by-the dean.) To be eligible to register as a Category II special student, the student must have a bachelor's degree or equivalent, must have an overall undergraduate grade point average of 3.0 or better (on a 4.0 scale), and must have permission to take the program offering the course and (c) the instructor. A category III special student can register for a full course load; however, registration for subsequent terms will be dependent on acceptance as a regular student. A category IV special student must enroll for a full course load for a minimum of two terms before reapplying for regular admission to the graduate school. Admission will be dependent upon satisfactory completion of nine credit hours per term in courses carrying letter grades (A, B, C or F). A category IV student who performs exceptionally well in all subjects may be permitted to apply for regular admission after only one term upon recommendation of the Graduate School of Biomedical-Sciences.)

Page 53 Student Responsibility - change in wording as follows:

The student is held responsible for knowing degree requirements and enrolling (for courses appropriate) in appropriate courses. (to-his-degree program.—He) The student is likewise held responsible for knowing the university regulations with regard to the standard of work required for continuance in the Graduate School.

A physical examination is required of all entering students. The requirement may be met by the student's personal physician's completion of a physical examination form provided by the University. Page 54 Registration - name of office changed and statement added about late registration fee as follows:

Registration instructions, together with a list of courses offered and necessary forms to be completed, will be available for degree-seeking students in offices of their graduate program directors prior to the beginning of each term. If the student follows the timetable for registration, the registration process can be accomplished by mail. If stated deadlines are not met the student (can) must register in person (on-the-first-day of-classes) and will be subject to a \$25.00 late registration fee.

Page 55 Final term

Statement revised to reflect new tuition charges as follows:

It is a requirement that a student be registered for the term in which he or she graduates.

If a student is registering only for final-credit hours (final semester) in preparation of a thesis or dissertation, the tuition may be reduced to \$12 per credit hour for residents of Texas and (\$50) \$120 per credit hour for nonresidents (U. S. citizens and foreign students.)

If a candidate has completed the last requirements for a degree, including the submission of a thesis or dissertation, and needs to register only for the purpose of having the degree conferred, he or she may register in absentia. This is the only purpose for which a student may register in absentia. The fee for in absentia registration is \$12 per credit hour for residents of Texas and ($\$5\theta$) per credit hour for nonresidents (U. S. citizens and foreign students).

Page 56 Financial Information Tuition

This statement has been revised as follows:

Since registration is not complete until tuition and fees are fully paid, a

student should be prepared to make these payments during the scheduled registration for each semester. Both tuition and fees are subject to change according to the actions of the Texas State Legislature and the Board of Regents.

Tuition for residents of Texas and others granted the privilege of paying the resident tuition fee (\$4:00-per-semester-hour of credit, with-a-minimum-tuition fee-of-\$50.00-per-semester.) is the greater of \$100 or \$12 per credit hour for academic year 1985-86 and the greater of \$100 or \$16 per credit hour for 1986-87.

Tuition for nonresident U. S. citizens and foreign students is (\$40.00-per semester-hour-of-credit;) \$120 per credit hour.

(Tuition-for-foreign-students-is-\$40:00-per-semester-hour-of-credit-)

In those instances where credit for thesis or dissertation is the final credit hour requirement for the degree in progress, the tuition for residents of Texas is (\$12.00-for-three-semester-hours-credit-and-\$24.00-for-six-semester-hours credit--For-nonresidents-(-U.-S.-and-foreign-students)-the-tuition-is-\$50.00.) the current tuition charge for three or six credit hours; i.e., there is no minimal charge of \$100. For nonresidents (U. S. and foreign students) the tuition is \$120 per credit hour.

Payment of Tuition and Fees

Since registration is not complete until tuition and fees are paid, a student should be prepared to make these payments each term according to one of the three following options:

- 1. Full payment of tuition and fees in advance of the beginning of the term.
- 2. One-half payment of tuition and fees in advance of the beginning of the term and one-half approximately mid-way of the term.
- 3. One-fourth payment of tuition and fees in advance of the beginning of the term and three additional one-fourth payments at evenly spaced periods.

A fee payment schedule will be available in the Office of the Registrar prior to the beginning of each term. A student electing one of the deferred plan options is responsible for all fees due for the period of registration and for all calendar deadline dates relating to refunds, schedule changes, withdrawals, late fee charges and so forth. A student who fails to make a timely payment will be ineligible to continue in class and a symbol WP or WF will be assigned to each course for which enrolled based on the student's progress at the time of the withdrawal action. The WF will be treated as a failing grade in grade-point average calculations.

Payment of tuition and fees by one of the deferred plan options requires completion of the appropriate deferred plan option forms, available in the Office of the Registrar. There is a \$15 processing charge for the deferred payment plan. Also, a \$10 late fee per payment will be assessed those students who are delinquent in payments.

Late Registration Fee

Students who have not completed registration, including payment of tuition and fees, by the deadline set for each semester will be charged a \$25 late registration fee.

Page 58 Library-laboratory-property deposit

The \$10.00 fee to reserve place in class is no longer required, but property deposit is. Revision as follows:

(On-acceptance-by-the-Graduate-School-and-in-order-to-reserve-a-ptace-in-class,-a \$10,000-fee-is-required.) Upon matriculation, (the) degree seeking students will be required to pay a \$10.00 fee (with) to serve as a library-laboratory-property deposit. This deposit covers library fines and breakage of laboratory equipment and other charges resulting from damage to or loss of university property. Any time the deposit falls below \$5.00, the student will be notified and will be required to restore the deposit to its original amount. Whatever remains will be refunded to the student upon written request, after graduation or withdrawal from school. (The-\$10.00-fee-is-not-refundable-if-the student-does-not-matriculate. Eighty-five percent of unclaimed funds become part of an emergency loan fund for students.

Page 58 Student Health Insurance

Revised as follows:

Each student is responsible for (his-own) expenses incurred as the result of health problems, hospitalization, physician's care etc. (The-student--is encouraged-to-participate-in-the) A student insurance program is provided by the University. However, students may retain personal policies already in existence or obtain a personal policy of choice. A student who does not participate in the University coverage or who does not have a personal policy will be required to sign a statement (that-he-will-be-responsible-for) indicating acceptance of responsibility for debts incurred.

Additions, deletions, or any other changes in University student health insurance coverage must be made through the Office of (Admissions—and—Student—Personnel Services) the Registrar during the first five class days of each month.

Page 59 Living Arrangements

Dormitory rental rates have been revised.

Page 60 Meats

Statement has been revised as follows:

Cafeteria service is available at John Sealy Hospital and at St. Mary's Hospital. (There-is-a-coffee-shop-in-the Sealy-and-Smith-Professional-Building-across-from R.-Weverley-Smith-Pavilion-of-John-Sealy-Hospital.) Several other restaurants are situated within a few blocks' distance from the Medical Branch campus. Meals are available at the various fraternity houses near the campus. Students may purchase meal tickets or pay for each meal separately, depending on the policies of the fraternity house. Since policies, prices, and serving schedules vary from fraternity to fraternity, students should get in touch with each fraternity house for more detailed information.

Page 60 Exemption from fees

Exemption of Texas ex-servicemen revised as follows:

Exemption of Texas ex-servicemen- The State Legislature has directed that a legal resident of Texas is to be exempted from certain required fees but not from deposits when (he) the veteran meets all the following criteria:

- 1. (He) has resided in Texas for a period of not less than twelve (12) months prior to the date of registration.
- 2. (He) was a bonafide legal resident of the state at the time of entering such service.
- 3. (He) served in the armed forces or in certain auxiliary services in World War I, World War II, the Korean conflict, or the Cold War.
- 4. (He) was honorably discharged therefrom (except those who were discharged because of being over the age of thirty-eight or because of a personal request.
- 5. (He) is not eligible for education benefits provided for veterans by the United States Government.

Page 61 Exemption of high-school graduates of state orphanages of Texas has been deleted.

New source of financial assistance has been added as follows:

Texas Public Educational Grants and Emergency Loans

Each degree granting component of The University of Texas System is authorized to set aside a percent of each student's tuition charge for 1985-86 and 1986-87 academic years for use as Texas Public Educational Grants and Emergency Loans. This program was established to lend money to students to pay tuition and fees when they face emergency situations.

Eligibility Rules for Emergency Loan Program

- 1. To be eligible for emergency loans a student must have been accepted for enrollment and be enrolled on at least a half-time basis at the institution.
- 2. To be eligible for the emergency loan program a student must face an emergency situation and must not have received from the Office of Student Fiscal Planning and Management loan or grant funds to pay tuition and fees for the current semester.
- Loans to eligible students shall be granted on the basis of the order in which the institution receives applications.

Terms for Emergency Loan Program

- 1. By the terms of Section 56.053, Texas Education Code, as long as funds are available in the emergency loan program, an eligible student must be allowed to receive a loan in an amount equal to tuition and required fees for the courses in which the student is enrolling.
- 2. The maximum loan amount per student may not exceed charges for tuition, mandatory fees, and optional fees for the courses in which the student

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is enrolling.

- 3. The loan must be evidenced by a promissory note containing terms approved by the U. T. System Office of General Counsel and bearing interest at a rate of not less than 3% or more than 5% per year.
- 4. The loan must be repaid within ninety days or five days before the last class day of the semester in which the student is enrolled, whichever period is shorter. Students enrolled in programs not on a semester basis must repay the loan prior to 30 days before the last class day of the annual academic term in which the loan is made.

New source of financial assistance has been added as follows:

The James E. Beall II Memorial Scholarships

The Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences has earmarked funds from the James E. Beall II Memorial Lectureship and Awards to provide scholarships for doctoral students in the biomedical sciences. The scholarship will be known as "The James E. Beall II Memorial Scholarship".

Each scholarship will be funded at \$225 per year and will be awarded for the entire period during which a recipient remains in good academic standing. Provided for information in summary form only; full details are available in the Office of the Dean of the Graduate School.

Page 62 Requirements and regulations

Statement revised as follows:

A student enrolled in the Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences is subject to all established requirements and regulations. (Exceptions~-to-these-rules-and issues-not-covered-by-previously-determined-guidelines-with-be-handled-on-an individual basis-by-the-dean-of-the-Graduate-School.)

Page 62 General Graduate School regulations

Grades and Grade Point Average

Revised as follows:

The only grades used by the Graduate School to compute the grade point average are A,B,C and F, where on a 100 point scale A=90-100, B=80-89, C=70-79, F=0-69. Only graduate level courses which are approved by the graduate program director may be (counted toward a degree.) used in partial fulfillment of the requirements for a degree. The grade point average is calculated on the 4.0 (scale) system. A grade shall be provided for each course taken in every term and shall be based solely on performance in that term. When a course is repeated, only the grade received on the second attempt will be employed in computing the grade point average.

The grade of "incomplete" (X) I will be reported in cases where a student has, (for-whatever-valid-reason,) with the permission of the instructor, not completed all of the required work of the course by the end of that term. This grade is valid for a period not to exceed one term. By the end of that time the student must have completed (aH-of) the required work of the course, and a proper grade must have been reported to the dean, or the (X) "I"will be changed automatically to an F. The grade of "incomplete" shall not be used for courses graded by S/U, except for Writing Practicum (INTD 6390).

The grade of "not reported" (NR) is reported when an instructor cannot have the final grade prepared for a student by the reporting deadline or in cases when a course extends beyong the usual graduate school reporting deadline. This grade is valid for a period not to exceed one term. NR may be changed to S or U or to A,B,C, or F.

The grade of "credit" (CR) may be granted upon recommendation by the program director and approval of the dean, and shall be used to designate that a student has been given credit for a course, competence for which has been demonstrated by previous work or by taking an examination for credit. Courses graded CR may count toward degree requirements, but are not computed in the grade point average.

Credit for research courses will be evaluated on the basis of "satisfactory" (S) or "unsatisfactory" (U) An S grade qualifies the student to receive course hour credits towards the degree. No more than nine credit hours for research courses will be credited toward the minimum hour requirements for a degree. A part of the requirement for successful completion and credit for research shall be that the student submit to the instructor a brief written synopsis describing the research done in that term. This report shall be submitted by the last day of the term for review and approval by the instructor who shall then transmit the report to the Dean along with the grading sheet.

Seminar (6195) is a one hour credit course. Each student presenting a seminar shall receive a letter grade, while students not making a presentation will receive a grade of "satisfactory" (S) or "unsatisfactory" (U). No more than three credit hours of seminar may be counted toward the thirty-six hour requirement for the Master of Science degree.

Credit for thesis (5698, 6398) and dissertation (6399) courses will be evaluated on the basis of satisfactory (5) or unsatisfactory (U). An 5 grade qualifies the student to receive course hour credits toward the degree. No more than six hours

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for thesis courses will be credited toward the minimum hour requirements for a degree.

Page 63 Adding and dropping courses

Statement has been revised as follows:

Courses may be added or dropped on or before the twelfth class day of the term. Courses dropped by this date will not be recorded on the transcript. Courses dropped after the twelfth day, but before the end of the fifth week of the term, will be recorded on the transcript as (PP-(dropped passing).—Courses-dropped after-the-end-of-the-fifth-week-of-the-term-will-be-recorded-on-the-transcript-as Fr--if-extenuating-circumstances exist,—an-application-for an exception-to-this rule-must-be made-in-the-form-of-a-letter-of-explanation-to-the-dean-reflecting approval--of-the-course-instructor-and-the-graduate-program-director.) DR (dropped). The designation DR has no credit hour value and carries no implication of level of performance. To receive the DR, the student must prepare a brief written statement explaining the reason for dropping the course and this statement must be signed by the instructor, the student's program director and the dean. Students with more than two grades of DR on their transcript shall be subject to dismissal from the graduate school.

Drop and and add form are available in the dean's office.

Page 64 Academic performance

This section has been revised to reflect new academic policies and has been divided into sections on Academic Performance, Probation, Dismissal, and Appeals.

Continuation in good standing in the Graduate School beyond the first term is dependent on the following academic performance factors: satisfactory progress in absolving any admission conditions that have been imposed; and achieving in each term a 3.0 average or above (on-a-sea+e-of-4-0) for all letter-graded courses and satisfactory performance in research, thesis or dissertation courses. (taken-in each-term-registered:)

Any graduate student who receives a final grade of F, WF, or U in a course must retake the course and obtain a B or S grade or better pursuant to the restrictions listed under Dismissal. A program may, however, permit a student to substitute a course which the program designates is equivalent to the one in which the student received the grade WF. No grade may be expunged from a transcript except the grades I, NR or WF; and the latter may only be expunged if the student retakes the same course.

Probation If a student's academic progress is less than (satisfactory-in-a-given term) the requirements set forth under Academic Performance in a given term, the dean shall inform the student by letter that he/she will be on academic probation during the next term in which (he) the student is registered and that continuance as graduate student is in jeopardy. Only (in-unusual-cases) with permission of the dean will a student be permitted to drop a course during any term that he/she is on probation. If during the term in which the student in on probation he/she achieves a 3.0 average or above for all letter-graded courses and satisfactory performance in research, thesis or dissertation courses, the dean will remove the student from academic probation. (if-the 3.0-requirement-is-not-met,-the-dean will-inform-the-student-that-grounds-for-dismissal-exist-and-that-the-right-to appear-to-a-special-academic-review-committee may be exercised.—Students-who-do not-appear-will-be-withdrawn-from-the-Graduate-School-immediately.

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The special academic review committee shall be appointed by the dean and be composed of six members; three faculty members, one student member of the executive committee, one member of the Graduate Student Organization; and the associate dean for curriculum: The associate dean for curriculum shall make recommendations to the dean concerning the student's continuance in graduate school;)

Dismissal. Bases for academic dismissal from the graduate school exist when (a) a student on probation fails to achieve a 3.0 GPA or above for all letter-graded courses and satisfactory performance in research, thesis or dissertation courses; (b) when a student receives a second F, WF, or U grade (except for Seminar 6195 graded by S/U); or (c) when a student receives more than two grades of DR. Students dismissed from the graduate school are not eligible for re-admission.

Appeals. Students who have been notified that they have failed to meet the requirements for continuation in the graduate school will be dismissed. The student has the right to appeal this decision to a special academic review committee provided the appeal is filed in writing with the Office of the Dean within two weeks of the date of dismissal.

A student who has made such an appeal may register for the subsequent term and attend classes until the special academic review committee has made a recommendation to the dean and the dean notifies the student of final disposition of his/her case. If the student does not prevail in the appeal, the student shall be immediately withdrawn from the gradaute school, an appropriate refund will be made of tuition paid in the current term, and all courses registered for in the term will be deleted from the transcript.

The special academic review committee shall be appointed by the dean and be composed of five faculty members, one of whom shall be the associate dean; the associate dean shall serve as chairman. The committee shall make recommendations to the dean concerning the student's continuation in graduate school.

Continuous Enrollment

It is required that each degree-seeking student shall be enrolled every term from the date of matriculation through the term in which the degree is awarded, except that a student may be granted a leave of absence in accordance with the provisions under Leave of Absence.

Page 64 Voluntary Leave of Absence

Statement has been revised as follows:

Permission for a leave of absence from a graduate program for a maximum period of three terms may be granted by the dean, subject to approval by the program director. Such permission will be granted only on written application and for extenuating circumstances, and indicates that the student will be allowed to return to the program. (The grading-symbol X-(incomplete) will be recorded for each-course not-completed, and the student-will be required to complete these courses as soon as they are offered after the student returns from the leave of absence.) Students requesting a voluntary leave of sbsence will be required to complete the term in which they are enrolled before the leave is granted. Otherwise, the student must withdraw from the graduate school.

Page 64 New material added-

Emergency Leave of Absence

The Dean of the Graduate School may determine that under certain emergency situations, such as severe illness or injury, a student may be granted an emergency leave of absence. The grades assigned for courses in which the student is enrolled at the time of the emergency will be determined by application of the appropriate graduate school policies and by the dean in consultation with the student's program director and the instructor(s) for the courses(s) in which the student is enrolled. Under normal circumstances a student on emergency leave will be reinstated in the graduate school without prejudice after an appropriate recovery period, and a course of study will be designed by the student's program.

Page 64 Withdrawal from the University

Section has been revised as follows:

Voluntary Withdrawal from the (University) Graduate School

Permission for withdrawal from a graduate program may be granted by the dean, on written request by the student, and after consultation with the program director. Students who withdraw are required to submit an official "Withdrawal" form, which may be obtained from the registrar's office. In the case of withdrawal before the end of a term (with the dropping of all courses), the grading symbol WP (withdrawn-passing) or WF (withdraw-failing) will be recorded for each course not completed, depending on the student's standing on the last day of enrollment. In the case of withdrawal at the end of a term, the appropriate grading symbol, A through F or S or U, will be recorded for each completed course, and WP or WF for each course not completed. An application for readmission by a student who has previously withdrawn is subject to the same requirement, procedures, and acceptance considerations as apply to first-time applicants. Unless stipulated by rules elsewhere in this bulletin, the retaking of courses for which a student received a grade of WP or WF and the resolution of these grades shall be at the discretion of the student's program.

Page 65 Transfer between graduate programs

Statement revised as follows:

Any student who wishes to transfer to another graduate program must (make formal application to the program, and the application is subject to the same requirements, procedures, and acceptance considerations as apply to other applicants to the program. Students dismissed from any program are not eligible for admission to another graduate program.) notify his/her program director and make formal application to the new program. The program director of the program to which the student is seeking to transfer shall inform the student's current program director of the student's interest in the transfer. The applicant is subject to the same requirements, procedures, and acceptance considerations as apply to other applicants to the program.

Page 65 General degree requirements

Residence

Statement has been revised as follows:

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Each doctoral degree candidate must spend at least (two terms) one year, or the equivalent, enrolled as a full-time student (and) in residence in the Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences. Each masters degree student must spend at least one year, or the equivalent enrolled as a student in residence in the Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences. Exceptions to the residence requirement must be obtained in writing from the candidate's supervisory committee and the dean of the graduate school.

Page 65 In absentia registration has been deleted because it is also found under Registration.

Page 65 Courses counted for another degree has been deleted.

Pages 65-66 Transfer of credit

Statement has been revised as follows:

Previous graduate (coursework) courses taken at another institution may be transferred (from another institution) only on the basis of a recommendation by the student's graduate program faculty and approval by the dean of the graduate school. In cases where such transfer is approved, the student must still meet the residence requirement of (two-full-terms.) one year. Grades received for courses transferred for credit shall not be used in computing the grade point average.

Page 66 Time Limits

Statement has been revised as follows:

(No-time-limit-has-been-imposed-on-acquiring-the-doctoral-degree; however,-all doctoral-work-is-subject-to-review-by-the-dean.) All requirements for the doctoral degree must be completed within five years after admission to candidacy. Any student who fails to complete the requirements within this specified time must reapply for admission to candidacy. All requirements for the Master's degree must be completed within four years from date of first admission as a regular graduate student. If the work for the Master's degree requires longer than a four-year period, permission to continue must be obtained from the candidate's graduate program faculty and the dean of the graduate school.

Page 66 Graduation under a particular bulletin

This statement has been moved to the inside of the front cover.

Page 66 Graduation

Statement has been revised as follows:

Degrees are awarded at the end of fall, spring, and summer terms; but formal, public ceremonies are held only at the spring commencement. (Candidates for the degree Master of Science in Nursing may elect, instead, to attend formal, public commencement exercises conducted by the School of Nursing in the spring and fall).

Page 66 Doctoral degree

Statement has been revised as follows:

The University of Texas Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences at Galveston

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offers the degree of Doctor of Philosophy. The basis for awarding the degree is the candidate's demonstration of ability to master a selected field and to pursue independent research. (The—graduate—program—faculty—is—responsible—for recommending—those students—as—candidates—who have—demonstrated—their—mastery of—the—field.——The—supervisory—committee—is—responsible—for—certifying—the candidate's—ability—to—accomplish—independent—and—significant—research.) The supervisory committee recommends that the graduate faculty certify that the student has fulfilled all the requirements for the degree of Doctor of Philosophy.

Page 68 Course Requirements

Statement has been revised as follows:

Although advanced course work is an integral part of the candidate's preparation, no minimum number of credit hours ({corresponding-to-the-thirty-hours prescribed-for-the-master's-degree}) has been set by the graduate school for attainment of the Doctor of Philosophy degree; however, all doctoral work is subject to review by the graduate program and (by) the dean of the graduate school. The (real) basis on which the degree is awarded is the candidate's demonstration of mastery of a selected field and of ability (for) to do independent scholarship. In addition, the candidate will undertake appropriate work to broaden or supplement (his) the field of specialization.

Page 67 Instructions - This has been totally revised as follows:

(Instructions) Procedures to be followed by all Doctoral Students

Detailed instructions and procedures to be followed by all doctoral students are provided in the ("Doctoral Packet" supplied by the office of the dean of the graduate school.) two documents entitled "Information for Masters and Doctoral Candidates" and "Instructions for Preparation of the Doctoral Dissertation and Masters Thesis and Instructions for Use of Published Manuscript in Lieu of Masters Thesis (The "Thesis Option") " supplied by the office of the dean of the graduate school.

Page 67 Prior to admission to candidacy

This section has been reorganized and expanded to reflect more accurately the flow of events surrounding admission to candidacy as follows:

(Before admission to candidacy, each student will plan a program of study with the assistance of the graduate program faculty (or a designated graduate advisor or advisory-committee) and the graduate program director.)

Prior to admission to candidacy, the student shall nominate a supervisory professor who, with the approval of the dean, will be in charge of the candidate's doctoral dissertation. The student, in consultation with the nominated supervisory professor, will recommend the other members of a supervisory committee to be appointed by the dean. The supervisory professor will serve as chairman of the supervisory committee. The supervisory committee will normally consist of five graduate faculty members; four from the candidate's major field (including the supervisory professor and one special member or appointee from another institution, and one who is not a member of the student's graduate program.

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Page 68 Admission to candidacy

Statement has been revised as follows:

Students seeking the degree of Doctor of Philosophy (are-admitted to condidacy upon the recommendation of the appropriate graduate program faculty; or by a committee appointed by the graduate program director in consultation with the graduate program faculty.—Admission to candidacy requires the removal of all academic deficiencies and the fulfillment of all program requirements and is subject to the approval of the dean of the graduate school.) must submit an application for admission to candidacy and an approved research proposal. No student may be admitted to candidacy with an incomplete (1), failing (F or U), or NR grade on the transcript unless the deficiency has been resolved. Each student must have an overall 3.0 grade point average or better at the time of admission to candidacy. Admission to candidacy requires the fulfillment of all program requirements, including passing the qualifying examination, and must be approved by the dean of the graduate school.

Each graduate program faculty shall develop written procedures for administering a qualifying examination for admission to candidacy. This (examination) shall be a comprehensive (and may be written, or or both.) written examination and may be supplemented with an additional oral examination. The qualifying examination will ordinarily be completed by the end of the second year of study and is prerequisite to admission to candidacy. When possible or appropriate, and as a means of ensuring breadth and consistency, the same written examination should be given to a group of students simultaneously.

Page 68 Following admission to candidacy

Statement has been revised as follows:

(After-admission-to-candidacy,-a-student-must-select-a-supervising-professor. This-supervising-professor-will-be-in-charge-of-the-candidate's-doctoral dissertation,-and-will-be-the-chairman-of-the-supervisory-committee.--The supervising-professor-and-committee,-each-appointed-by-the-dean,-shall-ensure that-the-candidate-satisfies-all-of-the-requirements-of-the-doctoral-degree.--A supervisory-committee-will-normally-consist-of-five-graduate-faculty-members, four-from-the-candidate's-major-field-(including-one-special member-from-another institution),-and-one-who-is-not-a-member-of-the-student's-graduate-program.)

The (supervising) supervisory professor shall periodically apprise the graduate program director of the progress of the candidate's research. In every instance, final approval of the candidate's program shall be the responsibility of the dean of the graduate school.

Doctoral Dissertation. All doctoral students are required to register for a minimum of three credit hours of dissertation; however, no student will be permitted to register for dissertation until he/she has been admitted to candidacy. A dissertation is required of every candidate and must be an original contribution to scholarship based on independent investigation. Students seeking any masters degree are admitted to candidacy upon the recommendation of the appropriate graduate program faculty, or by a committee appointed by the graduate program director in consultation with the graduate faculty. The student must submit an application form for admission to candidacy and an approved research proposal. If a qualifying examination is required, the student must perform satisfactorily before admission to candidacy. Admission to candidacy requires the removal of all academic deficiencies; no student may be admitted to candidacy with an incomplete (I), failing (F, U), or NR grade on the transcript unless the deficiency has been resolved. Each student must have an

overall grade point average of 3.0 or better at the time of admission to candidacy. Admission to candidacy also requires the fulfillment of all program requirements and is subject to the approval of the dean of the graduate school. The Master of Science in Nursing program requires twenty-four hours of course work before admission to candidacy.

(The candidate's supervisory committee is appointed by the dean and ordinarily is composed of at least two graduate faculty members from the major field of study and one graduate faculty member from a supporting area.)

Prior to admission to candidacy, the student shall nominate a supervisory professor who, with the apporval of the dean, will be in charge of the candidate's masters thesis. The student, in consultation with the nominated supervisory professor, will recommend that other members of a supervisory committee to be appointed by the dean. The supervisory professor will serve as chairman of the supervisory committee. The supervisory committee shall ensure that the student satisfies all the requirements of the master's degree and shall recommend that the graduate faculty certify the student for graduation.

The supervisory committee for Master of Science and Master of Science in Nursing students will normally consist of at least three regular or special members of the graduate faculty, two of which are from the student's program (one being the supervisory professor), and one of which has a primary appointment in a program different from that of the student.

For the Master of Medical Science degree the supervisory committee is composed of five members, one of whom is the supervisory professor. At least two members of the committee shall be from basic sciences departments and two shall be from clinical departments. Not more than two members shall be from the department of the student.

Description of M. D.-Ph.D. program is new material as follows:

A combined M. D. -Ph.D. program with stipend support has been instituted at UTMB for outstanding students who wish to pursue an academic career in biomedical research/clinical investigation. Completion of the program, which is rigorous but flexible, will require a minimum of six years.

The program is administered by a faculty committee from the Medical and Graduate Schools. Candidates for admission to this program should meet all the requirements for admission, and apply separately to both the Graduate School and Medical School and should take both the Medical College Admission Test (MCAT) and the Graduate Record Examination (GRE). (Students who score 60 or above on the MCAT are not required to take the GRE). It is anticipated that many such applicates will have selected a suitable Graduate Program from among the eight Ph.D. granting programs available at UTMB, and these students will go through the admission procedure of the chosen Graduate Program. Students who are uncertain about the most appropriate Graduate Program may obtain admission to the Graduate School through action of the Executive Committee of the Graduate School. If admitted to the M. D.-Ph. D. Program, such students may begin the medical curriculum before choosing a particular Graduate Program - although they are encouraged to make a decision as soon as possible.

Criteria for selection include such factors as undergraduate grade point average, performance on the MCAT and the Graduate Record Examination, previous research experience, and motivation for a career in medical research.

Page 105 Programs of Graduate Work Second paragraph has been revised as follows:

Training Is carried out through lectures, laboratories, seminars, Individual or small group dialogues with faculty and visiting investigators, independent study and scholarly research. The proportion of independent study compared to supervised study will vary according to previous training and the area chosen. Studies in the specialized area are supplemented by advanced level courses in one or more associated areas. Emphasis is placed on practice in critical and analytical thought and on the creatvie design and implementation of experimental procedures required for testing original and significant hypotheses. Research experience offered trainees covers a broad range of biology and may involve ultrastructure, histochemistry, biochemistry, immunochemistry, immunobiology, tissue culture, and animal and human experimentation. Opportunities for teaching experience will be gained by participation in instructional activities for the medical school course in microbiology and by frequent presentations of literature and research seminars. Throughout the year, a variety of regularly scheduled seminars on biomedical topics are given at the Medical Branch and there are numerous other presentations by visiting scientists.

The program of study for the Doctor of Philosophy degree will be tailored to the needs of individual students. A typical schedule would include an orientation course , neurochemistry, basic neuroscience (anatomy and physiology of the nervous system), behavioral neuroscience, neuropharmacology, interdisciplinary neuroscience, biostatistics, teaching and seminar. During the second year, course work will be directed towards a specialty area. The student should also develop an association with a faculty member who will guide further academic progress and aid in the selection of a dissertation topic. In addition, the student will complete research rotations in the laboratories of various faculty members and participate in ongoing research. Although the typical student will require two years for the completion of the basic requirements for the Neuroscience Program, it is anticipated that an occasional student will be able to qualify in a shorter period. (Factors-which-might-reduce-the-time-include-prior graduate-work-and-advanced-placement-in-such-courses-as-biochemistry, biostatistics-or-others.) There may be special requirements for students who wish to emphasize particular areas of neuroscience or to establish credentials in a traditional discipline in addition to neuroscience. Throughout this period the student must achieve a grade of B or better in the courses taken.

At the end of the second year, there will be a set of examinations leading to the admission of the student to candidacy. The first examination will be a comprehensive written qualifying examination and will be administered by the Examinations Committee of the Graduate Program faculty in Neuroscience. The purpose of the written examination is to test the student on the breath of his knowledge in neuroscience and related disciplines. The second examination will be an oral test concerning the student's proposal for the area of dissertation research. It will be given by an ad hoc committee that normally will become the supervisory committee, chaired by the faculty member who will supervise the student's program. Upon satisfactory performance on the examinations, the Graduate Program Faculty will recommend admission of the student to candidacy to the Graduate Program Director, who will then make a recommendation to the dean of the Graduate School. A supervisory professor will be selected by the student after admission to candidacy. The composition of the supervisory

committee will be according to Graduate School policy and must be approved by the program director and the dean of the Graduate School. Requirements for the remainder of the candidate's program will be determined by the supervisory committee. These will include seminar, research, and dissertation. However, additional requirements of specific coursework may be deemed appropriate by the committee. As the dissertation research is completed, the candidate must submit and defend an acceptable dissertation describing original research which constitutes an important contribution to the field of concentration.

Page 116 Admission Requirements Revised as follows:

In addition to the general admission requirements of the Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences, the Neuroscience Program requires the following: differential and integral calculus, general physics (1year), general chemistry (1year), organic chemistry (1year), biology (1year) and at least a year's work in advanced science courses pertinent to the applicant's proposed area of interest, e.g., advanced biology, physical chemistry, engineering, computer science, physiological psychology, behavior, biochemistry. It is highly recommended that students take an upper level or graduate course in biochemistry before entering the program. The applicant must attain a score of 1100 on the Graduate Record Examinations; a minimum of 500 is required on both the veribal and quantitative portions. Theory and practice realted to clinical specialization, scientific investigation, theory development and role development are provided. The goal of the program is to prepare nurses to function independently, interdependently, and dependently within the health care delivery team. Included in the preparation are opportunities to practice in an expanded role in a clinical setting, to test theoretical nursing concepts, to use a critical logical and analytical approach to solving health care problems; to develop and impelment a research protocol, to utilize research findings in practice; and to study and test role development strategies;)

The University of Texas Graduate School of Biomedical Scinences at Galveston offers a graduate program which is flexible in meeting the needs and interests of a diverse student population and enabling students to utilize the many learning opportunities available. Classes are taught during the day and early evening hours.

Students may take courses in related non-nursing fields such as the natural, social, and behavioral sciences, and may, in addition, select from a variety of courses in nursing. These courses may be taken at any of The University of Texas System component institutions throughout the State or at the U.T. Galveston Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences.

The curriculum is designed to be offered in academic semesters, but courses may be offered during the summer sessions as well. It is possible for students to enroll part-time and to extend their program.

- A minimum of a baccalaureate degree in nursing from a nursing program accredited by the National League for Nursing. Applicants who have a baccalaureate degree in nursing from a non-NLN accredited program will be considered individually. The applicant should submit additional data about the program and its accrediation status.
- 2. A basic statistics course, which must be completed prior to enrolling.
