I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to establish the development and use of a Cold Case/Criminal Apprehension capacity within the Office of the Director of Police (ODOP).

II. POLICY

The Office of the Director of Police acknowledges the need for creating a special investigative capacity within ODOP capable of investigating unsolved major felony crimes, high profile misdemeanors, or missing persons where all leads have been exhausted within the primary jurisdiction of the University of Texas System Police (UTSP).

Furthermore, ODOP recognizes the need for the apprehension of those fugitive offenders wanted by the UTSP for felony or high profile misdemeanor crimes who remain at large.

III. DEFINITIONS

Cold Case—means a criminal offense or missing persons account reported to the UTSP that has remained unsolved for over 1 (one) year after the crime was initially reported, the probative investigative leads have been exhausted, and for which the applicable statute of limitations has not expired.

High Profile Misdemeanors—means misdemeanor crimes within the primary jurisdiction of the UTSP that seriously affect the course of business, reputation of the University of Texas System or quality of life of the University of Texas System community. Examples of High Profile Misdemeanors include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Misappropriation of University funds
- 2. Missing UT System assets
- 3. Serial thefts
- 4. Sex offenses other than sexual assault

Major felony crime—means a serious felony criminal offense committed within the primary jurisdiction of the UTSP.

Examples of major felony crimes include, but are not limited to, the following:

- 1. Homicide
- 2. Sexual assault
- 3. Unsolved active shooter or armed intruder cases
- 4. Aggravated robbery
- 5. Burglaries
- 6. Missing persons/kidnap/abduction

II. STAFFING OF THE COLD CASE PROGRAM

The Cold Case Program will be staffed by Inspectors in the Office of the Director of Police and will serve at the pleasure of the Director of Police. Experienced police officers from any UT System police department may be assigned by the Director or his designee to supplement the Cold Case Program on a temporary basis after coordination with the institution Chief of Police.

III. COLD CASE INVESTIGATOR MINIMUM QUALIFICATIONS

Inspectors chosen for the Cold Case Unit should meet the following qualifications:

- 1. Ability to work with minimal supervision
- 2. Experience in homicide, sexual assault and/or other major criminal investigations
- 3. Expertise in interview and interrogation
- 4. Exceptional report writing skills
- 5. Proven competency in surveillance techniques
- 6. Demonstrated competency in writing arrest and search warrants
- 7. Excellent communication, interview and interrogation skills
- 8. Strong research skills
- 9. Ability to read, analyze, and interpret complex criminal cases and to establish facts to draw valid conclusions

IV. COLD CASE SUBMISSIONS AND REVIEW

Any University of Texas police officer may recommend an unsolved major felony or high profile misdemeanor offense(s) or missing persons report to ODOP through his/her chain of command. Likewise, an ODOP Inspector may also elect to recommend such an investigation. To the extent possible, all submitted cases should include:

- 1. Application for Cold Case Review (DP-70)
- 2. Original offense report and narrative
- 3. Crime Scene report
- 4. Crime Scene photos and/or videos
- 5. Autopsy report (if applicable)
- 6. Lab reports and analysis
- 7. Case Report
- 8. All supporting investigative documents and reports

- 9. Lists of all witnesses, suspects and family members
- 10. Texas Penal Code offense applicable to the time of the offense
- 11. Completed Cold Case Solvability Questionnaire (DP-71)

All cases received by the Cold Case Program will be reviewed and subsequently prioritized by an assigned Police Inspector based on reasonable expectations contributing to the success of solvability. After the initial prioritization of submitted cases has been completed and the solvability factors established, the Director of Police will make the final determination as to which case(s) will be adopted for further investigation by the Cold Case Program.

V. SOLVABILITY

After case review, Inspectors assigned to the Cold Case Program will prioritize submitted cases based on the following metrics:

HIGH

Known suspect, preserved physical evidence, witnesses available

MODERATE

No known suspect; physical evidence preserved witnesses available

No known suspect; insufficient evidence; witnesses available

LOW

No known suspects, physical evidence, or material witnesses

VI. COLD CASE PROSECUTOR REVIEW

Prior to initiation of the investigation, Cold Case investigators will consult with a prosecutor in the relevant jurisdiction where the crime occurred to gain insight into whether the case can be successfully prosecuted given the facts and evidence at hand.

VII. PERIODIC REVIEW

Each case adopted by the Cold Case Program will be reviewed on a monthly or as needed basis, and the results reported to the Director of Police in writing. The case evaluation review will examine the following issues, to include:

- 1. An assessment of the investigation's current processes and progress
- 2. Investigation strategies—near term
- 3. Investigation strategies—long term
- 4. Manpower allocation
- 5. Expenditures to date

VIII. CONTACTING VICTIMS AND/OR VICTIM'S FAMILIES—HOMICIDES AND SEXUAL ASSAULTS

The reinvestigation of a homicide or sexual assault case may cause renewed psychological trauma to the victim and/or victim's families. Cold Case officers will partner with victim service providers prior to initial contact in an attempt to assure that survivors receive the services they need during the investigation.

When it has been determined that family members of the victim have been ruled out as potential suspects, they will be contacted by the assigned Inspector and victim's assistance representative and advised that the case has been reopened.

Regular contact and truthfulness are two of the most important needs that survivors have of law enforcement. In order to maintain a communication conduit with homicide or sexual assault survivors, a designated Inspector in the Cold Case Program will routinely contact survivors to share information with them on a "need to know" basis. In addition, the Inspector will also provide any change in status of the case to the survivor(s).

VIX. FELONY CRIMINAL APPREHENSION

Any University of Texas police officer may submit a wanted felon or high profile offender for consideration through his/her chain of command. Furthermore, on a regular basis, regional Inspectors will contact their respective institutions and request a list of outstanding high profile misdemeanor and/or felony warrants. All submissions should include the following:

- 1. Original offense report and narrative
- 2. All supporting investigative documents and reports
- 3. Case Report
- 4. Lists of all witnesses, suspects and family members
- 5. Residence and vehicle lists
- 6. Photos and videos

All fugitive suspect packets received by the Cold Case Program will be reviewed and subsequently prioritized based on reasonable expectations contributing to the success of apprehension. The Director of Police will make the final determination as to which offenders, if any, will be adopted for further investigation and pursuit by the Cold Case Program.
